********** GOMPERS BEATS LEWIS BY HUGE MAJORITY

Machinists and Carpenters Only Two Unions to Cast a Solid Vote for Lewis

Denver, Colo., June 25.—By a vote of 25,022 to 12,324 Samuel Compers on Saturday deteated John L. Lewis, head of the United Miners of the United States for the presidency of the American Federation of Labor. Only two of the largest organizations cast a solid vote for Lewis, the Machinists' union and the United Brotherhood of Carpenters.

The Miners' delegation split their vote, giving Gompers 1,596 and Lewis 2,182, President Lewis declining to vote the 533 votes he held.

The railroad organizations which had been claimed almost solidly by Lewis supporters, split their votes, the two largest unions—the Electrical Workers and the Railway Carmen, casting their entire vote to Gompers.

The water powers in the Northern lide of the Laurentian Mountains give promise of untold wealth to generations yet unborn. The Hurricanaw, the Belle and the Abitibi are in the process of development.

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O'Brien a divisional point has had a rapid growth. It has been put on the map since 1916. It has now 12 saw mills and quite a large industrial population. In 1920, it turned out 18 million feet of lumber and 38,000 cords of pulp-wood. It is the dividing point for traffic; wood products produced West of this place go by the Temiskaming Rajiway to Toronto.

One of the big corporations along the line is Abitibi Pulp and Paper Company on the Iroquois Falls south of the lide. The Abitibi River flows North; the Laurentian heights of land separating it from the Ottawa River further South. Their output is taken by the B. & O. Railway, but their camps the form the Camp at Saw Bush, the company have provided its employees with a well equipped hospital. Opposite it is located huts of Indan trappers. Very few of them are seen along the line or at the Railway Stations. Observing no settlements were being made from Lorraine West to Cochrane, such as exist in Quebec, the writer, asked a local traveller the reason. He said the Abitibi Company had timber limits a mile each side of the track for seventy miles.

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Lake Abitible we leave Quebec and cross the boundary into Ontario. The tar on this point West, towards Algoma, Niphesing and Thunder Bay, a vast area of arable land exists—estimated at 20,000 square miles, awaiting the settler. The soil is clay, and clay loam, and drained by a multitude of rivers. Train and potatoes grow as far North as Jemes Bay. A forest growth of small timber, suitable for pulp-wood reaches far North. Many of the numerous rivers flowing North having a descent of from ten to twenty feet, will some day in the future be utilized for water powers. In fact there seems to be no end of the prospective water powers along this Northern sountry.

During four months of this year a colonization organization of the Canadian National Railway. has sent west, principally from Massachusetts, cover 1000 settlers of French descent, mostly adults, to occupy, in groups, wacant land along the Railway in (Western Ontario.

We reach Cochrane about supper time, and alight to take the train that comes up from Toronto on the Temiskaming Railway, which lands us at Winnipeg late the following afternoon. On this Railway are the Cobalt and by geologists, but as not one hundredth part of the formation is oxposed, the region corresponding to Cobalt, has scarcely yet been prospected. Confirmation of the extension of this ore belt north has been made by Messrs. LePage of Quebec, who are opening up some promising lodes.

From here to Hearst 130 miles is rescontized as a good settlement country. The Ontario Government has surveyed and opened 15 townships for settlement and some three or four thousand people have made homes for themselves there. Cochrane itself was burned out a year or two ago and while rebuilding has been commenced, it still presents a sorry appearance. On 16th July, 1916, a disastrous fire West of Upper Lake Abitibl swept the timber off a territory of over 50 square miles; occurring with an unfortunate loss of ilfe.

CONCILIATION BOARD REPORT **FAVORS CONTENTIONS OF WORKERS**

Recommendations Set Forth Continuance of Present Working Agreement Until 1922—Suggests Slight Reduction in Wages — Not Favorable to One-Man Car As Now Proposed - President Thomson's Comment.

The report of the Conclination Board, appointed to act in the dispute between the New Brunswick Power Company and Division. 663 of the Amalgamated Association of Street Railway and Electric Workers, was rereceived in this city Saturday. The report is an unanimous one, being signed by all three members of the board. The preliminary of the report deals with the causes calling for the turnishing of the board and the efforts put forth to bring the parties to the dispute into an amicable agreement. The report states that the board failed to get the parties into accord, and the hearing was started. At the close of the hearing another attempt was made by the board to get the parties to agree, but after a conference between the representatives of the two factions to the dispute, another failure was recorded. The report sets forth these grounds of dispute between the company and the employes:

First—As to duration of any agreement between the company and its employes, and as to changes in any such agreement.

Second—The wages to be paid by the company to its men.

Third—The operation of the One Man Car on its railway by the company.

The report then goes into a review of the evidence adduced at the hearing bearing upon the three contentious points. The board, after considering the statements made on either side, and the evidence adduced, and in the absence of any settlement between the parties, made its recommendations. Briefly, they are:

First—That the present working agreement be continued in force and effect until June 15, 1922, without change, except as to the schedule of wages in the said agreement.

Second—That, in view of the reduced coat of living, the wages of motormen and conductors be reduced from 55 cents to 52 cents, and motormen be given 5 cents extra on One Man Cars.

Third—If company operates One Man Car, that an electric power device be provided by which the rear emergency door may be opened quickly by the motorman, and that the present hand brakes on the proposed car be replaced by airbrakes.

The report then cites legislation showing what power the city has in the matter:

Two Sermons By Dean Owen

Rector of Christ Church Cathedral, Hamilton, Preached in City Yesterday.

Two eloquent sermons were preached yesterday by the Very Reverend Dean Owen, Rector of Christ Church Cathedral, Hamilton, Ontario, and Dean of Niagara. In the morning, before the united congregations of St. Paul's and St. John's (Stone) churches, Dean Owen spoke from the text "Blessed are they which do hunger and thirst after righteousness; for they shall be filled." Matthew 5-6.

In the evening, at Trinity Church, the text was "Blessed are the pure in heart; for they shall see God." Matthew 5-8. Rev. A Gabriel conducted the service. Dean Owen pointed out that purity of heart means to be absolutely straight, to be single-minded. Purity of heart is often narrowly defined. Many, who are pure in heart in a negative sense, are in great danger of never seeing God. While not for an instant minimising the sinfulness and hideousness of impurity in the accepted sense of the word, the preacher emphasized the lesson that Our Lord's contempt was against those who are proud, uncharitable, unkind and who made others unlappy unnecessarily. Our Lord denounced the attitude of the Pharisees. People may know no horror of these spiritual ills which shut out the vision of God and yet may consider themselves pure in heart.
