LONDON, Aug. 2.—Edmund Yates gives the following as the origin of the Franco Siamese trouble: "The fons et origo of the present Siamese difficulty undoubtedly was the desire of France to obtain the trade of Southwest China. Their surveys of other routes from Tonquin convinced them of the superiority of that advocated for so many years by Holt Hallett, which passes from Burmah up the Mekong Valley to Ssumao. This Chinese frontier town gives the only easy access to the Provinces of Yunnan and Sechun; hence the demand in the ultimatum for the east bank of the Mekong from China southward as the French frontier. The people of this country are protesting at what they call a claim spung without warning. This is not the case. Holt Hallett has for years kept the public informed concerning French intentions, as shown in the written statements of their leading authorities in these matters. The Tonquin and China frontiers do not afford a point of entrance to Southwest China in any way comparable for trade purposes with Ssumao. This is the orux of the French demands. It is a fight for what the French and English consider to be the richest undeveloped market in the world. France, by annexing the left bank of the Mekong, would be enabled to build a railway to Ssumao to tap it. She will gain the prestige of opening a means of communication of equal trade importance to the Suez Canal, together with a position in Indo-China similar to that created for her in Egypt by the canal.

England, in view of France's bad faith last week in doclaring the blockade without notifying the powers, is naturally suspicious of the present situation. It is

feared that the French naval force will
commit some fresh outrage which France
will disavow in one breath, while she compliments the perpetrators in the next. The

He looked remarkably well and spoke in the most cheerful manner of the eucouraging results of his tour through the eastern portion of the Province. He expects to open his campaign in Ontario by a meeting in Toronto about the end of Angust.

St. Constant, Que., Aug. 2.—The first meeting held by the Hon, Wilfrid Laurier and his friends in the district of Montreal in the present campaign, took place here to-day. Mr. Laurier arrived from Montreal at 9:50, by the C. P. R. tram, accompanied by Mr. J. I. Tarte, M. P., Mr. A. /. Bruneau, M.P. for Richelieu, and several members of the Club National. On alighting from the train he was received by a deputation of citizens, headed by Mr. Arnold, notary, Dr. Forte and other leading residents of the parish and the surrounding localities. Hon. F. G. Marchand, M.P.P., leader of the Local Opposition; Eugene Lafontaine, ex-M.P.P., M. Bison, M.P.P., Mr. Goyetto, ex-M.P.P., and Dr. Lauclot, of St. Henri, were also present. In the absence of Mr. Simon Letourneau, the mayor of the parish, Mr. Blais, presided. the mayor of the parish, Mr. Blais, pre

sided.

Mr. Laurier was presented with an address, and in reply spoke on the political questions of the day. He said there was not a man in the meeting who could declare that he had not a relative exiled in the United States.

THE CURSE OF CANADA was the Evodus, and there was only one reason for that, and that was the Government of Canada was not a proper one. The cause of immigration from this country was found in the policy which the Governmenthad followed during so many years past. There was no man in Canada to-day who could declare that the Government had succeeded in making out of the National succeeded in making out of the Nations Policy the success which had been pre-dicted for it. The Government declared

succeeded in making out of the National Policy the success which had been predicted for it. The Government declared that the people are prosperous. The people have food, but they have not that prosperity which they should have. If they were rich their children would not be OBLIGED TO EMIGRATE TO THE UNITED STATES.

The farms had fallen in value. The best farms in the country could be bought 25 per cent. cheaper to-day than fifteen years ago. Farms which were worth \$4,000 fifteen years ago are not worth more than \$3,000 to-day. The agricultural class is poorer to-day than when the National Policy was adopted. The Government existed to advance the prosperity of the entire people, and not to erect Curran bridges as they had done in Montreal. The Liberal party in 1878 was blamed for spending \$23,000,000. Still to-day the expenditure had reached \$38,000,000. That was not surprising after the

expenditure had reached \$33,000,000. That was not surprising after the REVELATIONS OF THE CURRAN BRIDGE. GUILTY OF CONTEMPT.

World's Fair Directors Fined \$1,000 Each for Closing the Gates on Sunday.

Chicago, Aug. 2.—Judge Stein, of the Superior court, to-day decided that the World's Fair directors and officers who were directly responsible for closing the fair gates on Sunday, July 23, had violated the injunction granted in the Clingman petition and were guilty of contempt. He ordered that Directors Gage, Hutchinson, McNally and Kerfoot should be fined \$1,000 each and stand committed to jail till the fine was paid.

In the case of Director V. F. Lawson, the court held that the oftender had voted in the belief that the injunction had lapsed,

in the belief that the injunction had lapsed, and was not intentionally guilty. A fine of \$100 in his case was imposed.

Director-General G. R. Davis was held responsible and fined \$250, with the same provision regarding payment.

Massey, Forbes and St. Clair were regarded by the judge as instruments for the execution of the directors' ruling and discharged. Director Nathan was also discharged.

Attorney Eddy, representing the Fair Company, moved for an appeal, and it was granted. The directors and other officers were all in court.



CRIME IN CANADA.

If the monograph on "Grime in Ganada," recently published by Mr. George Johnson, the Dominion statistician, is a useful and interesting document. The statistics cover a period of eleven years, namely, from 1889 to 1892, inclusive.

A very gratifying evidence of the decrease of orime generally, as indicated by the number of convicted oriminals, is the fact that while in 1882 there was one conviction to every 26 of the pepulation, so that every group of 28 persons would contain on the average, one person who had been convicted of crime or misdemeanor, the size of the group of which this could be said has steadily enlarged until in 1891 the assertion would be true only of a group containing 153 persons. It is also gratifying to learn that native Canadians contribute much less than their ratio of criminals, for, while constituting 865 per cent, of the population, they are responsible for only 68 1-5 per cent, of the crime. It is a surprise to find that the English contribute more largely to the criminal population in proportion to their numbers than other people, the Irish being second and the United States third in the 18th. Touching the vexed question of the effect of aducation in diminishing crime, we have the fact that in 1892 more than one-fifth of the convicted criminals were unable to read and write, as against one-sixth in the previous eight years. "Gilt-Edged Butter Compound" - By Paying \$1.50 You Get Three Cents' Worth.

Ottawa, Aug. 2.—Misdirected letters falling into the hands of the Postoffice Department reveal the latest device for the defrauding of farmers. "Gilt-Edged Compound" is the name, and it consists of 3 cents' worth of pepsin sold at \$1.50. The farmer is directed to take a pint of fresh milk and as much of the "Compound" as he can heap on a silver dine. These two are placed in a churn with one pound of soft butter. The mixture is then agitated for a short time, when it soon becomes transformed into two pounds of apparently good butter. To the Editor of the ADVERTISER:

Sermons are being preached to us in one of great complacency on the financial crisis in the United States. Canadians are bidden to contrast their own happy im munity with the failure of banks and other evidences of commercial disaster among our neighbors. A political moral is, of course, drawn. The main cause of the American crisis is the Silver Bill. To that extent the disaster is a salutory warning against legislative tampering with the currency. and at the same time against permitting local interests, like those of the Silver States, to interfere with a national policy; and our immunity is a very legitimate subject of self-congratulation. But the crisis in the United States is a disturbance in the Stock Exchange, and a consequent depreciation of investments, not a decline in the general wealth and national prosperity of the nation. In the case of Canada, owing to persistence in a vicious system, there is a decline in substantial wealth and general prosperity. Farm property in this Provat least 30 per cent., and in Toronto rents, which denote the value of the houses, have declined by one-third.

But what is a financial crisis, even se evere as that which now prevails in the stock markets of the United States, com pared with the commercial loss and calamities of other kinds which would be brought upon Canada by entanglement in one of Great Britain's maritime wars? 



The Narrow Escape from Death of a Brocklyn Woman.
