



TOO MUCH TIMBER

Ottawa, Nov. 6—The matter of an embargo on exports of Canadian pulpwood is not the most important question before the Royal Commission, investigating the pulp and paper industry, said Elwood Wilson, of Laurentide, Que., giving evidence before that body. He believed that forest management and conservation was the most important pending question before the Dominion today. Furthermore, Mr. Wilson contended, the question was one for Canada alone to solve.

He said that opinion was becoming prevalent that United States paper concerns were so interested in the matter that they were attempting to override the work of the commission.

The United States had wasted their own timber resources he averred, and there was no reason why they should be allowed to take advantage of those of the Domirion. Canada was already over-cutting its timber every year and unless better methods of conservation were adopted, the Dominion forests would not lend themselves to an expansion of the output.
