NOTES AND NEWS.

UNITED STATES.

The people of Boston are becoming uneasy and sleepless because the bell of the Old South has left off ringing at 8 o'clock in the evening. They don't know what it means.

Now we know all about it. A Baltimore clergyman writes to a friend, concerning the frequency of fires in Boston, that "the rapid whirl of events, the motion of the universe becoming accelerated, the Hub is evidently over-heated by friction hence the numerous conflagrations." What could be more satisfactory?

It is provocative of a little harsh satire to read in a paper of delicacy and betrayal of trust by a man recently crowned and just below, the statement of the person at his funeral that he "needed no special preparation" for death, but was "always ready," and the resolutions of various bodies extolling his virtues and his upright character.

Showers of replies are incidents of the weather in the West which are not noted by Old Prob. We are told of a shower of four-legged fish in Minnesota, six such long eel fish, and the other two, which are gills, fins and claws, all complete. The probability is that this fish is a Her, but the shower will be a heavy rain, and shall hear of it four times in the next month.

It is very inconsiderate in the friends of a man in a room, to pack him in and send him a hundred miles or so to attend his own funeral, without first ascertaining his inclination on the subject. Some thoughtless people in Toronto did this thing lately, and the poor fellow, though showing signs of life on his arrival, was so badly frozen that the funeral was postponed only for a day or two.

The Bangor, Me., mechanics are greatly indignant because a State Prison Agency has been established there for the sale of boots, shoes, carriages and harness manufactured by convicts; and a public meeting has been called to take action in the matter. The proposition is an embarrassing one. Prisoners must be employed and sent to the State to work the fruit of their industry except sell it at the best price in the best possible market. The fact is, that the convict men, doubtless, if the competition were greater; but the exceptional production of a few hundred pairs of boots, seriously to affect the wages of the great mass of mechanics.

One does not often read of a sudden and terrible restriction that which overtook, last week, a murderer in Sheshire, Conn. Michael Higgins, a farm laborer, on Saturday night stabbed fatally John O'Reilly. A search for Higgins, being instituted, his dead body was found in a room in the farmhouse. He had died of heart disease, as ascertained by examination. Menus arrested, indicted, arraigned, tried, convicted, sentenced and executed his almost simultaneous.

It hangings are impressive, here was a denunciation of the tragedy which upon many minds will be more impressed than the forty regular stragulations.

Is the mermaid a veritable being or a myth? We are happy to be able to state that a genuine specimen has been discovered at Cape Cod. A woman at Brewster, Mass., was strolling on the beach and encountered one of these interesting creatures which thus described: "The head of this object resembled that of a mermaid, and the rest of the body was of fish form. When first seen the lady became frightened, but the children, observing it, and throwing sand into its eyes, whereupon it uttered cries like those of a child and began rolling over and over in the water and darted off into the sea, keeping its head above the surface and resembling in every manner a child swimming." In south this is a strange creature.

Forty-three years ago Geo. Perry, a slave in Mason County, Ky., married Vinn Johnson, also a slave in a neighboring county. Soon after he made good his escape to Canada, but when the pursuit was over returned and secured his wife. He got her at first in California, when they were overtaken, and she was carried back. Years passed, and hearing nothing of her husband, the married agent and in process of time became a widow. In 1863 she became free and removed to Ripley, Ohio. Meeting her husband, she had lived in Canada until after the war, and then went to Louisiana to teach school. By a persistent correspondence, once he finally found out where she was, he left her, and a few days ago they were reunited amid the rejoicing of their friends and countrymen.

GENERAL.

There seems to have been a growth of shoddy artifice in Germany, springing out of fat contracts during the late war. A suit was lately heard at Leipzig in which the agent of a contractor received 10,000 thalers as a 10 per cent. commission earned in a fortnight. The contractor's profits on the business managed by this one of several agents was 100,000 thalers in the period of two weeks.

A Democratic newspaper in London is very savage about the honors paid to the Shah, and declares that only a monkey in the Zoological gardens has exhibited a respite of manliness and independence. When the Shah attempted to poke this animal with a stick, the indignant creature seized it, and grinded indignantly at the Majesty of Persia. "And this," philosophizes our newspaper, "shows how superior monkeys are to Mayors. Had Shah kicked one of the latter, all the Mayors in the kingdom would have envied him the distinction, and regretted that their persons had not been honored by a similar infliction."

Most of the unpleasant characters in history have been whitewashed—the Eighth Henry, Bloody Mary, and Richard the Third. Now it is Nero's turn, for M. Recan has found out that the Emperor burned Rome for the best motives. He merely wanted to get rid of the old, ugly, ruinous buildings, and to replace them by handsome and more comfortable edifices. He did not wish to shock the people, as many of their buildings were held to be sacred; and so he played the part of a benevolent incur-

diary. This may be all so; but what has M. Recan to say of Nero's fantasia on the viola, heartlessly performed during the conflagration?

From the official returns of the Custom House officers at Liverpool, it appears that during the month of May, 1873, the number of ships which arrived inland was 138, and the register tonnage 102,333 tons, against 126 ships and 95,621 tons in the corresponding month of last year. The total number of ships reported inland from January 1 to May 31, was 2,255, and the tonnage 1,725,632, being an increase from the beginning of the year to the end of May of 118 ships and 194,924 tons over the same period of '72. The number of vessels which cleared from the Mersey during the five months was 104, of 78,194 tons, against 100 ships of 70,420 in the corresponding months of the previous year.

Letters from various parts of Brittany and Normandy say there has been large purchases of horses and live stock during the past months by the English and by Germans. The population do not complain of these purchases, which keep up a brisk business, and they are the reason for them. In regard to the cattle it is probably speculation; but the purchase of horses chiefly for Germany, excites surprise. The French papers are sounding a note of alarm. They say the large quantity of horses, which are being sent to the East and West of France, should extend to the central provinces of the country.
