

LEADER IN ANTI-EVOLUTION

Famed as Orator — Three Times Nominated for U. S. Presidency.

DAYTON, Tenn., July 26.-William Jennings Bryan was discovered dead in bed here this afternoon by a servant. He had retired to his room in the early afternoon for a nap and was found dead at 4.30 o'clock. Mr. Bryan was born in 1860 and was 65 years of age. Heart disease was given as the cause

Mr. Bryan was in the best of spirits and expressed himself as "feeling fine" when he retired shortly after lunch, about 1.80 o'clock. He had attended services at the Southern Methodist Episcopal Church before lunch and had partaken of a heavy meal before retiring to his room.

William Jennings Bryan "died this afternoon in sleep," said a telegram received sent to Ben. G. Davis, former secretary to Mr. Bryan at Washing-

ton by Mrs. Bryan,

The telegram added that the body would be buried in Arlington National

Cemetery.

The Bryans were stopping at the residence of Richard Rogers, and it is understood that no one was at the house at the time of his death but two servants and Mrs. Bryan.
