



Ottawa, Sept. 9.—(Special.)—The redistribution bill was taken up to-day in the House. Mr. Monk reviewed at length the proceedings before the special committee which had the question of redistribution under consideration. He said that while the House had laid down the principle of adhering to county boundary lines, it did not go far enough, and other general rules should have been adopted. 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



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

rio. He was a lecturer at the Toronto Law School with the present Chief Justice Moss and Sir William Mulcck, and was very highly esteemed by the

student body. The subject of Mr. Ewart's address was the independence of the judiciary. To put it bluntly, Mr. Ewart believes that judges ought not to accept jobs from governments, nor passes from railway companies. He refers to the Gamey-Stratton case in Ontario. He dissociates himself from the attacks on the judges, but he says: "We must not wonder that the general public, and particularly strong Conservatives, are not so generous, and that these judges have been attacked and condemned not only in the press but in the legislature and upon public platforms. To a lover of his profession, this is, I say, inauspicious and disquieting." He refers also to the appointment of Judge Britton, a strong political partisan, to be an umpire in a political dispute in the Yukon. Then he says:

"Now that you are Mr. Justice Perdue, you will be approached by the railway companies, and will be offered free transportation over their lines of railway. It is my belief that you will refuse all such degrading offers. If it be asked whether I think government jobs and railway passes influence judges, I reply that human nature is weak, that motive and mental influence work subtly, and their operations work subtly, and their operations are much more easily discerned by onlockers than by the one affected; that such things usually do produce a frame of mind favorable to the donors, and that I myself, with all my innate and trained respect (reverence I would almost say) for the bench, cannot sometimes restrain bench is not equivalent to inocula-tion against the feelings of grati-tude for past favors or pleasing an-ticipation of those to come."

The statement will be made public to-morrow. Vice-President Sanborn to-day stated that counsel for the protesting stockholders had received the information they desired. Counsel for the company declared that the attorney for the stockholders, when he visited the office to examine the header. examine the books, was given all the facts he wanted. He asserted also that the corporation books had been re-moved from this city to Canada, four months ago, when the general offices of the company were transferred from Philadelphia to Sault Ste. 
