## FORMER CROWN PRINCE OF GERMANY ESCAPES FROM HOLLAND INTO NATIVE LAND

Hints have come from Germany within the past few days that military easte there would not be averse to bringing about a itary situation within the former empire that would embarrass Allies in putting the peace treaty into effect, and it seems not probable that the move made by the ex-crown prince is conected with some such plan.

The former crown prince made his way into Holland shortly after the signing of the armistice last November and was interned there by the Dutch Government, taking up his residence on the island of Wieringen in the Zeyder Zee.

#### CONFERENCE HEARS OF ESCAPE.

Paris, June 26.—News of the escape of the ex-crown prince caused a considerable stir in peace conference circles. While it is not felt that he is a figure around which the reactionaries and monarchists would gather enthusiastically, nevertheless his act is re garded as an event of considerable significance in view of other German recalcitrancy.

Washington, D. C., June 26 .- Confidential reports that the former German crown prince, and also probably the former emperor, would attempt to re-enter Germany after the signing of the peace treaty, were received recently by government officials here. This became known today after a dispatch telling of the escape of the crown prince had been received.

It has been shown that many firms, which had a comparatively small dous extent since the excess profits tax came into existence. The Govcapital, and the percentage of profit has been computed on the accumulation of these, instead of upon the original paid-up capital. It is obvious that by this method such firms have "legally" evaded the war tax. 61 Per Cent Looks Like 24.

For instance, the Harris Abattoirs were capitalized in 1914 at \$800,-During the succeeding years, and up to 1917, the firm accumu surplus (after paying its dividends) of \$1,200,000. In 1917, the Govnment fixed the maximum profits of the packers, and the battoirs capitalized its surplus, making a paid-up capital of two mil-on dollars. Since then, it has accumulated a further surplus of half million. That is, it apaised its plant and business, and had a surplus of assets over liabilities \$3,770,000, to which it added \$230,000 for good will and trade marks, making a total of four million dollars surplus.
