Ottawa, March 18.—Animated scenes preceded the formal opening of the House this morning for the purpose of electing a speaker. The corridors of Parliament were thronged with members, new and old. The new members, who number 125, were mostly here. In the Commons chamber Mr. W. B. The bell summoned the House to meet promptly at 11 occock, and the members soon thronged the chamber. There was much hand-shaking and every appearance of good-fellowship prevailed. Sir Robert Borden and several of the cabinet ministers were not in the Commons before the members were summoned to the Senate to receive instructions to elect a speaker. Sir Wilfrid Laurier, who arrived early, shook hands with Hon. C. C. Ballantyne, Major-General Mewburn, Hon. N. W. Rowell, Hon. J. Calder and other ministers, and a large number of members on both sides of the House. It was observed that Hon. W. S. Fielding took his seat at a considerable distance down the siste on the Opposition side of the Meuse in the Verdener withle Dr. Michael Clark and the sector. at a considerable distance down the aisle on the Opposition side of the House, while Dr. Michael Clark and Mr. Fred Pardee occupied seats near the ministers on the Government side. Mr. J. G. Foley, clerk of the crown in chancery, presented the roll of members to the clerk of the House, and immediately after Col. Ernest Chambers, usher of the Black Rod, with the customary tepping on the door of the House of Commons chamber arrived to summon the commoners to the Senate, where they were instructed by Sir Charles Fitzpatrick to return to the Commons and elect a presiding officer. Mr. Northrup, the clerk of the House, had previously made the formal announcement that the Commons was without a speaker.

Must Not Shrink.

The effort which yet lies before us demands our sternest resolves, but we shall not shrink from it if our hearts are as firm and our courage as undaunted as those of our countrymen who hold our battle line beyond the seas. at Samogneux, north of the Bois-deCaurieres and near Bezonvaux. They entered the French lines at various points. Violent French artillery inflicted heavy casualties on the attackers, and they were unable to hold on to the trenches they had gained.

The front east of the Meuse has been the scene of much violent artillery

fighting in the last month. The French Success. The French success west of the was made at Malincourt, west of Dead Man HIII. At the Cheppy Wood, immediatey west of Malin court, the French late Friday penetrated German trenches on a front of 800 metres to a depth of 300 metres. After destroying the positions the French returned with 80 prisoners and 7 machine guns. East of Rhelms, in the Champagne, German troops gained momentarily footing in French positions west of Vaudesincourt, but suffered heavily under a French counter-attack which restored the situation. Raiding activities on the British front have died down somewhat, and the Germans, for the moment at least, have given up their strong raids on the Ypres-Arras line. The artillery fire here and in the Cambral area, however, is Intense. British airmen persist in their bombing ralds against miltary targets, and have accounted for 23 more German

machines. On the American sectors at Toul and Luneville there has been no change in the situation. American patrol parties are still visiting the enemy lines and returning with valuable information. On the Toul front, the American artillery fire has been very heavy, the gunners shelling biliets, troops and works over an area approximately six miles wide and two miles deep. 

MILK PRODUCERS TO CO-OPERATE WITH THE UNITED FARMERS

Middlesex Men To Join Other Organization.

At a meeting of the Middlesex Milk roducers in the county buildings Sat-rday afternoon, the organization deided to join the United Farmers' Asso-lation of Ontario. R. W. E. Burnaby, president of the Inited Farmers' Association addressed the meeting, and told of the work of his society. He said the United Farmers' ciation possessed a membership of 0 representing 350 clubs in the

"I am not a paid official of the United Farmers' Association," said Mr. Burnaby. "There is no industry in Canada which is not organized. Every business is organized, even the bootblacks of Winnipeg, who are known as the Winnipeg Shoe Blacks.

Must Stick Together.
"They say it is useless for the fairs of thing of organizing, because they will of stick together. If this is true you not stick together. If this is true you might as well throw up your hands now. I know of two or three local organizations which asked their customers to pay them a little more for milk. The customers did not ship mik to the concerns. If the farmers stick together like this we shall be a great success. "In Toronto the men who deliver the milk get as much for it as the farmer who produces the milk. Is this a fair deal?" asked Mr. Burnaby. "The farmers do not look after their own affairs a much as they should," he continued. "In Montreal one of the members of the
