PERMITS ISSUED

Post a few weeks ago, the total of building permits issued in Canadian cities in 1919 was more than double the amount ssued during the preceding year, and

reached a value of more than \$75,000,000. The biggest part of the increase came from cities in Eastern Canada, where the alue of building permits issued during he year totalled more than \$60,000.000, in increase of \$32,000,000 over the figures

The most active city in Canada during the past year, from the standpoint of building, was Toronto, where permits totalled \$19,819,436, an increase for the year of \$11,284,105. Other cities that were well up in the list were:

Montreal's figures for December showed a substantial increase over the previous year's totals, and building permits to the value of \$658,000 were issued, as again t \$176,000 in the previous December. Other active building centres in December were Halifax, Brantford, Kingston, London, St. Thomas, Windsor, Winnipeg and Victoria.

It is noticeable that, during the year that closed on December 31, 1919, the majority of the permits issued in nearly every city in the country were for dwelling houses. Of course, all the cities, and especially the industrial centres, had a number of large buildings erected during the year, but the dwelling houses, and, it may be added, private garages, were in the preponderance.

During December, the largest permit issued was for the Western University Medical School, to cost \$300,000, which will be erected in London, Ontario. London also has a factory for the McClary Manufacturing Company, which will cost \$40,000. A factory is being erected in Hamilton for the Carr Fastener Company, to cost \$75,000. Kingston is building a brick school, to cost \$112,000. Halifax's largest permit in December was for the Tabernacle church, to cost \$68,000. St. Thomas is building a \$63,000 school.

CHAIN STORES FOR CANADA.

Consul Felix Johnson, at Kingston, Ontario, has reported that a chain of stores following the policy of the five, ten and fifteen cent stores at present in existence are about to be opened up in Canada. The stores will be known as the S. Steel Company, Limited.

The plan is to start a chain of one hundred stores in Canada. They are to be located in cities of over 6,000 population. As far as can be learned, no locations have yet been purchased, but it is understood that this work is in hand, and the first stores will in all probability be opened early in the spring, and it is expected that before the close of the year fully forty stores will be in operation. The organization at present is busily arranging for supplies. The new organization opens with a five-cent to a dollar margin.

There will be a cafeteria in connection with all the stores, and it is the intention to sell a few lines, such as coffee and tea, in connection with the cafeteria.


KILLED AT HAMPSTEAD.

Majority Have Grievances. "A great deal of discontent exists for various reasons," Colonel Carmichael states in his report. "The majority of settlers have grievances of one kind or another. The land is very difficult to clear, as it is densely wooded and covered sometimes to a depth of eighteen inches with moss. The timber is small, averaging about eight inches in diameter, and is not all suitable for pulpwood. When cut down brush and moss must be burned and the ground stumped. This last is a very slow, expensive process, as some of the stumps have to be blown out. Some pieces of land have cost as much as \$150 an acre to clear. The houses built for the settlers proved very expensive, and in this connection a promise seems to have been made by Mr. Grigg (deputy minister of lands and forests) last October that a qualified valuator would be sent up to make an estimate of material and labor involved in the construction of any house over which there was any dispute, and an adjustment made. The only promise I made while there was that I would insist on that promise being kept. "The system of loaning horses and implements to settlers, seemingly, cannot be carried on in such a manner as to satisfy the settler and the department." "There are several complaints made
