In the crash the locomotive of the freight plowed through three carriages filled with passengers, eight of whom were killed, five sustained injuries of which they will probably die, and ten were severely wounded. Fitteen Persons Killed by an Explosion—Marvelous Escape of Miners Imprisoned Ten Days in a Flooded Colliery.

St. Petersberg, Jan. 4.—A dispatch from Retchitza-on-the-Dneiper says that fifteen men were killed by a mine explosion their yesterday. Four men, severely finjured, were brought up from the pitshority after the explosion.

Ten days ago a mine on the lines of the Lonetz Raffway was flooded by the sudden ingress of a large volume of water. The miners had set off a blast and the explosion was followed by a rush of water with which pumps were more jule to cope. The miners fled for their lives and all managed to reach the surface in safety except eight men, who it was supposed had been drowned in the workings. The pumps were kept going night and day, and to-day the mine was deciared safe to enter, and a party of miners went down to resoue their contrades. They searched the men still alive, but so weak they could hardly speak. They were removed to the surface, and the physicians state that with proper care they will recover.

felt before, the lust and strength of youth. The circulation in his brain is persistently overactive; his ideas correspond. But overactive; his ideas correspond his prevails wears out rapidly. Its cells degenerate and become useless. At last it is so wasted that its functionings produce only the most rudimentary mental states.

Then the tissues become so weakened that small blood vessels burst, lacerating the brain, and bringing on these convulsions which are so paintul a feature of the disease, and which finally terminate the patient's life. Post-mortem examination will show that the brain of the paretic may not be "softened," but that its cells and other tissues are everywhere more or less degenerated or decayed. It is inconceivable that these wasted tissues could be replaced with normal ones; hence it cannot be even hoped that an advanced case of paresis will ever be cured. But of course there is a time in the history of every case when decay is only incipient. At the disease in this stage preventive medicine may hope some day to aim its shafts successfully.

So much for the disease, paresis. Now as to its causes. It can be epitomized in two words: excessive action. Paresis is a protest of nature against abuse of function. Whatever act tends to bring too great or too continuous strain upon the blood vessels of the brain tends to weaken them and the invites practice.

test of nature against abuse of function. Whatever act tends to bring too great or too continuous strain upon the blood vessels of the brain tends to weaken them and thus invites paresis. All mental overactivity brings such a strain. But few of us are gifted with working enthusiasm that will ever menace our minds, Still, there are cases, doubtless, in which mental overwork of a strictly legitimate kind has been an active factor in paving the way to paresis.

Business stress and worry are far more common factors. Alcohol is a yet more potent accessory. But in the vast majority of cases, though these accessory causes have their effect, the chief causes of paresis are habits and excesses that I cannot properly more than hint at here. It will now be plain why paresis is a disease of civilization—sad commentary though that be; more common with men than with women; more prevalent in the city than in the country, and one that is claiming a larger coteric of victims year by year.

STATE OWNERSHIP OF RAILWAYS dian newspapers about the State owner hip of railways, and a decided tendency to despair of making the Government-controlled Intercolonial line pay has been exbibited. It is a remarkable fact that in other countries where State ownership of railways has been the rule success has een as marked a feature in the managenent as failure has been in the Dominion. In Germany State ownership of railways has been tested for over 40 years. At the very beginning of railway construction, to 1835, the Prussian Government, in return for pecaniary aid, resurved to itself the right of control. In 1848 the Government began to construct its own roads and to buy out others. In 1885, out of 14,000 miles of railroad, but ,000 were in private hands, the rest in he hands of the Government. In the last en years the mileage has increased 33 per cent. and the revenue (according to statis-tics just published) has increased 41 per cent., while in England and France the revenue but 20 and 3 per cent. respectively. Moreover, it appears that the German lines are operated more economically than in either France or England, the net evenue having increased 23 per cent. in Germany, 15 per cent. in England, and having slightly decreased in France during the last ten years. The reroads was in 1890-91 an average of 4.86 per cent.; in English roads, 4.10 per cent.; in French roads, 3.75 per cent. As regards accommodations for the public on the Ger-

nan roads, we quote the following from Encyclopædia Britannica (vol. 20, p. 251):

"The prices paid for the roads by the Government were, as a rule, high "but the lines are nevertheless managed with considerable profit to the State. The passenger train service is prompt and comfortable. The speed attained is greater than elsewhere in Continental Europe, the maximum being about 45 miles. The passenger rates are low, averaging about 0.7d per mile (1.4 cents) for all passengers carried. There are comparatively few accidents. The freight service is rather slow, and the charges are not relatively so low as those for passengers. On the other hand, they have for the most part avoided preferential rates."

It may be urged that in an old country ke Germany it is easy to make railways pay, and that colonial governments cannot be expected to operate lines on paying conditions. Australian experience tells a different story. The Government-owned ines there were operated not only to pay running expenses, but to carn 4 per cent.
on the capital borrowed for their construction. That is business-like.

Turn to our Canadian Government rail-

ways, and mark the difference. If we add \$325,082, which was improperly charged to capital account on the Intercolonial, Prince Edward Island and other Government lines, it is found that these railways last year cost the taxpeyers of Canada \$951,280 over and above their entire earnings. Fiftythree millions of our money has been spent n building the railways, and there is this deficit of nearly a million dollars without the payment of a dollar of interest on the investment! On the Intercolonial alone the gross earnings in 1892 were \$2,945,441, while the expense of operating the road reached \$3,439,377. The same story is told about the Prince Edward Island Railway, which cost the taxpayers of Canada \$289,706, while the receipts were only \$157,432. There must be something radically wrong in the management when the expenses of operation increase \$31,716, while there is a reduction of earnings by

In view of these returns, of the constant leeding of the public purse to clear off deficits, of the carrying of coals and other mmodities for political favorites at less than cost, one hardly wonders that there is heart and selfishness of mankind relax their a demand in some quarters that Government nanagement be recognized as an irremedi able feature, and that the lines now making uch wretchedly bad returns should be handed over to a private company. What seems to be needed more than anything else is a change of administration.

How can any railway be expected to pay even for axle grease if its managers carry freight below cost, as the Intercolonial has been doing for years? How can it be hoped to turn a deficit into a surplus fund for ation than there is in Canada, if the line i run in the interests of private parties, and is "bled" of its paying traffic with the connivance of the very men charged to operate it for the benefit of the whole Dominion? Washington, Jan. 4.—The Agricultural Department report shows the wheat crop to be above the average one in yield, the estimated product being 515,949,000 bushels. The rate of yield is 13.4 bushel per acre. Theaverage value perbushel—62.4 centz—is the lowest reported, that of 1884 being 64.5 and that of 1887 being 68.1. The corn crop is short. The average yield per acre is 13.1; production, 1,628,464,000 bushels; value, \$209,003,835 acres; product, 661,035,000 bushels; value, \$209,023,611; yield per lushel. The estimates for oats are: Area, 27,003,835 acres; product, 661,035,000 bushels; value, \$209,253,611; yield per acre, 24.4 bushels.

investment associations. London has six charitable institutions,

two hospitals and seven public buildings.

London has a good street railway, which
will be much extended in the next year. London's rate of taxation is 18 mills, which includes all school rates, etc.

London's civic assets are \$2.547,798 34, and the balance of assets over all liabilities is \$422,861 19. The total assessment is \$15,333,097.

London has 44 churches, almost every religious denomination of any importance being represented.

London has markets three times weekly, the best in the west. The great Western Fair is held for ten days in September.
