





Says Lack of Holiness in Lives of Christians is Chief Obstacle

NEW YORK, Dec. 16—Bishop Will-liam T. Manning, urging the immediate reunion of Christianity in an article iin the January "Forum," asserted that if all Christians were "truly converted the way to unity would speedily be found."

"The time has come," wrote the Protestant Episcopal diocesan of New York, "for the churches to repent of their schisms and divisions and to find the way to fellowship and reunion.

WOULD END DIVISIONS. "It is time for Christians of all names, Catholics and Protestants, to resolve that the present situation shall not continue, but that through the promised help of the Holy Spirit the way shall be found for the healing of our divisions and for the manifestation to the world of our fellowship in Jesus Christ."

Jesus Christ."

The Bishop's article, described in a foreword as a preface to a series of statements by eminent religionists to run throughout 1926, insists that a reunited church is needed to oppose "the spirit of paganism now evident in our literature, in our art and in the present lack of high standards in our social life."

"What is needed now," he says, "is a reunited church so faithful to the Gospel, so free in the exercise of Christian liberty, so filled with the spirit of love and fellowship that in it the presence and glory of Christ shall be made manifest. We shall find the way to when he has able to surmount

of Christian truth, but by emphasis on Christian brotherhood.

"What we all need is closer fellowship with Christ. This is the path which will lead to unity. It is lack of holiness in the lives of Christians which is the chief obstacle to the unity of the church. If all of us were truly converted to Christ the way to unity would speedily be found."

if you will, to provide an "artificial means" by which the ports of Quebec Bishop Manning of New Halifax and Saint John would be brought closer to the grain fields of Canada. He said further:

"Personally, I believe that the lack of proper facilities at Montreal has a great deal to do with the situation. I think the Montreal Harmission should rush the erection of new elevators as much as possible. There has been congestion in the wheat movement at Montreal all season. This is partly responsible for the shipping of Canadian wheat via New York. But, there are times when a good deal of Canadian wheat will naturally go by Buffalo and New York, and the prob-lem should be studied as to whether or not this is detrimental to Canada and what measures should be taken to meet it, before hasty or drastic solutions are attempted."

. Mr. Campbell suggests several things in the latter part of his remarks:

(1) That he has not yet awakened to the fact that the Maritime Provinces demand and insist upon getting their share of the wheat transportation of this country.

(2) That he is apparently of the opinion that Montreal is the extreme eastern port of Canada. (3) That he is not convinced as the leaders of the best thinking

(4) That he demands "Careful consideration before hasty or drastic solutions are attempted."





V. O. N. Superintendent Reports on Work in Saint John

Large Amount of Child Welfare Work Being Done Calls For More Help

Miss Mary L. Boswell, superintendent of the Victorian Order of Nurses for Eastern Canada, in reporting to the local V. O. N. board on the work of the nurses here recommended that the services of an additional nurse he secured because of the large amount of child welfare work done. She found that to date in 1925 the nurses had 660 babies on their register, exclusive of babies in West Saint John, and had made 3,852 visits to infants.

The child welfare work week, she said, was done in addition to the other duties of nursing the sick, and activities in connection with the prevention of disease and the promotion of health. The child welfare work involved the investigation of all deaths of infants under one year and the registering of all births that were not registered by some one else. All of this work was being carried out by the Victorian Order Nurses in the city as they, being in the field, had appeared to be the logical persons to do it.
