Indian Superstitions Do Not Count in the Courts of Law in Canada—The "Wendigo" Superstition.

The Queen v. Mackeough was a most interesting case reserved by Mr. Justice Rose for a Divisional Court as to whether, upon the findings of the jury in answer to questions submitted to them, and upon his direction to them, and upon the evidence, the prisoner was properly found guilty of manslaughter. The defendant is a member of the tribe of pagan Indians at Sabascon Lake, on the east side of the Lake of the Woods. He is a man of about 40 years of age, and is a native of the tribe.
