

SAFEGUARDING AT SAINT JOHN

Weekly Inspection for Fire Hazards Until Sprinklers Installed

Fire Marshal to Carry Out Work—Report Submitted on First Visit

A weekly inspection, by the fire marshal, of the terminal facilities in West Saint John, both of the city and Federal Government, until such time as both are protected by sprinklers, has been ordered by the New Brunswick Fire Prevention Board.

On that afternoon the chairman of the board, with two other members and the marshal made a thorough inspection of the city and Government premises, the object of their visit being to see that every body around the sheds was doing his best to prevent fires, and to inspect the fire fighting appliances in the sheds.

One of the fire hazards which they reported was potato cars which were not equipped with standard heaters and from one of which a fire started last year.

BISHOP'S CHURCHES
HEAL DIVISIONS

Bishop Manning of New York Writes of Re-union

Says Lack of Holiness in Lives of Christians is Chief Obstacle

NEW YORK, Dec. 16.—Bishop William T. Manning, urging the immediate re-union of Christianity in an article in the January "Forum," asserted that if all Christians were "truly converted" the way to unity would speedily be found.

"The time has come," wrote the Protestant Episcopal bishop of New York, "for the churches to repent of their schisms and divisions and to find the way to fellowship and re-union."

WOULD END DIVISIONS.
"It is time for Christians of all names, Catholics and Protestants, to resolve that the present situation shall not continue, but that through the promised help of the Holy Spirit the way shall be found for the healing of our divisions and for the manifestation to the world of our fellowship in Jesus Christ."

The Bishop's article, described in a foreword as a preface to a series of statements by eminent religious leaders throughout 1926, insists that a reunited church is needed to oppose "the spirit of paganism now evident in our literature, in our art and in the present lack of high standards in our social life."

NOT BY COMPROMISES.
"What is needed now," he says, "is a reunited church so faithful to the Gospel, so free in the exercise of Christian liberty, so filled with the spirit of love and fellowship that in its presence and glory of Christ shall be made manifest. We shall find the way to union not by surrender or compromise of Christian truth, but by emphasis on Christian brotherhood."

"What we all need is a closer fellowship with Christ. This is the path which will lead to unity. It is lack of holiness in the lives of Christians which is the chief obstacle to the unity of the church. If all of us were truly converted to Christ the way to unity would speedily be found."

Listing the unifying forces in Christendom, Dr. Manning says "the things which unite us are greater than the things which divide us."

In beginning, the Bishop declared the world never stood so ready as now to receive Christ's message since He came to earth. But despite the fact that it "has the greatest opportunity in all its history," he adds, "the church stands with her life enfeebled, her witness weakened, her message in part discredited by her own differences and divisions."

"The Forum" announces that Bishop Manning's article will be followed in our issue by G. K. Chesterton, convert to Roman Catholicism.

DECLARES T. B. NOT RESULT OF WAR GAS

Cases Among Those Gassed Not so Numerous as in Those Untouched

WASHINGTON, Dec. 16.—Armed with a mass of statistics and scientific data, the Army Chemical Warfare Service has launched a campaign to slay a ghost that came back with the army from France.

This spectre that lingers in the minds of thousands of those who got a whiff of gas "over there," is the belief that they fall some day victims to tuberculosis.

Major Gen. Amos Fries, chief of the Chemical Warfare Service, reports that exhaustive scientific investigation during and since the war has failed to disclose any case whatever of evil after effects of gassing.

GIVES TRAVELOGUE

A. M. Gregg Addresses Carleton Society on "Trip Across Canada"

The members of the Young People's Society of the West Saint John Kirk greatly enjoyed an interesting travelogue entitled "A Trip Across Canada" which was given last night by A. M. Gregg, general secretary of the Y. M. C. A., in the Kirk rooms and illustrated with a large number of lantern slides.

Rev. W. McN. Matthews, the minister, presided and extended to Mr. Gregg the society's thanks. The young ladies of the society sold candy during the intermission.

Fund Started For Widow Of "Wall Street Bishop"

NEW YORK, Dec. 16.—A fund that will be used for the benefit of the widow of the Rev. William Wilkinson, known as the "Bishop of Wall Street," has been started by leading members of the New York Stock Exchange and downtown bankers. Subscriptions taken in small contributions of \$5 and \$10 netted the fund \$1,400, and it is expected others will care to contribute.

National Interest Must Rise Above Little Canadianism

(Continued from Page 1)

If you will, to provide an "artificial means" by which the ports of Quebec, Halifax and Saint John would be brought closer to the grain fields of Canada. He said further:

"Personally, I believe that the lack of proper facilities at Montreal has a great deal to do with the situation. I think the Montreal Harbor Commission should rush the erection of new elevators as much as possible. There has been congestion in the wheat movement at Montreal all season. This is partly responsible for the shipping of Canadian wheat via New York. But, there are times when a good deal of Canadian wheat will naturally go by Buffalo and New York, and the problem should be studied as to whether or not this is detrimental to Canada and what measures should be taken to meet it, before hasty or drastic solutions are attempted."

Mr. Campbell suggests several things in the latter part of his remarks:

(1) That he has not yet awakened to the fact that the Maritime Provinces demand and insist upon getting their share of the wheat transportation of this country.

(2) That he is apparently of the opinion that Montreal is the extreme eastern port of Canada.

(3) That he is not convinced as the leaders of the best thinking Canadians were some twenty-three years ago that the movement of Canadian grain through American ports is detrimental to Canadian interests.

(4) That he demands "careful consideration before hasty or drastic solutions are attempted."

May we point out to Mr. Campbell that the ports of Quebec, Saint John and Halifax are equipped for carrying grain, and that the port of Vancouver has extensive grain handling facilities.

Between the use of United States ports and the ports of Quebec, Saint John, Halifax and Vancouver there can be absolutely no question as to which should be used from a truly Canadian standpoint.

We would also remind Mr. Campbell that since Confederation every effort has been made to consider this question of grain transportation "before hasty or drastic solutions are attempted."

Twenty-three years ago, Canada was impressed with the need of consideration for this question and Parliament determined that so far as it was concerned the day had passed when United States ports should be preferred to Canadian ports.

Mr. Campbell is the manager of a concern which sells tens of thousands of dollars worth of goods, the output of his mills, in the Maritime Provinces.

When he has something to sell for his concern, Mr. Campbell seems to be able to surmount geographical obstacles.

He sells flour in the Maritime Provinces which is artificially protected to the tune of 50 cents a barrel on every sale made to the people of New Brunswick, Nova Scotia and Prince Edward Island.

Mr. Campbell quite willingly submits to the "artificial means" through which his flour is protected against competing brands in the United States.

However, he seems to be very much exercised when the Maritime Provinces ask that the railway employees of the Canadian Pacific and Canadian National Railways operating from Montreal east should have that same share of protection that his flour enjoys.

He deplores any suggestion of "artificial means" to protect the waterfront workers of the City of Quebec, the City of Saint John, the City of Halifax or the City of Vancouver to whom he sells flour.

MR. CAMPBELL should realize that it is impossible for his company to sell flour to similar workers in the United States and that the markets for his products will be enhanced to the extent that additional Canadian labor is employed in handling Canadian wheat.

The time has come in this country when the vast majority of thinking men realize that Canada must insist upon deriving every advantage from the employment of the Canadian National Railways in handling Canadian grains.

We would also remind Mr. Campbell that the very railways, the welfare of which he apparently has in mind when he suggests delay and caution in a few years ago that the milling in transit rate on grains should be increased.

The claim of the railway companies was that the artificial rate which the milling concerns in this country enjoy is not sufficiently high to meet the cost of the service given.

Yet, we find Mr. Campbell is willing to permit this imposition of this example of "artificial means" to be imposed upon the people of the country and we take it that the Maritime Province shippers pay their share of the deficit which the railways insist is incurred through giving special privileges to the milling industries of this country.

MAY we suggest to Mr. Campbell and those who think with him, that if it is proper for his company to accept a protection of 50 cents a barrel on flour as against the product of the United States and to permit railway companies to lose money in giving them a special rate through its milling in transit tariff, that it is equally proper that Canadian ports should receive their fair share of protection along with Mr. Campbell's concern.

If United States interests are to govern this country the sooner Canadians recognize the situation the better.

If Mr. Campbell wants to investigate an instance in which "artificial means" have been employed to the advantage of Canadian ports, let him enquire into the workings of the British preference.

Under that branch of the Canadian tariff, a ten per cent additional preference is given to British goods entering Canada, through Canadian ports.

\$100,000 STILL EXPLODES ON FARM

Blazing Alcohol Showers Nearby Building—Rages Nearly All Day

HICKSVILLE, L. I., Dec. 16.—A \$100,000 distilling plant, which had been operating for two months in a large barn near here, exploded with terrific force. The fire which followed destroyed the barn, endangered other buildings nearby and destroyed a corn crib on a neighboring farm. It is not known whether lives were lost, and so complete was the destruction that it may be impossible to tell.

Investigators entered the smouldering ruins tonight and discovered what was left of six 100-gallon stills. Beneath a great mass of twisted and molten copper they found evidence that the operators had put in a permanent plant. Reinforced concrete pits eight feet deep housed the lower parts of the stills, and the copper alone is estimated as worth several thousand dollars.

The Federal authorities were notified of the finding of the stills and with county detectives examined the ruins thoroughly. They found that 500 five-gallon cans of alcohol had escaped destruction. There was evidence that more had been consumed in the fire.

Mr. Zero Opens "Hut No. 2" in New York

NEW YORK, Dec. 16.—"Mr. Zero," in private life Urban Ledoux, has started his winter campaign by opening "Hut No. 2" at 5 Chrystie street. Like "Hut No. 1," it is designed to feed the jobless at five cents a meal. A chilling 40-mile wind filled the new "hut" with customers.

"Mr. Zero" announced that he had leased a building at 23 Bowersy street, and would start renovating it for use as a lodging house, where the jobless may sleep for ten cents a night. This establishment will be called the Hotel Comrade.

Speeder Is Sentenced To Psychology Clinic

TOLEDO, Dec. 16.—Municipal Judge Homer Ramey has delivered one of the most unusual sentences in the history of Toledo courts. He sentenced Carl Kilbortz, a Monroe, Mich., banker, to an "indefinite term" as a specimen for study by the University of Toledo psychology class.

Kilbortz ran amuck in his automobile, wrecking two other cars and a house. He paid all the damages. Judge Ramey's decision was reached after a conference with the banker and his attorney and Dr. A. W. Tretmann, of the university.





NORMAL SCHOOL LOANS STOPPED

N. B. Board of Education Ends Financial Help to Prospective Teachers

\$500 Increase to School Inspectors is Reduced to \$300

FREDERICTON, Dec. 15.—The Board of Education met today and dealt with a number of matters. It was decided that after the present school year no further loans be granted to student teachers at the Provincial Normal School. The policy of loaning money to students at the Normal School was adopted several years ago when a scarcity of teachers existed. The situation has changed in recent years.

It also was decided to have the chief superintendent secure from the text book committee a recommendation for changes in certain text books to take effect July 1.

The text books affected are readers, health readers, geography, history, British and Canadian grammar and composition, high school arithmetic, high school physics, high school physiology and hygiene, high school botany, high school chemistry.

The board also had under consideration the increase in salary granted the inspectors of schools under order-in-council passed by the former government. The increase mentioned by that order-in-council was \$500 per year. The board today decided to grant an increase of \$300 for the present year.
