

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



CARRYING QUEBEC CARGOES TO MONTREAL

This is What Labor Troubles Have Done for Ancient Port

Freight Has to be Taken Back by Rail At Great Expense to Merchants

-Longshoremen Scarce MONTREAL, July 20.—It is now

week since the order to bring the Que-bec cargo to Montreal has been in bec cargo to Montreal has been in force, and the result is that about twelve hundred tons of cargo consigned to the ancient capital has been carried to Montreal on board shiu and transferred to Quebec by rail.

The Mourt Temple was the first boat to carry the Quebec freight to Montreal. She brought four hundred tons past that port and landed it here. Now, the Huron of the Donaldson line has brought three hundred tons of cargo to Montreal which will also have to be sent by rail to Quebec. ent by rail to Quebec.

The cause of this new order of things The cause of this new order of things is that the labor troubles have renched such a state in Quebec that it impossible to get sufficient longshowemen, and those offering demand night rate of wages. Indeed, the scale paid in Quebec is the highest at any port in Canada, higher than in Montrent.

"Labor troubles have been marked in Quebec for many years," said an importer, "and the reason that the old port does not now enjoy a larger share of the Atlantic shipping trade is due to the shortsightedness of those at the head of organized labor in Quebec years ago. Even now the wharf laears ago. Even now the wharf laborers are seeking further gains. However, the action of shippers in carrying the Quebec freight past that city may prove an effectual means of inducing the men to move more slowly. The effect on Quebec merchants will be rather severe, because the cost of re-handling and re-shipping will reach a considerable sum."
