INDEPENDENCE OF THE BENCH

In congratulating Mr. Justice Perdue on his elevation to the Manitoba bench, Mr. John S. Ewart, K.C., made a bold and striking address...

The subject of Mr. Ewart's address was the independence of the judiciary. To put it bluntly, Mr. Ewart believes that judges ought not to accept jobs from governments...

Now that you are Mr. Justice Perdue, you will be approached by the railway companies, and will be offered free transportation over their lines of railway...

"I agree," he said, "this far, and that a judge should avoid as far as possible being involved in an enquiry or any commission which would mix him up in any political controversy..."

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WILL NOT OPPOSE T. & H. BILL.

Cont-rollers Decide to Support Mayor's Resolution.

Mayor Urquhart's resolution to the effect that no further opposition to the Toronto and Hamilton Rail-way be made by the Council, was adopted by the Board of Control yesterday morning.

His Worship stated that he would be able to lay before the Council the correspondence and telegrams showing how the Ontario government withdrew any opposition to the bill. Controller Burns said the city did not "accept" the bill as stated by the Mayor, but Controller Oliver said the delegates had accepted the bill as amended, and he would go further and say that if the city did not accept it, they would get a great deal worse than they now had, and he "knew what he was talking about."

The leaky roof in St. Lawrence Market, which the minister joked about last week, was discussed by the board, and they came to two conclusions: 1. The Metallic Roofing Company, contractors, must place the roof on the south section of the market in satisfactory condition within a reasonable time, or the city will do the necessary work done, and the charge in connection therewith deducted from balance due the contractors.

2. Architects Siddall and Jarvis are to proceed with the construction of a corrugated iron roof on the north section of the market, and give the board a letter to the effect that such roof will be in every way satisfactory. The architects will get a similar letter from Ormsby & Co., the contractors, who are to construct the roof on that part of the market.

3. No Library Site. Commissioner Fleming reported that the city had, in his opinion, no site suitable for public library purposes. By this report, Mr. Fleming does not consider the present site at all adequate to accommodate the new building. The Mayor asked him to report as to the locality in which the site should be purchased.

4. Want More Information. Secretary McQueen was instructed to write to ex-Mayor Shaw, and ex-City Engineer Jennings, for charts, maps and all the information which the commission obtained, when looking into the James Bay Railway proposal some years ago.

5. The city paid for all this information when collected by the commission, and Ald. Richardson is now anxious to have it laid before the Council.

6. Want Canadians in Hoyt. Mayor Urquhart has received a letter from E. H. Peters & Co., of Port au Prince, Hayti, in which these gentlemen ask for good saw mill hands and men used to marine and land engines, steam and electric.

7. City Architect Now. Mr. Fleming will report to the controllers at their next meeting in reference to the appointment of a city architect. He will submit a name for the position, and much speculation is going on as to who shall be the Commissioner's choice.

8. Eight members of the Chicago City Council were in the city yesterday. The councillors are gathering information regarding the disposal of garbage in Toronto, and accompanied by City Engineer Rust they toured the crematoriums.

9. Assessments Reduced. The Court of Revision held a session yesterday, and lopped off several thousands of dollars from the roll. The St. Lawrence Market assessment was reduced one-third by the Court of Revision yesterday afternoon.

10. The Walker House got a reduction of \$5,000 on their building assessment of \$45,000.

11. The following educational institutions were exempt by presenting certificates signed by the Minister of Education: The Sisters of the Precious Blood, St. Joseph-street; The Sisters of St. Joseph, on St. Alban's-street; Lorretto Ladies' College and School, Bond-street; Bishop Strachan School, and Toronto Church School.

12. STOLE BITTER, BUT NOT WHEEL. Before Judge Winchester in the Court of General Sessions, William English of East Toronto was charged with theft of the three bicycles from their owner, one of them being the Holmes Electric Protection Co., and a large quantity of butter from the Toronto Cold Storage Co., whom he was employed as night watchman and engineer. He pleaded guilty to the butter charge, but not guilty to the charge of stealing the bicycles. Grant was at that time working in the employ of the Holmes Co., and said that English and himself had found some of the wheels together, and that English had intentionally repainted it to disguise it. English in his testimony stated that the wheel was brought to him by Grant when he was working in his bicycle store in East Toronto, and he had been given orders to enamel the frame and paint the rims. This he did, and then he was told to sell it if he could. The case was adjourned until this morning on account of lack of the defendant's witnesses.

13. KILLED BY A TRAIN. Tona Station, Sept. 9.—W. G. Winter, whose home is at Comber, was instantly killed this morning by being struck by No. 17 M.C.R. express. The unfortunate man of late has been working on an extra gang at Comber, and was boarded in cars which were placed on the side track. He stepped from the platform of the bounding car to the right in front of the express, and was instantly killed. A train passing east on the Lake Erie at this point drew his attention, and he did not hear the approaching train. He leaves a wife and six children.

14. What St. Louis is and Has. St. Louis is fast becoming one of the largest commercial and manufacturing centres of the world, and has therefore much of interest to visitors aside from the coming World's Fair. It has a number of mercantile houses and manufactory ranking first in their respective lines, the name and fame of which have spread throughout civilization.

15. French Loss Fifty-Seven. Paris, Sept. 9.—Despatches from Oran, Algeria, show that the recent defeat of the insurgents by a French force near Annasser, in which the French lost 57 killed and wounded, is the most brilliant of the recent feats of the French army in Algeria. An attack of 5,000 Moors was repelled.

16. Rescued From Chicago Mob. Chicago, Sept. 9.—Four feet of bricks and stones, policemen last night rescued a negro murderer from a mob of would-be lynchers. Ten minutes before John Brinkley, a colored watchman, had shot and killed Charles McCarthy, a plasterer, almost in the presence of the latter's wife.

17. Continues the Soo System. St. Paul, Minn., Sept. 9.—Articles of incorporation of the Minneapolis, St. Paul and Sault Ste. Marie Railroad Company have been filed with the Secretary of State. The corporation is to have a capital stock of \$21,000,000.

PEACE OR WAR.

Right of Operators to Discharge Employes is Significant. Wilkes-Barre, Pa., Sept. 9.—Coal operators of the Wyoming region look upon the decision of Empire Carroll Wright, giving them the right to discharge employes, as a very important one.

The officials of the United Mine Workers claim that the privilege given employes is not to be abused by mine foremen, who, acting upon instructions from headquarters, can make it very unpleasant for the men who were active in the last strike.

The superintendent of one of the large coal companies says the decision is far-reaching and will either bring permanent peace in the anthracite region or open war, upon the part of the union miners. He points out that 10 per cent of the petty strikes that have taken place since the Strike Commission made its award were caused by the discharge of some employe for cause. In order to have him reinstated all the employes of the mine go out.
