



Insane jealousy because of his wife's beauty was the only motive her mother and father could offer to investigating officials. They said Scott loved his wife deeply and treated her perfectly, but that he could not bear even the faintest hint of admiration for her from any other man. They told that not long ago the couple were in a Manhattan department store. The wife was buying ribbon, and Scott, waiting near, heard a passing man remark to another:

"There is an unusually beautiful woman."

man."

Their son-in-law was so enraged, they said, he started a fight with the two men and caused such a disturbance his wife threatened never to appear in public with him again unless he would promise to act sensibly.

Sergeant Francis McGarvey of the state police, District-Attorney Morton E. Lexow and Sheriff Al Merritt could find no more tangible motive for Scott's acts, but are continuing their investigation. They have little hope of learning anything material unless Mrs. Scott recovers. Tonight she still is unconscious and under the constant care in her home of Dr. S. W. S. Toms of Nyack.

Scott had started for New York, where, according to Mr. Cornell, he was employed as assistant manager by Kregg & Co., paper dealers, with Mr. and Mrs. Cornell, who were going on a shopping tour. He left them at the station, saying he had forgotten his commutation ticket. They are convinced that he really went back to kill his wife and that he called her downtsairs that he might get his pistol from the bureau drawer unseen and thus encounter no resistance. Had he really gone back for the ticket, they say, he would have called to his wife to bring it down to him, instead of calling her down and then going up for it himself while she waited below.

The Cornells heard the back door slam as they returned in the evening. Upstairs they found the twins in bed and the wife, unconscious, in another. Scott had taken some gauze from a medicine chest and applied it to the wound, which extended around the ribs, the bullet coming out in front.

After Dr. Toms arrived Mrs. Scott revived long enough to tell her story. She said she thought she heard a shot in the woods just as her mother and father came home, as she was conscious then for a moment.

Only the prompt measures taken by the United States Public Health Service against these animals prevented disastrous epidemic of plague in San Francisco, Seattle and Hawaiii in 1909, in Porto Rico in 1912, and in New Orleans in 1914.

"The economic loss due to rats is asounding. No extensive or exact statistics on the subject are available, but surveys of conditions existing in a few of the older cities of the United States show that losses due to rats are almost in exact ratio to the populations. In rural districts the losses are much greater in proportion to inhabitants than in cities.

"Assuming that there are in the

than in cities.

"Assuming that there are in the United States only as many rats as people, and that each rat in a year destroys property valued at \$2, the total yearly damage is about \$200,000,000. To this must be added the expense of fighting rats, including the large sums paid for traps and poisons, the keep of dogs and cats and the labor involved. In addition the loss of human efficiency due to diseases dissemnnated by the rat should be considered.

"Civilization and science have by no means spoken their last word about the means of combating this greatest plague of the human race. A building can be made ratproof—why not a farmstead, a street, a village, a city or a seaport? If rats cannot be exterminated they at least can be repressed in this country, and at the same time effective barriers can be erected against the landing of fresh hordes. Up to the present time, however, few efforts have been made to find out the way, or even to ap-
