One of the male entestainers on the stage was shot in the arm. The spec-tators made a rush for the doors, None

of them was injured.

Lizraki had fired a half-dozen shots before a group of soldiers from the Pre sidlo military reservation seized and disarmed him. He was arrested and taken to the police station. No reason for the shooting was learned.






