It has been adopted universally by commercial egg handlers and is the basis upon which federal laws and regulations of interstate commerce and food handling are enforced in the United States. Millions of eggs are candled in downtown New York every year, not always to the advantage of the consumer, perhaps, but surely to the benefit of the seller.

benefit of the seller. In an effort to help the egg producer and country handler to comply with gov-ernment requirements and to give them knowledge by which they may assure themselves of fair dealing when their shipments reach market the United States Department of Agriculture has prenared a set of instructions for the prepared a set of instructions for the novice. Professional egg candlers handle eggs with almost lightning rapidity and rarely make an error of judgment, so that commercial candling costs only a triffe per case. But the novice can soon the per case. But the novice can soon do the work with a fair degree of facil-ity. The department's instructions are so complete and the apparatus suggest-ed is so simple that any housewife may candle the dozen eggs the grocer delivers in a few minutes and send them back unbroken if there are not actended oken if they are not up to standard

The process, in simple terms, is to hold an egg before a shaded light in a dark room, and by noting certain char-acteristics seen through the semitranspar-ent shell to determine its edible qualities. Persons with only a few eggs to handle

Persons with only a few eggs to handle. may improvise a candler by placing a store-pipe or closed box over a light, cut-ting a small hole in the pipe, level with the light. The egg is held in a slant-ing position at the opening. It is twisted a few times to the right and left and then from end to end, so that the entire contents may be visible. Care should be taken that the fingers or hand do not conceal small bleen inshes, which otherwise would be disclosed by the light. The beginner should study carefully the gen-eral formation of an egg, as this detailed movie for an under-standing of the markings that indicate age. The volk ranges in color from light

The yolk of a stale egg is seen more plainly than that of the fresh egg. yolk is slightly above the centre in the large end of the egg. As the egg becomes stale the yolk floats higher and nearer The start of incubation in a fertile egg The start of incubation in a fertile egg may be detected by a reddish glow sur-rounding the germinal spot. Such eggs, although considered edible, are not grad-ed as first class. This reddish glow is entirely different from the so-called blood ring, which indicates that the egg is un-fit for food.

Where there is any doubt as to an egg's fitness for food the candler should reject it as dangerous to health.
