The question was recently asked in an English newspaper: can five-pound notes be sold for a penny each? Memories of a very old story were revived by something that was done in the streets of London a short while ago. Most readers, it was remarked, had heard of the plate of sovereigns, at a penny apiece, offered for sale, some half-century ago, on London bridge. Unlike most stories of the kind, this happened to be a true one. Not so many days ago one could net even better value for two cents. for five-pound notes - \$25 were offered for sale at a penny each on London

It is needless to say that the per-formance was the result of a bet. The notes were offered in an appealing man-ner by an amateur peddler, in unner by an amateur peddler, in unkempt attire, for periods of about
seven minutes each between the hours
of 12 and 1 on Saturday afternoon at
each of these prominent points: Outside the Grand hotel, outside the Piccadilly hotel, and at the corner of
Tottenham Court road and Oxford
street. Unshaven, with a large tweed
cap cocked over one side of his head,
wearing a suit displaying an abundance of patches, and with boots which
had seen better days, this extraordinary peddler stood in the gutter with
\$500 worth of Bank of England notes
rustling in his outstretched hand.

The whole thing, he said, was the result of a wager he had with a friend a day or two before. They had been a day or two before. They had been discussing the story of the man who sold sovereigns on London bridge, and Hearn argued that the British public was one of the most skeptical and unspeculative in the world. He wagered that if he offered genuine 25 Bank of England notes at a penny a piece in the streets he should not sell one within twenty minutes. His friend took on the wager, and his only stipulation was that he should be allowed to disguise himself and stand where he liked to sell the notes. So he made up as a gutter peddler and went out with £5 notes to the value of £100.

The too-liberal merchant, poor fellow, was of unsound mind, and had adopted the unusual mode for the purpose of disposing of a little hoard which had accumulated in the savings bank. Up to the early forties there were very few pianos in Halifax. In the list of articles of furniture of fered for sale belonging to officers leaving the garrison, the piano, invariably of the make of a famous English manufacturer, was a prominent feature. In an auction sale of the effects of a certain officer "going home" there appeared a "piano violino." This singular article attacted much attention. It was most unique in its way.
