From the official returns of the Custo House officers at Liverpool, it appears that during the month of May, 1873, the uumber of ships which arrived inward was 138, and the register tonnage 102,533 tons, against 126 ships and 96,331 tons in the corresponding month of last year. The total number of ships reported inward bound from January 1 to May 30 was 2,258, and the tonnage 1,723,685, being an increase from the beginning of the year to the end of May of 118 ships and 136,934 tons over the same period of '72. Letters from various parts of Brittany and Normandy say there have been large purchases of horses and live stock during the past months by the English and by Germans.
