MARINE ENGINEERS ON DECK.

OTTAWA, March 26.—F. S. Henning of Toronto, president of the Marine Engineers' Association, is in the city to present to Hon. 

CANADA'S PARLIAMENT.

(Continued from Page Three.)

He also asked that the opinion of the Dominion law officers should be given to parliament. He quoted from the British North America act showing that under its provisions Canada was defined as including New Brunswick, Nova Scotia, Quebec and Ontario. It had been urged that the law respecting redistribution in these four provinces prohibited any reduction in their representation unless the proportion which the number of the population of the province bore to the number of the aggregate population of the original Dominion was diminished by one-twentieth or upwards. If the claim had been advanced he thought it fair matter for enquiry that all information supplied by the provinces and do-minion officers should be laid on the

Mr. Borden did not see any reason for the change in front by the liberal party since 1899. They had in their redistribution bill of that year declared for the reference of the whole ques-tion to a court of judges, and if the principle was a good one then, it must be sound still. Apart from the change in referring the bill to a committee of the house instead of a judicial commission he saw little change from the measure previously introduced. Mr. Fitzpatrick promised to supply the information asked for and the bill was allowed to pass its first reading.

MR. COSTIGAN noved his home rule resolution. In bringing down his motion he was submitting a resolution on a matter which was engaging the attention of the whole world. He referred to his privilege in moving a similar resolution 20 years ago. He asked that Canada' support be given to secure for Ireland a fair share of the freedom and self-government enjoyed by Canadians. He lid not consider that the action of the British government in making an effort to solve the land question should stay the hand of Canadians from assisting towards the solution of a long vexed uestion. It was a problem which in terested all sections of the empire, and it would be well to strengthen the hands of the home authorities in ac cording Ireland more generous treat ment in the matter of autonomy.

MR. HACKETT seconded the motion, and strongly supported Home Rule. He was only give en an hour's notice that he would b expected to assume the role of seconder, and made a brief speech. Distribute the award, giving Nova Scotia \$2,000,000, and she would receive then merely as interest \$80,-000, or \$21,000 less than she is getting today, while New Brunswick would be receiving \$47,000 a year more. Under the same conditions New Brunswick might be disposed to take the same position as Nova Scotia. All we can do with the government is to press forward until we obtain the object we are striving for. We started out with the assurance that the province was entitled to \$2,000,000, and we intend to keep on till we get it, if there is any means of getting justice in this country.
