



NEWS FROM HAMILTON CITY. COMMITTEE OVERRULES CHIEF REINSTATES FIREMAN SEARLS

The Head of Hamilton's Fire Brigade Protested His Unfitness Would Be Gone If He Was Censured, the Committee Blundered Ahead.

Hamilton, Nov. 9.—(Special).—A most glaring example of the way in which the committee of the fire department overruled the chief of the fire department, Chief Atchison, in the reinstatement of a fireman who has been a member of the department for only ten months, and who has been charged, some of them very serious, registered against him. For this chief was censured, while the committee turned around and reinstated Searls, reducing the penalty fixed by the chief to only ten days' pay, and his days off for only one month. The chief pressed in vain for more severe punishment. He said he was willing to give the reinstatement to allow Searls to hand in his resignation, but he would not have him on the department, but the committee overruled him.

The charges against Searls are being so drunk that he had to be ordered, for his own safety, to leave the department; for being drunk on duty; for sleeping on watch; for being late, and for insubordination. The chief was willing to overlook everything but the charge of insubordination, but Searls would not accept of this. He said that he would not accept of this, but instead of taking this position an alarm was sounded, jumped into the water, and the steamer was left another day.

"My usefulness as chief of the department," protested the big chief at this evening's meeting of the committee, but in the face of the Alderman, seconded by Ald. Fearnside, moved that Searls be given another chance. The committee, however, refused to do so. The fact that another fireman, who had been reinstated, Ald. Kingdon voted for the motion, and it was carried. The chief of the department, who was present, was very angry, and he said that he would not accept of this, but instead of taking this position an alarm was sounded, jumped into the water, and the steamer was left another day.

Many of these announcements were apocryphal, but some of them were true, being the result of a leak in the code of the boats, which were on their way to the Neva. If it were possible for the Russian fleet to enter the English Channel, it would be a disaster to the British fleet.

These statements are merely prefatory to the significant facts that reach the public by cable from Paris. They come from a distinguished Russian gentleman who recently returned from a long sojourn in the imperial city of St. Petersburg.
