SENATE PO IN FROM TRACK Railway Service Utterly Demoralized by Storm, Lines Being Blocked by Debris-In Salt Lake City 2000

Trees Were Uprooted.

Salt Lake City, Utah, Oct. 22.—Rallway service between here and Ogden is utterly disorganized. The terrific wind Saturday night and Sunday morning carried down all the telegraph wires, making the despatching of trains in regular order impossible.

The Denver and Rio Grande system is moving few trains. The Oregon Short Line is blocked by a wreck near Woods Cross, where 30 freight cars were blown from the tracks. Two passenger coaches on the Salt Lake and Ogden Railroad were blown from the track near Centreville and the conductor and two passengers were bruised

The Salt Lake and Ogden Line is blocked by many trees blown across the track. In Salt Lake City 2000 trees were uprooted and several frail buildings in course of construction were wrecked.

20 INCHES OF SNOW.

Denver, Colorado, Oct. 22.—Snow, wind and cold extended over nearly the entire country between the Rocky Mountains and the Missouri River to-day, causing theavy losses of live stock and of late fruit. Telegraph wires were prostrated and railroad schedules disarranged.

The storm is almost unprecedented for severity at this season of the year and takes lank, according to the weather bureau, with the snowfall on April 22 and 23, 1885.

In the six o'clock this evening about 20 inches of season had follows.

Up to six o'clock this evening about 20 inches of snow had fallen in Denver. Much of this snow melted soon. While the temperature on the plains has fluctuated from 20 to 30 above zero, it has been much colder at higher altitudes. At Corona, the highest point on the new Moffat Railroad, two degrees below zero early to-day was reported.

At Emery Gap, on the Colorado Southern Railroad, snow drifted nine feet deep and traffic was tied up to-day. Two rotary snow plows were sent out to open the road.

Snow caused the mail coach and two baggage cars to jump the track, and they rolled down an embankment. Only one man, the mail clerk, was hurt, and his injuries are not severe.






