FIRST EDITION. A BATTLE FOUGHT.

THE HONORABLE REBELLION IN NOW PRACTICALLY ENDED.

President Bogras Forces Completely Victorious—General Sanchez Surrenders—A Barracks—The City Slightly Wrecked.

ST. JOHN, Nov. 15.—A special to the Herald from Fredericton, New Brunswick, says: President Bogras forces completely routed, the revolutionaries under General Sanchez at the capital yesterday.

The rebellion is thus practically ended. The city is slightly wrecked by shells, and the inhabitants in a state of great terror. The loss on both sides has been heavy. Sanchez and his men are surrounded in one of the barracks, which is being bombarded with solid shot.

His only chance of escape is to make a sortie. He does not do so, but will become a prisoner to the president, which means not only his death, but that of all his henchmen, and many prisoners. Barracks remained quiet throughout the night.
