



Of the 504 pupils who left school in 1923 the reasons were given as follows: went to work, 93; left to stay at home, 86; left city, 297; illness, 25; and died, 3.







CHICAGO HOLDS UP WATERWAYS PLAN

Fleming Declares Scheme Will Be Delayed Until Supreme Court Acts.

TWO OBSTACLES

Windsor, Dec. 7.—That all plans for a Great Lake-St. Lawrence waterway must be dropped until the supreme court of United States decides whether Chicago shall be permitted to divert from Lake Michigan 10,000 cubic feet of water per second for her drainage canal, is the contention of O. E. Fleming, K.C., of Windsor, president of the Canadian deep waterways and power association.

Mr. Fleming, referring to his annual report submitted to Windsor chamber of commerce, said: "We cannot go on. The case of Chicago is now before the supreme court, and now before the supreme court, and unless some prohibitive action is taken with respect to Chicago we will never secure Canadian co-operation.

Two Obstacles.

"Two things stand in our way a present. One is opposition of Montreal, which I think can be cleared away by a campaign of education and ability to demonstrate to Montreasts like with

and ability to demonstrate to Montreal that her best interests lie with the proposed waterway.

"The other is one of engineering. As long as Chicago continues to divert 10,000 cubic feet of water per second from its natural course, no matter whether for sanitation or for nower nurposes, just so long will the matter whether for sanitation or for power purposes, just so long will the flow over the falls be decreased and possibilities of hydro-electric development along waterway diminished. While the volume which Chicago is turning back into the Mississippi river may appear to be small in comparison with the vast quantity flowing through the Niagara river and over the falls, it should be remembered that the same volume sent over the falls would produce just eight times the horse-power it produces at Lockport on the canal. For the sake of disposing of her sewage and producing 36,000 horse-power, Chicago is robbing the eastern United States and Canada of something like 287,000 horse-power.
