Successful Negotiations Carried Out by Mayor Little

Will Be Erected by One Concern, Says President of Chamber of Commerce.

Negotiations which will bring three more American industries to London will be closed this week by Mayor Little and Ald. John Bridge, the latter announced today. Both the mayor and Mr. Bridge have been out of the city a number of times recently to make arrangements with the heads of the industries to locate here.

Practically all details now are complete, and the deals will be closed within a few days. One of the industries will build a plant larger than any yet secured for the city.

Ald. Bridge also announced that work was started today on the construction of a London and Port Stanley Railway siding into the Beatty Bros. plant. Completion of this will clear the way for the erection of a large addition to their present plant, and will mean the employment of several hundred men.

728 CONVICTIONS

For Non-Indictable Offences Made During Past Three Months.

Seven hundred and twenty-eight convictions for non-indictable offences were made in the local police court from September 1 until November 30 last, according to figures compiled by John Moule, clerk of the court. The majority of the offences were penalized by fines which brought the total amount of fines collected during the year to \$43,450.

They are punished by both fines and terms of imprisonment.



"I do not think that I should tell you what I have to shy about the matter till I have laid it before the commissioners" said the chief.







It was intimated by members of the commission today that boxers in the stables of Tommy Walsh and Jimmy Dunn, managers respectively of the two boys, probably would be disbarred from appearing here for the remainder of the season. If this is done, it is likely they also will be prohibited from boxing in the state.

Moore and Tremaine were to have boxed 10 rounds here Thursday night, but because Tremaine was one pound over the stipulated 119 pounds, Moore refused to go on and the bout was cancelled.

Boxing is on a new basis in Massachusetts. For the first time in a quarter century professional matches are open to public participation under legal sanction.

The new order of things is the result of a law establishing a state boxing commission, and stipulating some of the conditions under which the sport must be conducted. These provide for ten round bouts, the rounds of three minutes each to be conducted by clubs licensed by the commission.

Every person connected with a bout must be licensed, physician, referee, trainer or second. The physician is required to examine the contestants three hours before the bout and to certify in writing that each boxer is physician; is required to examine the contestants three hours before the bout and to certify in writing that each boxer is physicially fit. the state racing commission sees fit to fix, for the development of horse breeding and for improvements for the comfort of the patrons of racing.

Resolutions to this effect were adopted at the annual meeting of the club's stockholders yesterday.

DENIES KNOWLEDGE TURKS AND RUSSIA

Lloyd George Says Government Knows Nothing About It.

LONDON, Dec. 6.—The House of Commons was informed this evening by David Lloyd George that the British Government had no knowledge of the conclusion of any alliance between the Turks and the Russian Bolsheviki.

A dispatch from Geneva, November 29, gave the outline of an alleged treaty which Nikolai Lenine, the Russian soviet premier, had concluded with Mustapha Kemal Pasha, leader of the Turkish Nationalists. The treaty secured the integrity and restoration of Turkish authority to all pre-war territory and gave Turkey control of the new states of Syria and Arabia. It also included an arrangement between Russia and Turkey to join forces for the liberation of Mohammedan countries.

Total Value of \$1,636,664,-900 For Year 1920, Ottawa Figures.

OTTAWA, Dec. 6 .- (By Canadian Press.)-A total value of \$1,636,-Press.)—A total value of Value, 664,900 for the field crops of Canada during 1920 is estimated by the Dominion Bureau of Statistics in a statement issued today. This compares favorably with 1919, when the figure was \$1,452,437,500, and with 1918, when the total estimated value was \$1,372,935,970. London Member Says Government Should Boost Sales Under Scheme.

TORONTO, Dec. 6.—Just what Canada is doing for her citizen-soldiers who returned from overseas wounded and helpless, and for the widows of those who gave their lives for the great cause, was told by Hume Cronyn, M.P. chairman of the parliamentary committee during the last session of Parliament at Ottawa, speaking to the Canadian Club at the regular luncheon at the King Edward Hotel today.

"Away back in the days before the war," said Mr. Cronyn, "Canada had only what is known as the 'pensions act,' dealing with pensions for the few regular troops in the country. The rate then was \$150 per year for a totally disabled soldier or the widow of a soldier killed in action or on duty. Then came the war. It was felt that the rate of pension was too low, and in 1915 this was raised to \$264 per year, and included members of the C. E. F. This was ratified by an order-in-council.

Mr. Cronyn pointed out that four increases had been made since that time.
