EGED SAFE "BLOWER" BACK FOR A NEW TRIAL

Peter Fairburn Will Appear Before Judge Macbeth To Elect on Thursday—Man Claims He Is Innocent of the Crime For Which He Was Convicted.

a term of three years in the Kingston penitentiary by County Judge Elliott on that they were innocent, and Fairburn in a charge of assisting in the blowing of particular claimed that he knew nothing the safe in Hawkins' Flour Mills at Arva, was brought back to London last night, and will appear before Judge Macbeth tomorrow morning to make his election for the new trial that was ordered by the court of appeal.

The safe was blown on the night of March 27, and the work showed that it had been done by experts. A hole was drilled in the door of the safe and nitroglycerine was poured in and the explosion muffled by means of a number of flour bags. The next day Fairburn and John Murray, a well-known cracksman, were arrested in a local hotel while both were under the influence of liquor. Attention was drawn to the men on account of Fairburn attempting to extract \$130 The men were first arrested on a charge of vagrancy, but when dismissed at the police court were immediately arrested by High Con-stable Hughes on a charge of safe-blowwere immediately alrested by high constable Hughes on a charge of safe-blowing and theft.

A number of witnesses were produced by the crown at the trial, who stated the new trial as soon as possible.



MEMBERS OF BOTH SIDES ATTACK GOVT. BANK BILL

Duncan C. Ross (West Middlesex) and Major Sharpe (Con.) Lead in Warm Onslaught-Finance Minister Opposed to Public Inspection of Banks.

Ottawa, Jan. 21. - Finance Minister White's bill, providing for the decennial revision of the bank act, was under heavy fire day, and Mr. Duncan Ross, the Liberal member for Middlesex and Major Sam Sharpe, the Conservative member for North Ontario, earnestly supported the view that the entire subject of banking and currency should be investigated by a monetary commission to be created by Parliament, Mr. W. F. Maclean suggested that the present charters of the banks be extended for two years, with a view to the recasting of our banking and currency laws upon

the coming in of a report from the monetary commission.

Mr. Carvell (Carleton, N. B.) and Mr. Demers (St. John and Iberville) supported Mr. Maclean's proposal that the bank charters be extended only for two years and until a monetary commission could investigate and report on the situation.

OPPOSES PUBLIC INSPECTION.

Mr. White, in moving the second reading of his bill, eulogized the bank act as it now stands, and declared that it stood in little need of any amendment. He was unalterably opposed to the public inspection of banks, or to any increase in the money of the country by the issue of Dominion notes against a gold reserve of less than 100 per cent.

DEFECTS NOT REMEDIED.

W. F. Maclean really opened the debate by declaring that there were many grave defects in the present by the bill before Parliament. He pointed out that depositors were not sufficiently protected, that no public inspection is provided for, and that no attempt was made to prevent bank mergers or the formation of a money trust. On the contrary impediments were thrown in the way of any attempt hereafter to organize a new bank by popular subscription.

Mr. Maclean also complained of the sterilization of the postal savings bank system, and of the inability of the banks to supply the currency needed by the business of the country. After stating other objections to the present bank act, he proposed the institution of a Government bank which would be the only bank of issue in Canada.

A STRIKING SCENE.

There was a striking scene when Major Sharpe (Conservative) was concluding his speech of revolt on the bank act at half-past eleven tonight. The North Ontario man was following the lead of Duncan Ross, the West Middlesex Liberal, and his declarations were greeted with approval by the coterie of Ontario Conservatives who surrounded him at the back of the chamber, while the ministers sat in the front benches alone and in silence. The ministers present conferred anxiously with Hon, Mr. White, while Chief Conservative Whip Stanfield flitted uneasily between ministers and members. When Major Sharpe concluded no less than seventeen fellow-Conservatives accompanied him from the House.





This is not a good way for children, who had better have sugar on their bread, or use good candy for desert, not before meals. But for older people cake has its use in giving variety. It has high food value, for it contains not only protein, sugar and starch, but also fat, another fuel food that gives even more heat and power to work.

We often eat cake simply as an adjunct to the meal, after we have already eaten enough; perhaps that is one reason why it is not always digested. Another reason for the indigestibility of cake and pastry may be that both Sugar and fat are too concentrated, and that fat is less digestible when heated to a high temperature.

Each housekeeper should study her own resources and needs before giving much time to the making of cakes and pastries. Would not sugar in a simpler form satisfy the needs of her family as well?

So many things are required in making cake that we see the need of careful arrangement of materials in order to save steps. Have the sugar flour, spices, salt, flavoring, and all commonly used utensils so arranged in your kitchen that each may be easily reached. Kitchen arrangement is very important for ease in work. This spoon is used five times a day; put it where it will be handy. That is used twice a year, then, it does not so much

rich and more expensive one. Make the cake in an easy way. Much time can be saved by melting the butter. Just see that the fat does not get too hot, and that it is thoroughly mixed. But in these days butter often seems too expensive to use for cakes. Try some of the vegetable fats, now on the market, or beef drippings tried out at home, or chicken fat. Only be sure it is fresh and untainted. Be sure to add salt, and use a little less of the fat than you would of butter. Except when the cake is hot, no one will distinguish the difference. Water may be substituted for milk to good advantage.

A good general rule for cake is this: One cup of liquid to three cups of flour, a half cup of butter, two cups of sugar, three eggs, four teaspoons of baking powder, a little salt (one teaspoon if an unsalted fat is used).

If a richer cake is wanted, so that more fat is used, the liquid is lessened; a cup of fat, for example, takes a half a cup of liquid; if more eggs are used, less baking powder is necessary. When we reach "pound cake," we have a maximum of fat and egg, and no liquid or baking powder. On the other hand, if a plainer cake is needed, fat and eggs are lessened, liquid and baking powder increased. The plain cake becomes only a very sweet muffin. With this fundamental rule, any variation may be made with flavoring, spices, chocolate, fruit. Pastry is for grownups, not for children. Even for the grownups, simple

puddings, gelatine dishes, or fruit cooked or uncooked, should be more commonly used. Do you ever make your pies without an upper crust? English tart, or the old-fashioned deep apple pie, made in this way, with light and flaky pastry, would seem to reduce the indigestibility to a minimum.





In addition, there will be harness horse races. A circuit for Canadian horses similar to the Grand Circuit in the United States is being organized, over mile tracks in Montreal, Toronto, Windsor, Fort Erie and London. These will be earlier than the meetings held on the Grand Circuit In the United States.

Mr. J. L. Counsell informed The Advertiser today that it as expected that work would be commenced as early in the spring as possible.

"We want to be ready for the fall meeting," declared Mr. Counseil. "I think we will start as soon as the frost is out of the ground, and rush the work to completion. We will be in the same circuit as the Woodbine, Blue Bonnets, Hamilton, Fort Erie and Windsor."



NO DUTY ON MEATS **DEMOCRATS' PLAN**

of Life.

Washington, Jan. 22 .- "Free meat," proposed by the House Democrats at the last session of Congress, but blocked by a Presidential veto, was indicated as part of the extra session of the Congress tariff revision program at tre hearing before the House committee on ways and means teday.

Members of the committee emphasized the majority sentiment in favor of free meats and a strong trend toward free cattle, in accord with the general policy of the Democrats last year to transfer the necessaries of life to the free list, including tree sugar and free lumber.



Ald. Glass Astonished. "Do I understand this thing right?" asked Ald. Glass. "Their original contract price was \$39,750. With the building but partly erected, and not all the machinery on the ground, they want \$25,837.50?"

"That is precisely it," answered City Engineer Brazier. "I have estimated that they have done \$13,000 worth of work on the building, and \$10,000 worth of material is on the grounds. I would suggest that they be paid 75 per cent. of the amount of work done, \$9,000. They have already been paid about \$5,-500, and I would give them a check for he balance."

"That is a mighty bad contract," declared Ald. Saunders. "Surely it does not mean what it says. If we were to pay 65 per cent. on the progress of the work, I could understand it, but this seems altogether too much onesided. It is not fair."
