## SPECIAL MEETING OF TOWN COUNCIL

O'Leary Street Matter Advanced Another Stage.—Land to be Purchased for \$1800

The town council met in special session on Monday evening His Worship Mayor Andrew in the chair. At the opening of the session there were present councillors Lunam, Alexander, Sansom and Miller. The minutes of previous meeting were read and confirmed. Communication read from Wm. Noble asking for an increase of pay and also asking what the council intended doing with regard to payment for January which had been promised. Referred to Fire Protection committee.

Communication read from J. W. McCready secretary of Union of New Brunswick Municipalities notifying the council that the hearing of the New Brunswick Telephone Company before the Public Utilities Commission had been adjourned till April 2nd, and asking that a representative be sent to St. John. Councillor D. A. Stewart had previously attended this hearing and the appointment of a delegate was left in the hands of the mayor. Communication read from Messrs. Shives Lumber Co. stating that they intended installing a Grinnell sprinkler system in their mills and offices and would require a 6 inch watermain connection for this.

They stated that the whole matter had been placed before the town engineer with plans and blue prints of all required appliances. Councillor Alexander stated that the whole matter had been gone into by the committee and they were quite assured it was a good thing for the mill and also for the town. The installation would require 6 in. water main led into the mill which would cost a little over \$170. and the charge could be met several ways. The committee thought that an annual charge of \$20 would be the best method, the understanding being that this main should only be used for fire purposes. He would at next meeting bring in a recommendation with all plans etc., and the whole thing was referred to Water and Sewerage committee.

Councillor Alexander informed His Worship and the council that Mr. D. Champoux had notified him that a delegation was proceeding to Ottawa on Thursday of this week, relative to Railway matters which had been discussed at the public meeting in New Carlisle recently.

As this delegation were not taking any action on the bridge question, nothing was done re the appointing of a delegate.

The following reports recommending payment of accounts were received and adopted.

Councillor Sansom, Public Charities \$86.52, Councillor Miller Finance \$15.75, Councillor Alexander Water and Sewerage \$57.93 Councillor Miller, Public Property and Streets \$51.15.

Councillor Lunam from Police and License committee recommended that a license for a butchers store be granted Messrs. Jellett Brothers on payment of \$10.00, explaining that in July Messrs. Jellett would be on the assessment roll and this amount really covered only three months. Report received and adopted.

Councillor Alexander from special committee appointed re O'Leary Street reported that they had not seen Mr. Ellsworth who was ill but had a conversation with Mr. J. I. Boudreau who was now present and might be heard before the council.

## GOOD TEMPERANCE MEETING HELD HERE

Rev. Dr. Albert Moore Speaks in St. Andrew's Church Last Evening

A large temperance meeting was held in St. Andrew's Church last night, Rev. Dr. Albert Moore being the principal speaker.

His Worship Mayor Andrew occupied the chair and was supported by Rev. T. P. Drumm, B. D., Rev. J. E. Purdie, Rev. C. W. Squires and Rev. H. Jenner.

His Worship in introducing the speaker spoke of the approaching voting day and in sketching the conditions as obtained both before and after the fire, made a strong plea to keep things as they are, that is under local option for the benefit of the young men of the town.

Rev. Dr. Moore on rising said it was a great privilege to be called to Campbellton to help them in their fight at this time. He congratulated the town on the progress that had been made, and said if they desired to continue the good work they had begun, the liquor traffic must be left out.

In the course of an interesting address the speaker quoted numerous instances of his personal knowledge as well as statistics crowning a striking argument against the liquor business. He said in speaking of the liquor interest that he had noticed in a paper devoted to the trade that the license holders were calling on their friends to help them fight the growing powers of prohibition in a number of towns and one of these mentioned was Campbellton.

Although not conversant with local conditions he said that no public spirited citizen who had the public good at heart wished to foist the liquor traffic on the people.

The speech of the Rev. Dr. Moore was intently listened to, many of his personal experiences being keenly relished by his hearers.

Mr. W. D. Duncan moved a vote of thanks to the speaker which was seconded by Mr. F. M. Anderson and the meeting closed with the National Anthem.

and he would not come down one dollar in price. Councillor Lunam said that as he had made the original motion it was but right that both Mr. McDonald and Mr. Boudreau should know that the town had offered \$1500 and he was of the opinion that they were offering a good deal for 13 1/2 feet of land.

Mr. McDonald said he was quite aware of the town's offer, but there were other things to consider, the value of the standing building and the less of revenue, etc.

With regard to terms Mr. Boudreau and Mr. McDonald said that they would hand the town the \$150.00 and thought there would be no difficulty in arranging a three years purchase. Councillor Alexander stated that the terms asked by Mr. Ellsworth were half purchase price down one fourth in six months and balance in twelve months, but this did not make much difference as the notes would bear interest and could be discounted straight away.

**LAND OF MYSTERY**

Discovery in Nigeria of "The Sacred Lake of Life"

News has been received from South Africa of a remarkable discovery just made by Mr. P. Amery Talbot, a District Commissioner, at a place known as the "Sacred Lake of Life" on which, according to popular belief, the existence of a number of thousand people depends.

When, some months ago, Mr. Talbot returned from extensive travels in the known parts of Nigeria, he announced as one of the most interesting discoveries the finding of the "Sacred Lake of Life" in the Gona country. This he visited after great difficulty, and in spite of the fact that porters and carriers refused to proceed to the dreaded spot. The scene about the lake, he said, was full of mystery and dread.

The surface of the water was absolutely still, and round about were ten-foot high bushes, bearing what looked like great tufts of creamy flowers. These, however, proved to be nests of tree frogs. The place was a sanctuary for all wild things, for no hunter would dare to penetrate the bush to this fearsome place.

Hither, the natives believed, came by night the ghosts of long dead Ekoi, to drift in sad companies, hopeless and wailing, over the surface of the water. 



### PROPOSED BRIDGE GETS A SET BACK

U. S. War Department Desire Information as to Any Objections to Erected

Bangor, Me., March 24.—Hon. Oscar F. Fellows, of this city counsel for the United States before the International St. John River Commission, has received instructions from the war department of the United States to ascertain whether or not there are any objections known or to be advanced by the commission why the proposed international bridge connecting Van Buren (Me.) with St. Leonards (N. B.) should not be erected.

The Van Buren Bridge Co., which is to construct the bridge, was incorporated under an act of the Maine legislature passed this winter. Congress has passed a bill authorizing the bill and the necessary legislation in the province of New Brunswick was procured some time ago. Those who are interested in the proposition are at a loss to see the aim of the war department at present, as everything in relation to the bridge seemed settled and steps were being taken for the organization of the company.

Mr. Fellows, in his capacity as counsel for the government, has notified the members of the commission and has asked that a hearing be held on the matter at the earliest possible time, as the department is anxious to have a report. It is understood that the commission will hold this hearing at Van Buren, where the bridge is to be located, and that it will be held some time this week. No definite word has yet been received from the Canadian members of the commission.

It is thought among some business people that this looks as if some other railway were trying to hold up the matter but nothing can be learned here on that head.

### "MAK' IT PILLS"

How a Shrewd Doctor Knew His Patient Was a Miser

Curious habits of the Aberdeen miser, George Anderson, were described in the Court of Session, Edinburgh, during the hearing of the action by his brother to have the old man's will reduced. A witness said the room in which Anderson lived was very dirty, and she would not have put a dog in the bed. He had a pair of blankets, but they were like coal-bags. Mr. Thomas Malcolm, manager of the International Railway was in St. John at the beginning of the week. She has distributed nearly two hundred gold crosses to servants who have been in the same family over forty years. Accompanying the gold cross is an illuminated document, which ends up with the quotation, "Well done, thou good and faithful servant!" A pathetic story is told of an old nurse in Silesia who served in one family 38 years and brought up two generations of children. The nurse had been hoping that she would serve long enough to earn the gold cross. When two years short of the necessary term she got ill and was expected to die. She wrote to the Empress telling her story, and saying that the one disappointment in her life was that she could not earn the cross. Three days later she died. On the morning of her funeral a letter came from the Empress sending the cross.



**DEATH AT ROME OF J. PIERPONT MORGAN**

Noted Financier Passed Away at Noon Monday

Rome, March 31.—Pierpont Morgan, the financier, died at five minutes past twelve o'clock noon today.

When his death was seen to be approached rapidly, Prof. Bastianelli and Dr. George A. Dixon forced Mr. and Mrs. Herbert Satterlee, his son-in-law and daughter, and Miss Helen Hamilton Morgan, who had been in constant attendance, to leave the room.

Mr. Morgan toward the end showed that he was suffering internally only by a movement of his right hand. Otherwise he displayed no sign of vitality except by continuous heavy breathing.

Frequent bulletins were issued during the morning showing that his condition was gradually becoming worse and by 11 o'clock the physicians had given up all hope.

had said all he had to say on the matter but thought the price altogether too dear, and if any one should pay it should be the O'Leary people, as it would increase the value of the land.

After further discussion it was moved and carried that the town purchase sufficient land on the west side of O'Leary Street from Mr. Ellsworth to straighten street line of west side at the cost of \$1800; \$700 down, \$550 at one year and \$550 at two years from date of purchase with interest at 5%, provided that clear title could be given and that the deed for the rest of O'Leary Street be given to council.

Councillor Stewart entered the meeting.

On thanking the council Mr. Boudreau said that he would look after the deed of the street and have it right away.

Councillor Alexander asked when was the date fixed for the removal of the Moore's property on Rosebury Street and His Worship informed him the date was 1st June 1913.

The following resolution was then read and on motion adopted viz:

Whereas it has pleased Almighty God to remove from our midst one of our most prominent citizens, Wm. Murray, Judge of Probate, whose demise occurred on Thursday, the 20th day of March, instant.

And whereas the deceased for several years served at this Council Board as a Councillor and during the years 1903 and 1904 occupied the highest civic position in the gift of his fellow citizens, viz. mayor of the town, the duties of which office he fulfilled in a creditable manner.

Therefore resolved that this council do hereby express its sorrow in the loss of so eminent a citizen, and that the heartfelt sympathy of the council be extended to the family of the deceased.

Further resolved that a copy of this resolution of be forwarded to the widow of the deceased and to the local newspaper for publication.

The matter of moving picture house licenses was then gone into. The Town Clerk read a number of replies giving the rates charged in different towns, and His Worship stated that Mr. S. W. 
