

Executive Committee's Report.

UNIVERSITY Y.M.C.A., TORONTO, 9th April, 1891.

To the Members of the Association:

Gentlemen,—In presenting to you a report of the year's work, your Executive Committee feel that there is cause for deep gratitude to the "Giver of all good" for what we have been enabled to do for Him.

The spiritual life of the Association has not risen so high as in former years perhaps, for that depends largely upon prayer, and this year, owing to the number of other uses the building has been put to on account of the burning of the College, the circumstances have been much less favourable for united prayer than usual. However, we trust that in the past year of self-sacrifice for the sake of the University and our sister Societies in the College, we have been conforming to the "Golden Rule" laid down by the Master, and so may confidently hope that it will bear fruit to His glory. While we are not able to point to any special advance in aggressive work for the Master at home we are glad to be able to record a continual and very marked advance in the Foreign Mission Branch of our work, as the next report of the Korean Mission Board will show. We have also made some improvements in our organization which will enable us to do better work in the future. Some changes have been made in our system of committees. the principal of which are as follows: The Music Committee has been struck out, and the work formerly done by it given to a sub-committee of the Devotional Committee. A Committee on Inter-Collegiate relations has been organized, which takes up correspondence with other college associations as a part of its work. The name of one Committee has been changed, that on General Religious Work, being now known as the City Missions' Committee. Two new and very important Committees have been added, namely, the Social Purity and Finance Committees, the Treasurer of the Association being convener of the latter.

In addition to the regular Committees, three special ones were organized early in the Fall Term for special work which came up at that time. These were the Committees on Boarding Houses, the

Handbook and the Reception. The first named of these Committees is not organized by the Executive but by the General Secretary, and consists of himself and a few who live in the city, or who volunteer to come to the city a week or two before College opens, to help in this important work. It is a matter for regret that for the last two years, at least, just at this particular time, when it is so important that the Secretary's whole attention should be given to planning and arranging the fall work, he has been compelled to give up a great deal of his time to this Boarding House work.

The work done by the Reception and Handbook Committees last fall deserves special mention, as the reception proved to be, in many respects, one of the very best the Association has ever held, while the Handbook is not only a marked improvement upon any previously issued by the Association but compares favorably with that of any other Association we have seen.

The regular Committees of the Association will report for themselves, consequently no special reference need be made to them here with the exception of the Rooms Committee. We are gratified to see that the members of the Association are seeing more clearly the importance of some active member, besides the General Secretary, being in the rooms, so as to relieve the Secretary from the care of the building as much as possible. More volunteers have offered themselves for this duty in the rooms than formerly and the work has been well attended to. Let us hope for better things next year, as there is still room for improvement.

In addition to what has been said in the report of the Committee on Bible Study, it may be stated that a Workers' Training Class was conducted by the General Secretary, on Sunday afternoons, during the Fall Term.

In the matter of Deputations your Committee have little to report, as the only work undertaken in that line was the sending of Mr. F. R. Lillie to Guelph, as a substitute for Mr. Webster, in the interests of the International and Provincial Committees, Mr. Lillie's expenses being voluntarily assumed by the Association.

Early in the Fall Term the Association was visited by Mr. Mott, the International College Secretary, accompanied by Mr. C. A. Webster, B.A., of the Toronto Medical Association, representing the College

Branch of the Provincial Committee. Mr. Mott afterwards expressed himself as very much gratified with the condition and work of the Association. Later in the same Term a visit was received from Mr. Cossum, Travelling Secretary of the Student Volunteer Missionary Movement. These visits necessitated some changes in the programme of meetings for the Fall Term, but we are pleased to note the hearty reception accorded these men, as indicated by the large number that came to the meetings. An invitation was extended to the Young Women's Christian Association of the College to attend the meeting addressed by Mr. Cossum, which invitation was well responded to by the ladies

This has been an unusually active year in the matter of sending delegates to Conventions. The first of these was the Summer School at Northfield, where you were represented by Messrs. Stringer, Lillie, Nichol (of Knox College), and the General Secretary. In the Fall Term, W. R. McIntosh, J. S. Scott and C. A. Stuart represented the Association at the Convention of the Intercollegiate Missionary Alliance at Montreal. At that convention Mr. McIntosh, one of your delegates, read a paper. In February, five delegates, namely. Messrs. N. I. Perry, J. W. Wheaton, J. A. Dow, R. H. Glover and your Secretary, attended the Provincial Convention at Kingston. In March, W. R. McIntosh and J. S. Scott were present at the first Convention of the Student Volunteer Missionary Movement held at Cleveland, Ohio.

The question of finances is always a very important one, but the Treasurer's Statement will show that we are still on "solid ground" and continue to follow the good example of our predecessors in promptly and honorably paying all our accounts during the year and leaving a balance for the new Committee to commence their work with. This will be the more appreciated when it is known that our sustentation receipts are considerably less this year than last. Our being able to make such a favourable showing with less sustentation is due principally to three causes. In the first place our reading-room has been rented to the Literary Society, and consequently we have been to very little expense on account of papers and periodicals, and this fact, together with carefulness and economy in other matters, has enabled us to cut down our expenses for the year by nearly two hundred and fifty dollars as compared with last year. The second reason is

that our rents have netted more than in any previous year, owing to the increased use of the building since the fire. The third reason is the one for which we have greatest cause to congratulate the Association, namely, that at least fifty per cent. more has been received in fees than in any previous year in the history of the Association, and that notwithstanding the fact that this is the first year the fee has been one dollar for both active and associate members. We here wish to express our earnest appreciation for the sympathy shown toward the Association by the student body generally, as shown by the large number of associate members' fees that have been paid. It may be of interest to you to know that out of a first year class of about one hundred and fifty men over seventy have joined the Association, sixty as active members, and from that year alone over sixty dollars have been received in fees, about fifty per cent. more than from any other year.

In addition to our regular receipts and expenditures the Association gave by collection, at a special meeting during the Week of Prayer in the Fall Term, twelve dollars to the work of the International Committee, and in the Provincial Committee work we have led the colleges of Ontario and Quebec by giving fifty dollars and an extra ten dollars towards a deficit on the Provincial work for 1890. Of the amount contributed to the Provincial Committee, the sum of twenty-five dollars was voted by your Executive Committee, and the remainder subscribed by members and graduate friends of the Association.

In order to make provision for the future finances of the Association, your Committee, after a careful consideration of the matter, have decided to introduce a Sustaining membership of two dollars a year amongst the graduates of the College who, during their College course, have enjoyed the fellowship and benefits of the Association. If this privilege is properly appreciated by the graduates—as we have no doubt it will be—it should, together with the increasing amount received in fees each year, in the course of a few years make the Association self-sustaining.

The thankfulness of the Association is due to the following:—To the Ladies' Auxiliary, for the interest they have continued to take in the Association and the very practical assistance they give us by the Reception; to the University Board of Trust, for paying our coal bill, and for the very prompt manner in which they have reimbursed us for

any expenditure we have been put to on account of the general student body as a result of the fire; to the Board of Directors of the Toronto Association, for the generous offer, made through their General Secretary, of the use of the Central Association Building for a Conversazione, which offer your Committee was unable to take advantage of, owing principally to the lateness of the season; to the Pastor and Managers of Bond Street Congregational Church, for the use of the lecture-room of their church for Dr. Ferguson's address on "Social Purity"; to the International and Provincial Committees, and the Executive Committee of the Student Volunteer Movement, for visits from official representatives; to the Young Women's Christian Association of the College, for their invitation to hear an address by the Rev. Dr. Nevius, of China, and for their generous contribution of over thirty dollars to our work in Korea.

All of which is respectfully submitted.

Summary of Reports.

ROOMS AND READING-ROOM COMMITTEE.

(W. Hardie, Convener.)

The Committee has had throughout the year a membership of six, the charge of the building being committed to each member for one day in the week. It has been the Committee's endeavour to have men on duty in the rooms every day from nine o'clock to six, and in this it has been greatly assisted by other members of the Association engaging to remain in charge of the building at stated times during the week.

The reading room having been given up for the year to the Literary Society, there has been little responsibility resting upon the Committee regarding it; most of the magazines on file there being the property of the Literary Society.

Considerable expense has been incurred in repairing damages done to the furniture in the building, part of which, however, has been borne by the Literary Society. Members of the Association can always practically assist in the work of this Committee by volunteering their services for day duty in the building.

MEMBERSHIP COMMITTEE.

(G. T. Graham, Convener.)

This year there have been added to the membership of the Association 101 members, 85 active and 16 associate.

The Committee adopted the plan of having one man in each year responsible for the work of his year. He in turn found one man, at least, in each course to undertake the work, and by this means a thorough canvass was made of all the men.

The Committee were somewhat late in starting this year, and would recommend that the Convener for next year be appointed before the opening of College, and that the matriculation lists be used until such time as the list of the first year students can be procured from the

Registrar of the College. They also urge once more upon the active members the importance of thorough and systematic personal work throughout the year.

DEVOTIONAL COMMITTEE.

(N. I. Perry, Convener.)

Your Committee, which consists of seven members, has prepared the programmes for all the devotional meetings during the year, choosing subjects and selecting leaders.

Besides the meetings addressed by the undergraduates, two have been addressed by Sir Daniel Wilson, one in the Michaelmas Term on "Social Purity," and one in the Easter Term on "The Supernatural in Religion."

Meetings were also arranged for Mr. W. H. Cossum, Travelling Secretary of the Student Volunteer Movement, and Mr. J. R. Mott, International College Secretary. Provision was made for three missionary meetings during the year, which were under the supervision of the Missionary Committee.

A Sunday morning meeting was arranged for in March, at which the Rev. Dr. Potts gave an address.

Your Committee would recommend that arrangements be made by the next Devotional Committee for a series of Sunday morning meetings in the Fall Term.

CITY MISSION COMMITTEE.

(E. A. Henry, Convener.)

The work of this Committee this year has been confined to the Newsboys' Home, on Frederick Street. During the greater part of the year, three nights a week, and for the last month, two nights, have been assigned to the charge of the Committee, one member of which has been made responsible for each evening. He, with as many as he desired to take with him, visited the Home and entertained the boys with readings, college songs, Bible stories, hymns, etc., not forgetting

to drop here and there as many words as possible of an uplifting and helpful kind, in the hope that they might find a lodgment in the mind and prove an inspiration to worthier living. A special entertainment and treat was given this year, as last, at Christmas. While this has been our sole work the hope exists of future extension.

The Hospital for Sick Children on College Street will soon be opened, and there, we hope, will be a special field of labour for us.

During the past session our attention was called to an opening amongst the Italians in St. John's Ward. The matter was very carefully enquired into and considered, but for various reasons your Committee could not assume the responsibility.

We feel grateful as a Committee for what we have been privileged to do for the Master, and trust it may bear fruit to His glory.

We would recommend the next Committee to publish this work widely amongst the members of the Association and seek to gain their sympathy and co-operation in a work which is "twice blessed," blessing him who is helped and him who helps.

SOCIAL PURITY COMMITTEE.

(A. McMillan, Convener.)

This Committee was organized last fall and now completes its first year of work.

A Thursday afternoon meeting was given to this Committee which was addressed by Sir Daniel Wilson, and was one of the best attended meetings of the year. In the Winter Term a public meeting was arranged for in the lecture room of the Bond Street Congregational Church, which was very kindly offered for the purpose. This meeting was addressed by Dr. John Ferguson, who gave a very earnest, practical and plain talk.

A few tracts have been bought for distribution amongst the students, but your Committee has not been able to secure much literature suitable for college men. Dr. Ferguson has offered to give us very practical aid in this matter by preparing a special address on this subject for students, to be given next session under the auspices of this

Association, which address the Doctor is willing we should have printed in pamphlet form.

Your Committee would strongly recommend that steps be taken to accept Dr. Ferguson's offer.

COMMITTEE OF INTER-COLLEGIATE RELATIONS.

(John McNicol, Convener.)

This Committee was composed of eight members, and its work has been as follows:

- During the Michaelmas Term an effort was made to canvass the members of the Association for subscriptions to the *Intercollegian*.
 Very few were found willing to subscribe.
- 2. The four "Northfield Books" were purchased for the library with money collected by members of the Committee.
- 3. Letters were written to the Associations in McGill, Queen's, Victoria, the Ontario Agricultural College, Albert College, and the University of New Brunswick. Letters were received from Queen's and Oberlin.
- 4. In the Easter Term the Committee secured a deputation of five to represent the Association at the Provincial Convention at Kingston and raised the funds necessary to pay the expenses of two of these.

BIBLE STUDY COMMITTEE

(F. R. Lillie, Convener.)

The work of the Bible Study Committee in a College Association is one of peculiar difficulty. There are so many organizations and societies of one kind and another that a student who takes any active part in undergraduate life finds his time pretty fully occupied. In previous years the custom has been to have several Bible classes, each having a few members and led by an undergraduate. This plan did not prove successful, so this year a new method has been adopted. Instead of the several small classes a Bible Study Association was

formed which met once a week for the study of the Word together under the leadership of the General Secretary. The method of study was purely inductive, all teaching on the subject in hand being drawn from the Scriptures only. The work of the leader was principally to keep the members to the point and to direct the study according to the best of his judgment.

The study this term was the Life of Christ as contained in the four Gospels, following chiefly the chronology of Luke. Meeting only once a week it was impossible, of course, to cover much ground during one term, but the study taught us the value of searching carefully, even microscopically, the Scriptures.

It is difficult after so short a trial to speak positively as to the advantages of this method. It has its advantages, and, in the opinion of the Committee, is to be preferred before the method of smaller classes. Indeed we think the Association would reap more benefit if the Thursday afternoon meetings were made more of this type. Most of the members are connected with some one or other of the churches in the city, and there, it may be, have the benefit of a devotional meeting every Wednesday evening.

In conclusion, your Committee would suggest that it would probably be found advantageous in the future to shorten somewhat the purely devotional part of our Thursday meeting and to give more to a careful study together of God's Word.

MISSIONARY COMMITTEE.

(W. R. McIntosh, Convener.)

This department of the work was attended to by a committee of eight, chiefly volunteers to the foreign field, who met fortnightly throughout the session. The main part of its work was in connection with our Korean Mission, in the support of which regular correspondence was kept up with Mr. Gale, prayer offered for blessing on his work, a public meeting provided for in the Fall Term, presenting the claims of the mission to the students and addressed by Rev. Prof. Wrong, of Wycliffe College, and Rev. J. McP. Scott, and a systematic and successful canvass made among the new students for financial support.

The Committee thank God for His gracious dealings with our mission and missionary during the past year and rejoice in the fact that the Board are taking definite steps to further the work in Korea by raising funds for missionary premises and otherwise aiding Gale in his noble work.

The Committee also sought to interest the Association in missionary work generally by sending delegates to Montreal and Cleveland, where important missionary conventions were held, and reporting the same at meetings of the Association. The claims of our Canadian North-West were also presented by members of the Committee, and the Volunteer Movement by Mr. Cossum, its Travelling Secretary for this year.

The interest in missionary work amongst students at the present time ought to be the cause of great gratitude to God on the part of all.
