

But often times your counselors are quite unconscious that they are doing this. It is simply that by your desire to have them think a certain thing you unintentionally hypnotize them into your way of thinking.

The desire may be subconscious with you. You may not even think you know what you want to do. And the influence you exercise may not be recognized by them, but that is what happens just the same, and one should take it into account in reckoning the value of advise. This giving advice is a queer business anyway. People go about it with such

extraordinary irresponsibility.
You know the old riddle "What is it that everybody likes to give and nobody cares to take" and its answer "Advice."

Isn't strange that we can feel that way about it?

Suppose you give a piece of advice about a comparatively small matter—whether your friend shall go to this place or that for her summer vacation, for in-Suppose she takes your advice and goes to Camp R. instead of Hotel M. Very well. At Camp R. she meets a man who falls desperately in love with her. Her parents dislike him and violently oppose the match. They send for a favorite sister to come and argue with her. Sir Francis Bacon's fine statue, by F. W. In this conection it is well to recall that New Zealand has already erected a monument to Sir Francis Bacon, popularly but erroneously known as "the great Lord Bacon," in recognition of his services, not in writing the works of Shakespeare, as some people allege, but for inventing that method of preserving meat by the frozen process to which New Zealand, like Argentina, owes so much of her prosperity.

It seems that Sir Francis was not only the pioneer of the freezing process, but actually brought about his death by his enthusiasm in experimenting with the notion. Driving in Highate one day, he left his carriage to collect some snow with which to stuff a fowl, by way of noting the effect of cold on the preservation of its flesh. In doing this he brought on an attack of bronchitis, to which he succumbed in a few days.

It has taken nearly three centuries for the idea to work out to the practical benefit of the United States. Argentina and Australia. But, late as it is, the leaders of the great frozen meat industry of the United States might alo worse than follow the example of New Zealand, and erect, proferably in Chicago, a statue to the man who, while he may not have written Shakespeare's works, certainly did invent the method of preserving meat by means of cold.

Incidentally, it may be stated that it

Incidentally, it may be stated that it is incorrect to speak of this philosopher, lawyer, statesman, and inventor, as "Lord Bacon;" many of his English biographers, even, being guilty of this mistake. His correct designation was "Sir Francis Bacon;" after which he became Lord Verulam, and he died as Viscount St. Albans. But he was never "Lord Bacon."

How he came to be styled thus, was as follows: While still a mere knight, he was appointed to the dignity of lord keeper of the great seal, which caused him to be addressed as "My Lord," although not a peer of the realm. In fact, he used to be known in those days as "Lord Keeper Bacon." At that epoch, the offices of the keeper of the great seal, and of the lord high chancellor, were separate. Twelve months after being appointed lord keeper of the great seal, he was elevated to the woolsack as lord high chancellor, and at the same time was created







Reporting of living cases of tuberculosis is now required by law or health regulation in twenty-five of the United States, while in twenty-eight states and territories no provision whatever is made for keeping record of cases of this infectious disease, according to a statement published by the National Association for the Study and Prevention of Tuberculosis in its official organ, the Journal of the Outdoor Life for June.

Connecticut, District of Columbia, Kansas, Maine, Maryland, Michigan, Mississippi, New Jersey, New York, Rhode Island and Vermont, are placed in the honor class as having laws warch provide specifically for the reporting of tuberculosis and which make provision for the proper registration of living cases of this disease. In fourteen other states, laws or regulations of the state boards of health require that tuberculosis be reported simply as one of a list of infectious diseases. THE CITY IS CLEANER. REPORT INSPECTORS OF HEALTH BOARD

First Round Results In Finding **Encouraging Condition—Better** Than Has Been For Years

The reports being presented daily at the offices of the board of health concerning the condition in household and business places about the city are decidedly encouraging, and are to the effect that the city is cleaner as regards its back yards, cellars, etc., than has been the case for many years. Some of the eight officials who were appointed inspectors and who went on duty about June 1, have completed their first inspection, and are now started on their second, which should be completed in shorter time.

On the first round they are expected to make forty inspections each day, while on their last forty-with are demanded of them. It is on the second trip that reports are made to court if the regulations as to the sanitary conditions are not complied with, but the inspectors anticipate very little, if any, trouble of this kind this year, as few citizens were complained of


