MIRAMICHI WOODS SURPASSES MAINE'S

Returned American Sportsman Loud In His Praise Of Local Game Country

PAYS TRIBUTE TO GUIDES.

Is Of The Opinion That License Fee For Outsiders Should Not Be Reduced

"New Brunswick is a richer game country than Maine. It is a veritable sportsman's paradise."

The above observation was made to a reporter of the Advocate a few days ago by Mr. H. G. Rowe of Medina, Ohio. Mr. Rowe was one of a party of six which had just returned from the Tomogons country, a very successful caribou hunt.

Mr. Rowe, Dr. F. S. Jones and Mr. T. G. Rowe were guided by George McKay and Congressman F. O. Phillips. Mr. George Bolt and Mr. Wm. Fraser were in the hands of Bill McKay. All the members of the party belong to Medina.

Although there were only four days of good hunting each member of the party brought down a caribou and besides two deer were shot.

Mr. Rowe is newspaper man. He was formerly representative of the Associated Press at Bangor. At present he conducts a weekly in Medina. He knows the Maine woods thoroughly and declares they are not half so reliable as those of the Miramichi. He believes the New Brunswick game regions are becoming better known and more appreciated every year by American sportsmen and if it had not been election year there would be less moose and caribou roaming the woods at present.

Mr. Rowe does not believe that the license fee for outsiders should be reduced. Those who are willing to come so far are willing to pay the fee exacted at present. Mr. Rowe paid a high tribute to the ability, industry and integrity of the New Brunswick guides. He stated that his party were so well pleased that they intend to return next season in search of moose. Mr. Rowe got a fine moose head here last season.

Rev. J. B. Ganong, Sunday School Field Secretary, who has been conducting successful meetings in different parts of the county will be in Newcastle today. Two meetings will be held in St. James Hall at 2.30 and 7 o'clock. An interesting programme has been prepared. Mr. Ganong will teach next Sunday's lesson in the evening.

COUNCIL TO INSPECT COMPANY'S PROPERTY

Committee Appointed To Do So, Before Stipulated \$20,000 Is Paid Over.

ALDERMEN IN SESSION.

Services Of Policeman Hill Appreciated And He Gets Increase In Salary.

At the regular session of the Town Council Monday evening there were present Mayor Brown and Ald. Pitche, Lawlor, Grenley, Morrison, and Russell.

Ald. Morrison moved that the Town issue debentures for the purpose of making the loan of \$20,000 to the Anderson Furniture Company as provided for by a by-law passed at a meeting of the rate payers held on February 15, last.

Ald. Morrison's motion was carried.

Ald. Morrison thought that a committee should be appointed to ascertain if the \$25,000 had first been expended by the Company.

Ald. Lawlor agreed with him, and emphasized the wisdom of ascertaining if the property of the Company was free from encumbrances, etc. The titles should all be searched up.

Ald. Morrison moved that a committee of three be appointed to search the titles of the different properties of the Company to be mortgaged to the town and to see that all are free from claims and encumbrances and to inspect the plant and machinery and to ascertain if all are free from claims and also to have the bond and mortgage drawn up and make a full report to the Council.

The motion was carried.

The committee is composed of Ald. Morrison, Lawlor, and Ritchie.

Ald. Lawlor stated in reply to a question from Ald. Morrison that the Police Committee would meet and appoint someone to look after the dog taxes.

Colonel Maltby's report re the installation of recent sewers and water works was read and adopted.

A bill of \$1,034.50 submitted by Contractor Fish for laying two sewers and for doing extra work such as excavating beyond the line agreed upon was ordered to be paid.

A bill of \$20 for surveying from Wm. O. Fish was ordered to be paid.

Ald. Morrison suggested the advisability of securing another pump for the Power House.

Ald. Morrison brought up the question of giving Policeman Hill an increase in salary. He stated that Mr. Hill had been a faithful officer.

Ald. Grenley said he had served the town well for eleven years.

On motion of Ald. Ritchie the policeman's salary was increased to \$1.50 a day.

One of two other matters of minor importance were discussed and the Council adjourned.

MAINE TACKLES ANOTHER STORY

This Thrilling Moose Yarn Comes From Near The New Brunswick Border.

BANGOR, Nov. 26.—One of the most thrilling hunting stories of the season comes from Washington county in which George Andrews, a "topfield" lumberman, encountered a large bull moose and but for a cool head on his shoulders would undoubtedly have met a horrible death by being tossed on the huge antlers of the frenzied beast. Not until Mr. Andrews had pumped the last shot into the leg below did he get down and out.

The first shot at the monster failed to slacken his speed. In the last, but on the contrary, the beast quickened his gait and had a bad look in his eye, as though he was going to take a part in the game himself.

Seeing that the moose intended to do him injury, Mr. Andrews fired six more shots into him in rapid succession but notwithstanding this the moose did not seem to be deterred from his course nor slackened his speed one iota.

Mr. Andrews fell to the ground and lay flat just as the beast was upon him. This was a great surprise to the moose and sadly disarranged his plan of battle. His speed was such that he went by Mr. Andrews. As the beast passed over him he felt his hot breath on his face.

The moose was unable to stop until he had gone some distance by Mr. Andrews and given him a chance to get on his feet before the attack was renewed. As soon as he could the moose came at him again.

This time the hunter fired a telling shot just as the moose started for him the second time.

The ball entered the animal's neck and he fell to the ground.

HUNTERS RETURN WELL SATISFIED

Not A Failure Recorded Against Any Of The Visiting Sportsmen.

SEASON CLOSING TONIGHT

Game Warden Robinson says Season Was A Very Successful One.

The big game season closes this evening. In many respects it has been one of the most successful in the history of the Province.

The weather has been exceptionally good for hunting. There have been no blinding snow storms or heavy rains to contend with. Every hunter who came here from the United States this season returned home happy. There was not a failure recorded. The number of caribou shot this season was large. This species of the antler tribe is rapidly becoming more common in the woods of the Miramichi. Some sections of the country are overrun with them. Moose are also becoming more plentiful every year and New Brunswick has far to become the great moose and caribou country of the world.

All the Miramichi guides have been kept busy and the majority have made substantial piles.

Chief Game Warden Robinson told a reporter for the Advocate yesterday that the season had been a successful one in every way. About twelve parties told him knowledge had been prevented from coming on account of the elections. He stated that to his knowledge there had been no illegal hunting.

A LONDON TAILOR VOUCHES FOR IT

But Officer Of Minto's Staff Says Gov. Snowball's Uniform Is Of Too High A Grade.

The following Ottawa dispatch of last week will interest readers of the Advocate: It has just leaked out that the Windsor uniform worn by Hon. Jabez B. Snowball, Lieutenant Governor of New Brunswick, was called into question by an officer of Lord Minto's household. The officer claimed that the Governor's uniform was one which only the Governor, General or Imperial Privy Counsellors had a right to wear.

The Governor asserted that he had his London tailor's authority for the statement that the uniform was of the right class, and for that reason he refused to have the uniform altered.

The grade of official uniforms are five viz., Governor General and Imperial Privy Counsellors, Lieutenant Governor, Privy Counsellors and Senators, General, Deputy Minister, Secretary to the Governor General. The uniform is worn in all cases, except that the higher the rank the greater the amount of gold lace worn.

A PAPER FACTORY FOR SISTER TOWN

Pulp Company Declare They Can Make Paper As Cheaply Here As Elsewhere.

The Miramichi Pulp and Paper Company which a few weeks ago purchased the Maritime Sulphur Pulp Company's property at Chatham is now preparing for an active season. The new company is composed of New Hampshire capitalists and manufacturers, men who have already made a success of the pulp and paper business. The manager expects to start the works about the first of January and will employ from 125 to 150 men. Already some five million feet of lumber have been brought for immediate use and the Company have arranged to cut about 12,000,000 feet this winter. It is the intention to go into the manufacturing of paper and a large factory will be erected for this purpose before the season of 1902. The company say they can manufacture paper on the Miramichi just as cheaply as it can be made in the United States.
