Adopts Measure After Defeat of Clause To Create National Council.

Senator Pardee Stresses Dominion's Need For "Sturdy, Individual Canadianism."

OTTAWA, May 18 .- (By Canadian Press.)-The national defence bill was finally adopted by the senate headed by W. Elliot (South today, after the clause creating a national defence council was de feated. The chief criticism on this point was the salary of \$4,500 per annum paid the deputy minister of militia as vice-president of the

council. An amendment by Senator Dandurand, which restricted emolument to the vice-president of the proposed council, was previously defeated.

Senator Pope called the attention of the government to the deplorable condition which surrounded many of the settlers under the soldiers' land settlement scheme, and asked if the government proposed to take any action for their relief.

Senator Dandurand replied that big problem had arisen out of land settlement. The House of Commons had appointed a special committee to investigate the question of sol diers' civil re-establishment, and the government's policy would be formulated on the findings of that committee.

Senator Griesbach drew the atten tion of the government to the census racial classification, and the rumor that it was to be changed. At present there was no recognition of Canadian nationality, and each person must state the race from which he sprung. He believed that this present system should be main-

BUY YOUR L. & P. S. TICKETS AT DEPOTS

Ten Cent Surcharge To Be-Levied On Tickets Sold On Trains.

Commencing next Monday, May 22, the London and Port Stanley Railway will adopt a system which has been in vogue on the steam railways for many years, under which a 10cent surcharge will be collected from passengers who board trains at Lonlon, St. Thomas, Glanworth or Port Stanley and buy their tickets on the

Depot ticket agencies are maintained by the railway at each of these points for the convenience of the public, and ticket sales can be more satisfactorily handled there than on the trains. Such transactions en route delay the conductor in the performance of his duties, and of the speed of trains and the heavy traffic it is desirable that the passengers have their tickets ready when the trip commences.

Therefore, passengers from the points named who purchase their ickets on the trains will be charged 10 cents extra.

The conductor will give a receipt for this amount, and the 10 cents will be refunded by the railway if the original purchaser presents his receipt to the depot ticket agent at his destination.
