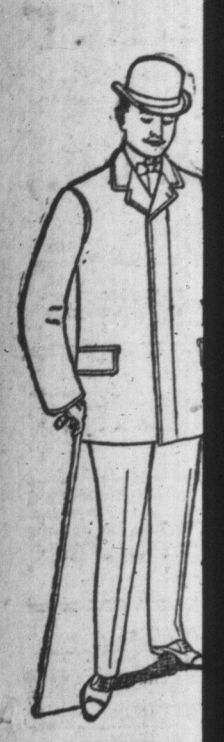

THE PREFERENTIAL TARIFF A DELUSION.
The design of the preferential tariff was to increase our imports from Great Britain. It certainly could not, except in a sentimental way, increase our exports to Great Britain. An increase in our imports from Great Britain must be made either at the expense of other countries, especially of the United States, or of our own manufacturers. If the United States or our own manufacturers have not suffered loss of trade from the preferential schedule then we take it that the preferential tariff has not had the effect intended. The only evidence so far advanced by the Government to show that the preferential tariff has benefited Great Britain is the statement that our imports from the Mother Country have increased six per cent. during the first eight months of the twenty-five per cent preference has been a force. This of itself is no proof that the preferential schedule has diverted trade from the United States to Great Britain, or that it has benefited our manufacturers. We imagine the Government has no desire to prove that the preference has been a detriment to Canada. We ourselves do not believe it has. Has it affected the trade done by the United States with Canada? Apparently not in the slightest. According to the New York Journal and Commerce, the trade of the United States has not been adversely affected by the British preference. On the contrary the exports of the U. S. to Canada seem to have increased by a larger percentage than have the exports of Great Britain to this country. We quote from The Journal:

Take, for example, certain of our exports to British North America for seven months, ending January 31, 1897, 1898 and 1899. In cotton cloth there was a heavy decrease, but in the other lines there was an increase in cotton-wearing apparel. The value of our exports of certain groups of goods during the seven-month periods was as follows:

MR. TARTE'S MONEY-SPENDING PROGRAM.
It cannot be denied that Mr. Tarte's money-spending program meets with considerable popular approval. Canada's debt is larger to-day than it ever was, but the interest per cent is not so high. The rate of interest has been steadily decreasing, while the country has been constantly adding to its wealth. With money obtainable at 3 per cent, we can afford to borrow somewhat liberally for various national enterprises. But while, generally speaking, the people are apprehensive that the spending of the money will not be confined to necessary and economic works, but will be extended to illegitimate schemes. There are many public works that should be undertaken, but the country wants no more debt. We do not think Canada has made a mistake in any of the railway enterprises she has undertaken up to date. The intercolonial, it is true, has not paid working expenses, but the construction of this line was a political necessity. The building of the C.P.R. has already paid for itself. The C.P.R. is earning a good interest on every dollar invested in the enterprise, as well as a large amount of watered stock. The success of the C.P.R. has been such as to warrant our undertaking new railway projects with all confidence. But what the Government should guard against is the opening up of new territory for the special benefit of bonus hunters and railway magnates. If the Government supplies the money for building new railways, it should retain the ownership of them itself. We are glad to observe that the Government looks favorably upon a policy of national ownership of the elevators which it is proposed to build in Montreal harbor. American capitalists are anxious to secure the privilege of constructing them, but they will not do so unless they secure a 50 years' franchise. It would be a retrograde policy to tie up these elevators to an American or any other syndicate. Canada should retain control of them. We believe that the Government should prevent extension, and at the same time take advantage of new conditions as they arise. Without giving in detail the various works throughout the country which the Government would be justified in going ahead with at the present time we may mention that the bringing of water to the city and province especially. We refer to the Georgian Bay-Toronto Railway and the deepening of Toronto harbor. We are given to understand that the latter will be undertaken at an early date. The former is an equally commendable project. The proposed short cut across the Ontario peninsula is a necessary complement of our canal system. Unless this line is built the enlarged St. Lawrence canal will lose fully one-half its efficiency. The Grand Trunk and Canadian Pacific had it in mind to their interests to carry grain from Georgian Bay ports to Toronto. Their object is to secure the long haul to Montreal. In no other way can the people secure the benefit of the new St. Lawrence canal than by the construction of a portage railway, under Government control, from Georgian Bay to Toronto. This is one of the projects for which the Government would be justified in borrowing money and undertaking at once. We are surprised that the Toronto Board of Trade and the City Council are making no move to have this project brought to the attention of the Government. The country can afford to borrow money for such an economical project as this. Mr. Tarte's program is right in line with the proposition. If we fail to secure the line it will be more because of our own indifference than from any other reason.

DOLLAR SLEEPING CAR BENTHS.
Some short time ago the Baltimore and Ohio Railway placed half-rate sleeping cars on its night trains. As the World has already described, these cars were built after the style of ordinary Pullmans, only with less elaborate fittings. We learn from the Railroad Gazette of last week that they are to be taken off after a trial of two or three months. The Gazette says: "It is given out that the railroad company's results of this brief experiment were very gratifying, but the Pullman Company was not in a position to furnish the low-price sleeping cars to all of the roads which are running first-class Pullmans between the east and the west; hence, to reduce friction, the Baltimore and Ohio had to take them off." We take it that the meaning of this is that these half-rate sleepers were very popular with the travelling public, so popular in fact that other railway companies had either to place them on their lines or else leave the Baltimore and Ohio's taking them off its line. These lines brought pressure to bear on the Pullman Company, and succeeded in getting that concern to withdraw the new sleepers altogether. The experiment was apparently too successful. It proved too much.

A POPULAR SELECTION.
Washington Officials Pleased at the Appointment by Britain of Mr. Charles N. Elliott as Canadian Commissioner.
Washington, April 8.—The appointment of Mr. Charles N. Elliott as Canadian Commissioner gave much satisfaction in Government and diplomatic circles, as Mr. Elliott is a member of the Embassy Staff, and during his brief service here has made many friends. It also gave added assurance that the real differences over the Samson machine were well behind us, and that the Governments have turned their attention to the selection of commissioners for its adjustment.

FATHER CHAMPAGNE DEAD.
The Galtine Point Clergyman Who Rendered Service to the Whoredeans Taken Off by Cancer.
Ottawa, Ont., April 8.—Rev. Father Eldred Champagne, the parish priest of Galtine Point, died last night after a lengthy illness of cancer of the stomach. Death came to him peacefully at his late residence at the Point. About three years ago, when Lord and Lady Aberdeen came nearly being drowned at Galtine Point, Father Champagne took them into his parsonage and rendered them what aid was in his power. For this kindness Lord and Lady Aberdeen presented a chime of bells and set of vestments to the parish church. During his illness the deceased was several times inquired after by Lady Aberdeen. A few days before his death he received flowers sent at her wish.

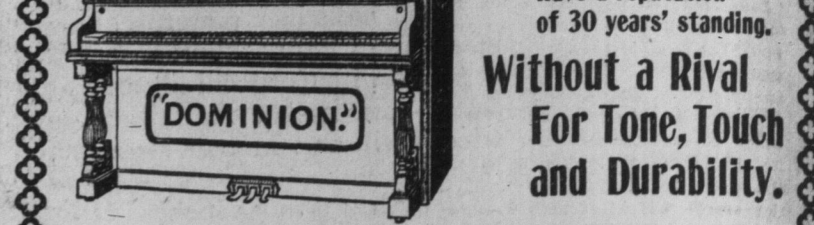

ANOTHER PLAN PROPOSED FOR THE NEXT PORTION RAIL.

For a Combined Entrance for All Street Car Lines Into High Park.

WILL HEAL GET ANOTHER JOB?

Is There a Dark Move on in Connection with the Carpets for the New City Hall?

The latest in High Park entrance matters is the broaching of a new and larger scheme, Aid. Lynd and Simpson Saturday, constituted themselves a quorum, and resolved that a combined entrance for all street car lines should be had somewhere - between the Howard Park-avenue present line, and the proposed Queen-street extension.

Mr. Justice Robison heard argument on Saturday morning at Osgoode Hall in reference to the application of the Crown to change the venue in the Ponton case from Napanee.

His Lordship, at the commencement of the proceedings, said argument was not necessary on the question of the selection of a fair and honest jury either from the Town of Napanee or the County of Lennox and Addington.

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The Pan-Presbyterian Council Will Assemble at Washington on Sept. 27.

ARRANGEMENTS BEING MADE.

Washington, D. C., April 9.—The Executive Committee appointed at the meeting of the Pan-Presbyterian Council at Glasgow four years ago to make preparations for the meeting which is to be held in Washington on Sept. 27, 1899, will assemble in the First Presbyterian Church in Richmond next Thursday.

The Pan-Presbyterian Council is composed of all of the various branches of the Presbyterian Church in the United States and Canada, and they will be handsomely entertained with a banquet and reception by the brethren in Richmond.

The preparations in Washington are not being made by the Synod or by the Presbytery, but by the Executive Committee, the last Moderator of the General Assembly in the United States, and the principal meeting will be held in the Rockaway Church, of which he is pastor, commencing with an inaugural session on Wednesday, Sept. 27.

As this is the twenty-fifth anniversary of the organization of the Pan-Presbyterian Council, and the close of the century, the report of the Executive Committee is somewhat of a historical character.

THE U. S. AND SPAIN.

It is Expected That Friendly Relations Will Be Resumed This Week.

Washington, April 9.—The exchange of ratifications of the treaty of peace between Spain and the United States, signed at Paris, will probably take place in this city next week, and that ceremony will be followed by a proclamation from President McKinley officially announcing the close of the war with Spain and the resumption of friendly relations with that country.
