



CANADA IN LONDON (Times' Special Correspondence)


London, Sept. 4—Without exaggeration the Savoy Hotel, one of London's renowned social centres, bore more resemblance yesterday morning to a military headquarters than to a tourist rendezvous. Colonel Sam Hughes and the Canadian officers accompanying him are staying there, busy mapping out their rampaign so that no time shall be wasted.

It is idle repetition to say Colonel Hughes is a popular figure here, but it must be said that the popular imagination has been touched at the development of his scheme for the co-operation of the Canadian and home forces. Lord Brooke took the first opportunity of renewing his friendship with Colonel Hughes, and the officers had breakfast with him today. The large room of the suite was filled with military men and representatives of the War Office who flowed out into the corridor. 


