Ottawa, Jan. 31—A conference has been arranged between the department of railways and the Canadian Pacific railway to consider the application of the company for running rights over the Intercolonial between St. John and Halifax. It will take place about the middle of next week, probably Wednesday. The date has not yet been fixed. Hon. H. R. Emmerson, Mr. Butler and Mr. Pottinger will represent the Intercolonial St. Theorem.
