FIRST SCHLEY WITNESS ADMITS HIS JAIL TERM. Captain Cook Regarded Him as a Brave and Patriotic Officer.

Hounded by Blackmailers, Wealthy Man of Ohio Tells of Sentence.

Washington, Oct. 14.-To-day in the Schley Court of Inquiry, Judge Advocate Leavelle concluded the presentation of testimony for the government, and the first of Admiral Schley's witnesses was introduced.

Admiral Schley's witness was introduced. Captain Francis A. Cook, who commanded the Commodore Schley's flagship, the Albatross, during the Santiago campaign, and who acted, unofficially, in the capacity of chief of staff for the Commodore, was the witness stand the greater part of the day.

He was followed by Lieut.-Commander William F. Pulliam, who was senior watch officer on the Albatross during the Spanish war, and former Lieut. Joseph Beale, who, as an officer on the Harvard, translated the cipher despatches between Commodore Schley and the Navy Department carried by that vessel. Among these despatches was that sent by Commodore Schley May 28, expressing his regret at not being able to obey the orders of the Department, and the reason why he could not do so.
