THE SUNDAY PAPER IN LONDON. Daily Mail's First Issue Tells About the Great Sufferings of Prince

Sunday edition of The Daily Mail contains a statement by Dr. Schweninger, for many years Prince Bismarck's physician, in which he relates the old Chancellor's thirty years' struggle with death. While hunting in struggle with death. While hunting in Sweden in August, 1857, he fell from his horse, experiencing thereafter a slight pain in his left leg. He visited a quack doctor at Heldelberg, who ordered the application of a plaster before proceeding on his pairney home by train. The chief ingredient of the plaster was Spanish fly. The Prince awoke in the night in violent pain. He tore off the plaster and disclosed a deep wound, which was perfectly black. A borning inflammation developed, and it was thought that amputation of the leg would be necessary. Special treatment caused temporary modifications of the pain, but it recurred frequently until his death. Disphysicians on several occasions told him he was within a hand's grasp of death.





The Steps Taken to Weed Out the San Jose Scale From the Fruit Farms of Niagara.

And Those Interested Tell The World That Less Fruit Trees Will Be Better Anyway.

On Saturday last The World visited the fruit-growing district adjacent to the city of St. Catharines for the purpose of investigating the alleged ravages of the San Jose scale in that part of the Niagara Peninsula. Among the many prominent fruit growers and agriculturists interviewed are the following: Lieutenant R. W. Gregory, J. H. Broderick, M. Burrell, of the Township of

Grantham Township. Albert Pay, Lincoln Township.

R. W. Gregory stated that up to the present there had been none of the scale found in the Township of Louth, and commended the Government for the measures now being taken to eradicate the pest.

John W. Blain of Grantham said that in two instances the scale had been found in his township, on the farms of Messrs. Cottneyer and Stewart, whose orchards had been inspected, and the infected trees destroyed.

stroyed.
Albert Pay, secretary-treasurer of the Lin Albert Pay, secretary-treasurer of the Lincoln Agricultural Society, and the principal exporter of fruit from this district, thinks that the pest can be eradicated by watching and destroying the orchards now infected, and in carefully selecting the nursery stock now being set out.

Mr. Broderick of Louth, who is one of the foremost fruit growers and shippers of that township, stated that he had in no way suffered from the pest, and that he thought the Government were doing right in trying to stamp it out.

Mr. Robert Thompson, President of Grantham Township Agricultural Society, stated that only the two farms referred to by Mr. Blain had been found to be infested, the trees of which had been destroyed.

Drastic Measures Hight.

Drastic Measures Right.

M. Burrell, director of the experimental station for the Township of Louth, and one of the best-informed men on fruit growing and all matters pertaining thereto, considers that the Government are doing the right thing, and that the most drastic measures should be used to stamp out the pest. Mr. Burrell, who is an authority, supposes that the San Jose scale is a native of Japan, as there are and have been found in that country specimens of a scale, if not eaxctly the same, at least very similar to it.

Many more besides the above gentlemen were interviewed, some of them stating that the pest was a blessing in disguise, as it had led many to make a study of it, as well as the many other pests that are the enemies of the fruit grower.

To Shorten the Crop. Clergyman of Denver, Col., Lost His Gibson, pastor of the United Presbyterian Church of Denver, Col., a passenger on the train from this city to Detroit last night, before reaching Lenox discovered that he had been robbed of his telescope, a valise containing his silk gown valued at \$60, a silk hat and a pair of shoes. The May and July options declined %c a bushel, and closed at about the bottom price of the day. Liverpool maize futures to-day advance dd per cental. Chicago corn declined 40 42c and partially recovered.

English farmers' wheat deliveries the past week 51,300 quarters, at an averagorice of 24s 7d. Australian wheat shipments to the United Kingdom the past week 600,000 bushel Exports at New York to-day: Flour 7 arrels and 9212 sacks; wheat 152,335 bus

Receipts of wheat at Minneapolis and Duluth to-day 359 cars, as against 171 cars the corresponding day of last year. The European markets do not appear to respond to the advance in wheat prices, which has taken place on this side. Wheat in nearly all the United States markets has advanced about 6 cents per lushel since the low point in the middle of March. In Liverpool, May wheat has advanced about 1 cent; in France not quite B cents; in Antwerp about 1 cent.

It is said that the small advance in Liverpool was partly attributed.

erpool was partly attributable to some discussion there in favor of raising the grad for contract wheat. It is rumored that the Kansas State report on the condition of wheat in that state has been withheld, as some of the returns were so sensational that it was desirable that more definite information should be obtained.

Bradstreet's correspondent at Des Moines, Iowa, says that the season is farther behind than in any of the past 15 years, and the prospects are for small grain crops, so that very little wheat and oats will be sown this spring, and a correspondingly large increase in acreage of corn.

Prospects for Winter Wheat.

Prospects for Winter Wheat.

The Chicago Daily Bulletin publishes a summary of the reports as to acreage and condition of the winter wheat crop in the states of New York, Pennsylvania, Maryland, Virginia, Kentucky, Tennessee, Ohio, Michigan, Indiana, Illinois, Missouri, Kansas, Texas and California. According to the Government estimate, these states produced 323,000,000 bushels in 1898. Applying the figures of The Bulletin as to present acreage and condition, the result shows a prospect of this season's crop for 305,000,000 bushels. The greatest damage to growing crops is in Kansas, Illinois, Texas, Missouri, Tennessee and Indiana.

Farm Animals—United States.

The annual report of Mr. John Hyde, statistician of the Department of Agriculture shows an increase in the number of milch cows and swine. 
