



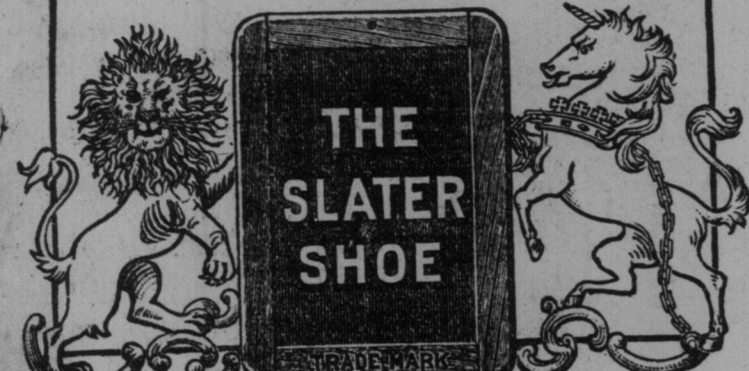

Canfield Discovered By World. The appearance of the Pinkerton detective, Jack Canfield, as the star witness of the prosecution was the crowning sensation of the occasion, and elicited such a demonstration from the friends of the accused men in the room that the court threatened to clear the place of visitors.

In fact, the Crown Attorney asked that this be done. The largest crowd that has been seen around the City Hall in years congregated very early in the morning. It was made up almost wholly of street car employes or their relatives and friends.

The court-room was crowded in two minutes after the doors were opened, and the corridors held a jam of several hundred, while there were as many more in the streets all eager to get a good view of the proceedings.

Officers were stationed at the street doors, and none was admitted except those who had business. Eager to see Canfield. All the detectives who arrested the conductors were present. These men are from the city force, Comptroller Smith of the Street Railway Company and Roadmaster Nix had seats near the Crown Attorney.

Several times the witness refused to answer questions touching the amount of money he was to receive for his work and his previous business, and in view of the promise with which the man's position was usually sustained, the impression prevailed that Canfield had gone over his testimony very carefully and had been informed as to his privileges.

Canfield exhibited slight nervousness during the cross-examination of T. C. Robinette, K.C., when an effort was made to show exactly who employed him here and how much extra he was to receive in the event he convicted the men. At this point the Crown Attorney admitted that Canfield was employed in the case and sanctioned the idea.

Several times the witness refused to answer questions touching the amount of money he was to receive for his work and his previous business, and in view of the promise with which the man's position was usually sustained, the impression prevailed that Canfield had gone over his testimony very carefully and had been informed as to his privileges.

Canfield was attired in a navy grey business suit, sported a watch and chain, and wore a ring with a large stone in it. His hair was of general prosperity, and of a dark color. His long, thin face was slightly flushed, and his eyes were bright.

The man who stepped into the box, and whose complexion deepened as he advanced, was the witness. He had a carefully parted and brushed back and had an appearance of neatness. Told a Good Story. The man told in detail that he was a Pinkerton National Detective Agency employe, and had been sent here to detect thefts among the men.

He had been in Toronto about three months, and admitted drinking, working and loafing with the men. This imputation he denied, however, and showed the men he was "with him." He further said he was in the habit of using loose tickets which were supplied to him by an agent of the Pinkerton in Toronto. He denied stealing these tickets from the boxes, and stated as they were, and thus he was able to get close to them in their operations. He made these statements with an air that carried some conviction.

John Butler C. Pleases. The Crown was evidently very much pleased with the competent John Canfield and his eminently proper bearing in the witness box. In fact, a foregone conclusion that the prisoner would be found over after Canfield had given his testimony, and this phase of the case was never disputed by the lawyer for the accused, only the question of bail being discussed at the conclusion of the testimony.

I saw him get the box out of him. I saw the tickets he got out and the digger with which he did the work." "How did he use the digger?" "He inserted the box, forcing the steel instrument thru the hole, and while the teeth of the roller were held back he extracted the tickets."
