ROGERS SPEAKS IMPLICATING SBARRETT EAGERLY EXPECTED STATEMENT CONFIRMS RUMORS ABLEGATE ISSUED A MILD ULMATUM

Made the Proposition That If Manitoba Would Grant Concessions To Separate Schools He Would "Facilitate" Extension of Boundaries—Text of the Demands Made on Manitoba Ministers by Representative of Vatican as Outlined in Signed Statement from Hon. Robert Rogers

AS VIEWED AT OTTAWA.

Ottawa, April 4.—(Special)—Probably the gravest crisis known to the history of Canadian confederation is upon us at this moment. For days things have been brewing. Sir Wilfrid Laurier has a more than worried look, and his new parliamentary shadow, Hon. J. I. Tarte, has been flitting about the premier's door and near him on the floor of the house as a privileged examiner, wearing the air of a man who expected a bombshell and was counselling his old friend how to avert its explosion. Mr. Tarte has apparently known for days of the great blunder of Mr. Sbarretti in regard to the boundaries of Manitoba and has been daily throwing pillows out of the window for the premier to jump on. To-night his paper anticipates the explosion that has come from Manitoba and tries to make out that the interview in Ottawa between the apostolic delegate and Mr. Campbell did not mean anything in particular.

But to the Liberals in the house it is a night of dread and uncertainty and they know not what to-morrow may bring forth. Only one minister was in the house from 8 o'clock on. The others were evidently holding an emergency meeting.

All sorts of rumors are afloat to the effect that Sir Wilfrid will ask for Mr. Sbarretti's recall or will even dismiss him from the country. The premier, however, will most likely try to make out that it is an incident and an insignificant one.

But all Canada will be ablaze to-morrow over the revelations from Winnipeg.

CAT'S OUT OF THE BAG ROGERS GIVES THE STORY FROM FIRST TO PRESENT

Sir Wilfrid Laurier Asked Deputation to Wait Three or Four Days and on the Third Day Sbarretti Invited Conference and Submitted His Proposal.

Winnipeg April 4.—(Special).—The Hon. Robert Rogers, minister of public works, and member of the official Manitoba delegation to Ottawa on the boundary extension, issued the following statement to-day.

"On Feb. 13 we received a formal invitation by telegram from Sir Wilfrid Laurier to come to Ottawa as soon as convenient. We left on Feb. 14 and arrived on the afternoon of the 16th, when we received a letter from Sir Wilfrid at the Russell House, saying he would be pleased to meet us in his office at midday on Friday, the 17th. During that interview we presented the claims of the province as urgently and as strongly as possible. In reply, Sir Wilfrid said that he would remain in Ottawa for three or four days he would again send for us, and would then be in a position to give us an answer.

"In three days' time, on Feb. 20, a LETTER WAS RECEIVED FROM HIS EXCELLENCY MGR. SBARRETTI, ASKING FOR A CONFERENCE. THIS INVITATION WAS ACCEPTED AND HIS EXCELLENCY THEN PRESENTED THE FOLLOWING MEMORANDUM, WHICH WOULD BE WOULD PLACE THIS ON THE STATUTE BOOK OF OUR PROVINCE. IT WOULD GREATLY FACILITATE AN EARLY SETTLEMENT OF OUR MISSION—THE FIXING OF OUR BOUNDARIES, WHICH WOULD BE EXTENDED TO THE SHORES OF HUDSON BAY. His excellency further stated that our failure to act in the past had prejudiced our claim for extension westward.

"The following is a copy of his excellency's memorandum, containing the proposed amendments to the Manitoba School Act:

"Add to section 23 (B). 'And when in any district there shall be fifteen or more Roman Catholic children, and fifteen or more non-Roman Catholic children, the trustees shall, as required by a petition of parents or guardians of such number of either of such classes, provide separate accommodations for such classes, and employ for them, respectively, Roman Catholic or non-Roman Catholic teachers.'

"Add to section 48 (B). 'And when in any district there shall be fifteen or more Roman Catholic children, and fifteen or more non-Roman Catholic children, the trustees shall, as required by a petition of parents or guardians of such number of either of such classes, provide separate accommodations for such classes, and employ for them, respectively, Roman Catholic or non-Roman Catholic teachers.'

"Sir.—As we find it necessary to leave Ottawa to-morrow, we desire to refer to our interview of Feb. 17, respecting Manitoba's claim for extension of her boundaries westward and northward, when you were good enough to suggest that if we would remain here for three or four days you would then be in position to give us an answer respecting same. Up to the present time, however, we have heard nothing further from you excepting your statement in parliament on Tuesday last, and your decision as to our western boundary.

BISHOPS REGARD SBARRETTI AS A "POLITICAL RESULT"

His Appointment Thru Efforts of Quebec Liberals High and Low Simply to Secure a Buffer Between Government and Indignant Prelates Who Consider the Vatican Was Tricked.

Montreal, April 4.—(Special).—There can now be no doubt whatever that Sir Wilfrid Laurier and the minister of justice are heartily sick of the white elephant which they have on their hands, for it is absolutely certain that Mr. Sbarretti has made a pretty nettle of his papal representative in the Northwest.

While the name of the Italian diplomat is in every one's mouth it is well to recall the circumstances which led up to the appointment of a papal ablegate for Canada. The Liberals in this province, with the prime minister and minister of justice at their head, complained that the Roman Catholic episcopacy, and especially that of French Canada, had been hostile to the advent of that party to power, consequently the Quebec ministers got up a petition to the Holy See asking that an ablegate be sent to the Dominion. This petition was signed by every French Liberal member of the house of commons and senate, also as a matter of course, the bishops opposed the movement and Mr. Bruchesi asked several members of that party to sign the document in question for his lordship realized that the whole scheme was aimed at episcopal influence in this province. His lordship, however, was vain, for Hon. Mr. Fitzpatrick secured the family influence of Sir Charles Russell, afterwards Lord Russell of Killowen, who, with the English Catholics of the Tablet School, were then all provinces at Rome.

Looked on as "Political" Result. It will be remembered that when Mr. Laurier, now the premier, first reached Canada he completely ignored all the bishops except Mr. Edward of Valleyfield, and from that time to the present the ablegate, to be Falconer or Sbarretti, has been nothing more or less than a buffer standing between Sir Wilfrid and the indignant prelates of this province, who felt one and all that Sir Wilfrid and Hon. Mr. Fitzpatrick had fooled the Vatican as well as the episcopacy on the Manitoba question. The report that he received several censures. Manitoba Now Believes in Ontario's Agitation

Revelations Convince People of Prairie Province of Danger That Lurks in Educational Clause of Autonomy Bill.

Winnipeg, April 4.—(Special).—To say that the statement issued this afternoon by the provincial government has made a profound sensation is to understate the truth. If it does nothing else it has convinced Manitobans that there is something behind the agitation in Ontario regarding the school classes, that it is a matter that concerns them, and that they are being deceived. The report had actually discredited the official statement, yet the light in black and white of the amendments which Mr. Sbarretti proposed to introduce into the educational system of Manitoba has convinced Protestants of their narrow escape from imminent danger, and they will now thrust their heads up and join in the fight against the autonomy bills.

Beyond that these revelations have given birth to such suspicion of the intentions and affiliations of Sir Wilfrid Laurier. Chances were the veil, clay feet appear and another popular idol is torn from its pedestal. No one doubts but that the premier will hasten to disavow the action of the papal ablegate, and to dissociate himself from any attempt to coerce Manitoba into a

return to the separate school system but facts are too patent to be disregarded.


Stimmed Down. Messrs. Campbell and Rogers, representing the Manitoba legislature and government, arrive in Ottawa and hold an interview with Sir Wilfrid Laurier regarding the matter of boundary extension. They are cordially received, and are invited to return in four days. In the meantime they receive a note from the secretary of Mr. Sbarretti inviting them to an interview. At that interview the papal ablegate speaks with the voice of authority, regrets Sir Wilfrid's unfortunate attitude in the past, but suggests there will be no difficulty in a northern extension immediately if her government makes but one or two trifling alterations in its school legislation.

It is not hard to imagine the winning smile of the Italian prelate as he produces the draft clauses which are to effect that purpose—clauses written in the same hand as the note of invitation—and suggests that the secular school system, while the number of illiterates in Quebec had also decreased in greater proportion than in any other province of Canada.

Talks From Quebec. "If Mr. Macdonald would only come to the Province of Quebec," continued Mr. Laurier, "he would see we have here a political result."

Ottawa, April 4.—(Special).—The debate to-day was entertaining, if nothing else. Armand Lavrene, in resuming the debate on the autonomy bill, prefaced his speech with the inimitable observation that the view he took might be a weak one, but it was held in all sincerity and frankness. CHICAGO GRIES FOR PUBLIC OWNERSHIP ELEGTS DUNNE (DEM.) MAYOR BY 25,000

Issue Was Clean-Cut and People Didn't Take Long to Place Themselves Thoroughly on Record.

Chicago, April 4.—The Republican party to-day met defeat in an effort to capture the majority of Chicago. As a direct result, the city officially is committed to the policy of quickest possible cessation of private franchises for public utilities. Municipal ownership especially is threatening street car lines, valued high up in the millions. After a necessary winning four Biennial elections of independents against the Republican party organization here, John Maynard Harlan, son of Associate Justice Harlan of the United States supreme court, to-day was a loser as Republican candidate for mayor. The defeat was political revenge and in a wide sweep embracing Socialism as a factor. The victor is Judge Edward P. Dunne, Democrat. The Republican candidate suffered heavily from campaign attacks, charging that he was a political assassin. Leaders of his own party who had been thrust from office and power largely thru Harlan's acts in previous campaigns, were absent from his support. The result was evident before the balloting had been in progress an hour.

What Did it? Appeals for fear of domination by corporate wealth appeared to sway many voters, and perhaps more than any other influence, was incorrectly gauged by the Republican party. Harlan had been harassed during the campaign as the reputed representative of Wallstreet interests, intent on fastening burdens of republicite grants upon the city. The Republicans, however, had figured that the voters susceptible to appeals of this kind would support the Socialist candidate, Collins, and that losses, if any, to the Republican would be more than made up by Harlan's old-time admirers among independent voters. Estimates, however, were off.

Advocacy of immediate municipal ownership radically voted by Judge Dunne, anticipated any move by Collins. The smallest of the prohibitions as evinced by many persons as evidence of temperance voters voted for Dunne, in apprehension that Harlan might not be too many days to give the prohibition nominee. Harlan's first act in public life as an alderman had been the increasing of alcohol and to secure, it was charged, the passage of an ordinance forbidding the sale of liquor in a residential neighborhood bordering Lincoln Park. It is declared that the candidate, Adrian C. Anson, the old-time hero of baseball field, and who was the Democratic candidate for city clerk, was a potent help to the Democrats.

The Turnout. As the returns to-night from the election came from Judge Harlan's home ward, adjacent to the aristocratic Lake Shore-drive, the figures favoring the Republican candidate, notwithstanding that the ward is the residence of the Mayor Carter H. Harrison, Democrat, who carried the ward in the last municipal campaign. Soon, however, the factory districts and other unpretentious but populous sections began to be heard from. Dunne was quickly in the lead.

The plurality for Dunne, Democrat, was estimated at between 25,000 and 25,000 votes over Harlan, in the city election two years ago Harrison, Democrat, defeated Stewart, Republican, by 7600 plurality. The city, however, was carried by the Republicans in the present election last fall by a heavy plurality.

Excerpts From Report of Annual Meeting of Shareholders Held at the Company's Building, Spadina Crescent, Toronto, on Monday, March 27th, 1905.

The President, Mr. S. J. Moore, took the chair, and the General Manager, Mr. Chas. Ed. Potter, was appointed Secretary of the meeting.

SATISFIED? MOST CERTAINLY PT. ARTHUR'S EXPERIENCE

Ex-Mayor Dyke Relates the Vicissitudes and Triumphs of Town's Municipal Phone System.

Ottawa, April 4.—(Special.)—Joshua Dyke, ex-mayor of Fort William, gave evidence before the telephone commission of the common sense and working of the municipal systems of Port Arthur and Fort William, the systems having been started owing to dissatisfaction with the Bell Company's service.

The municipal system cost Fort William \$30,000 and Port Arthur \$21,000. Mr. Dyke said that the municipal system had 500 phones and Fort Arthur 615. The first year of operation, 1903, resulted in a deficit of \$576. Next year it was paid off and there was a surplus of \$489. The local phones have been connected with the Canadian Northern Railway, but not with the C. P. R. officials with the formation of the municipal system by the Bell Company. In this connection Mr. Dyke read numerous affidavits from municipal officials and the municipal setting forth that this agreement was in restraint of trade.

W. F. Maclean asked if the Town of Fort William had given any assistance to the C. P. R. in the way of bonuses. Mr. Dyke replied that in bonuses and land grants the town had given the C. P. R. about \$2,000,000. Further, the C. P. R. was only entered into in 1902, just when the municipalities were starting their systems, so it was looked upon as another attempt to destroy the enterprise.

WHITE WINGED DOVE IS FLOWN BUT NO ONE TELLS THE CAUSE

Roosevelt's Holiday Trip Convinces St. Petersburg That Peace Negotiations are Off.

St. Petersburg, April 4.—The announcement that President Roosevelt left Washington on a vacation trip is being taken here as evidence that the efforts to draw Russia and Japan into peace negotiations have come to grief for the moment. A definite explanation of exactly what happened is forthcoming, either directly or indirectly, but it is clear that the public had been misled within a few days.

There has been a persistent rumor that the Grand Duchess Sergius, daughter of the late Emperor Nicholas II, had been married to a Russian nobleman, shortly after her arrival in St. Petersburg. The rumor was spread by the Grand Duchess's own press agent, who is a very devoted member of the Russian court.

The trial of the murderer of Grand Duke Sergius will occur at Warsaw before a military tribunal. The trial is expected to be a sensational one, and will attract a large number of spectators.

The police enquiry has failed to establish the identity of the assassin. It is reported that another attempt on the life of Governor-General Repoff was foiled last night.

The news of a discussion of the relative advantages of an Anglo-Russ-French and German-Russ agreement, finds the latter probably a matter of accomplishment, and possibly more advantageous to Russia on account of Germany's growing importance in the near east.

Chinese Troops to Honor Him. Pekin, April 4.—Edwin H. Conger, who has just vacated the post of American minister to China, upon his appointment as ambassador to Mexico, left for America to-day via Hankow. Representatives of all foreign legations assembled at the railway station to bid him farewell. The approach to the station was lined by Chinese troops.

WANT A LONGER BAYONET FOR THE BOYS IN BLUE. Washington, April 4.—Secretary of War Taft has approved a recommendation, based on the report of an army board, which makes special enquiry into the subject of the bayonet.

This enquiry was made at the suggestion of President Roosevelt as a result of the experience of the armies in Manchuria.

Gen. Chase recommends a bayonet at present issued to the army for the use of the Krug rifle, differing only in that its length is increased by six inches.

Questions the Jurisdiction. The supreme court at Ottawa to-day is hearing the appeal of the A. R. Williams Co. against the order of the London, England, with quotations for imported apples. After quoting various

kinds of American apples, it referred to Canadian apples as "Canadians, all around, two shillings more." When, as year before last, Canada shipped 1,500,000 barrels of apples, the advantage of two shillings, or even one shilling, a barrel was more than compensation for the slight cost of inspection.
