New York, Feb. 7.—Special telegrams to Bradstreet's show only moderate improvement in the state of general trade. The money market continues particularly easy, and rates for funds, both at New York and generally elsewhere throughout the country, are practically unchanged. There is a better demand at a few points west, but the banks appear to be supplied. Mercantile collections are only fairly prompt. The iron industry shows no improvement. Anthracite coal is rather more unfavorably situated. Copper is firm and unchanged. Lumber and leather are in only steady demand at former prices.

At the principal cities in the Province of Quebec general trade is of moderate volume,

Quebec general trade is of moderate volume, and promises to remain so until navigation opens. There is a fair volume of business in Ontario, in some instances in excess of the totals for January, 1890. The interest in the Dominion elections tends to interrupt business some. In Manitoba the wheat movement continues slow, and the tendency its light business of paring goods. movement continues slow, and the tendency is to light purchases of spring goods.

THE COMBINES.

Everybody is laughing at the declaration of the subsidized Toronto Empire that it is impossible for combines to exist in Canada.

The Empire is practically owned by the combines and the politicians who have recently ruled at Ottawa by their favor. They chip in their annual subscriptions to keep it alive, and boss its policy, and it says just what they dictate. Its evidence cannot be accepted as altogether disinterested. But he is an awful fool who believes the Toronto Empire's declaration that it is impossible for combines to exist here. It is scarcely necessary to give an illustration of how combines do work here, fostered as the sugar, cotton, rubber, binding twine, parbed wire and other combines are by high taxation. "Therefore, this, the Central Institute, do respectfully ask the Government to reduce the tariff on articles of prime necessity to the farmer, such as iron, steel, coal, cottons, woolens, rubbers, sugars, corn and sait, to such an extent as to relieve the agriculturist of the unequal burden under which he is now laboring."

The response to this request is the impu-ent assurance from the Ottawa Governdent assurance from the Ottawa Govern-ment that as between the farmers and the combines it means to stand by the com-bines. There can be no doubt that it is de-termined to hold to that position. But we cannot believe that the people are with them.






