





Writing to Wallace's Farmer, a United States agricultural paper of recognized reputation, one of its correspendents says that in certain parts of Ohio tens of thousands of bushels of potatoes will be wasted because the price offered-ten cents a bushel-will not pay the cost of handling them: Yet only twenty miles distant 60 cents a bushel is being paid and a little further away much higher prices obtain The same story is told in other states. while the fruit districts complain bitterly of losses caused by inability to reach waiting markets. Southern newspapers and growers lay the blame for this wilful waste on the railroads and ask where redress can be found. Here in Canada this identical grievance prevails in many parts owing to the insufficiency of distributing facilities and the high rates charged for freight service. In countries with public ownership and operation of railroads the needs of farmers and fruit growers meet with more consideration and the roads are administered for the general good of the community.



British Columbia, he said, took it as a great compliment that its capital was selected for the meeting place of such a

selected for the meeting place of such a body of representative men. In his travels thru the province he was constantly brought into touch with Methodists. They were good, clean, decent and straight-living citizens, and he believed that the same characteristics prevailed in the church thruout the Dominion.

As an educational factor, they were proving of immense influence. Wherever Methodists were round, there also were found good Cenadians. In touching words he alluded to the loss Canada had sustained in the death of Dr. Potts and Dr. Sutherland.

The work of the general conference went far beyond the consideration of the mere tenets of Methodism. In the larger and nobler sense it was working for the good of Canada. 

There were from 50 to 100 gardeners affected, who could not afford to rent market stalls. They asked the privilege of selling from their wagons, as was done in other cities.

J. D. Evans, as a member of the county council when the toll fees were abolished, said the city was violating its agreement.

Property Commissioner Harris said that to grant the request would be un-fair to the hucksters who pay for stalls. He claimed that the city was not charging a market fee, and that the tollgates were not abolished to the end that the market fees would be done that the market fees would be done away with. He said the city's revenue would be reduced if the market gardeners were allowed to sell without restriction, and if the gardeners were allowed to do so butchers and others. should have the same privilege. SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH WEST LAND REGULATIONS.

A NY person who is the sole head of a a family, or any male over is years old, may homestead a quarter section of available Dominion land in Manifoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. The applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the district. Entry by proxy may be made at any agency, on certain conditions, by father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister of intending homestead-

Duties.—Six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres solely owned and occupied by him or by his father, mother, son daughter, brother or sister.

In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter-section alongside his homestead. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties—Must reside upon the homestead or pre-emption six months in each of six years from date of homestead entry (including the time required to earn homestead patent) and cultivate fifty acres extra.




