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"He Was Among Us As He That Serveth"

Bishop of Huron's Funeral Oration An Eloquent Tribute to London's Man of Action.

The funeral oration by Rt. Rev. David Williams, bishop of Huron, was delivered at the public cathedral service at noon today, while the body of Sir Adam Beck lay in state in the cathedral.

"This funeral," he said, "is an extraordinary character. It has not most unusual, full of sadness, but more like a triumphant procession. Not the death, but the life of Sir Adam is what fills the mind today."

"All the great public works carried out in London were due to his vision, initiative and energy—the enlargement of the Victoria hospital, the new waterworks system, the electrification of the London and Port Stanley railway, the building of the Institute of Public Health, the Western university, and the incalculable benefits derived from hydro power—that is an immense list of geniu, determination and love of one man. Any one of them would entitle him to a prominent place in the annals of our country. Together they lift Sir Adam to a place unique and alone as a public servant and benefactor, to the city of London."

Will Live in History. Throughout the province he was known as the great champion of the people in the development and conservation for the people of the water-power of Niagara Falls. His name power of Niagara Falls, his name as the one man who brought the benefits of hydro to every man's home. His vision as to the possibilities of hydro is what has made his practical turn of mind and undoubted honesty and honor, inspired the people with confidence in his zeal, his courage and energy, his determination. As a result his name is writ large over the press of this province no less than of this city, as the greatest and most successful public servant, and the people of this province have profited infinitely through his work and sacrifice. In all his public utility work, his enterprises in the people's service since that time give abundance of evidence of the truth of that description.

Public ownership of public utilities was Sir Adam's great policy, and it received in Sir Adam his finest and noblest expression. He was not content with the public utility, he dreamed, but applied only to minor enterprises. He showed the people the way of application to the very highest enterprise. The keynote of his whole public life was love of the people and service to the people. 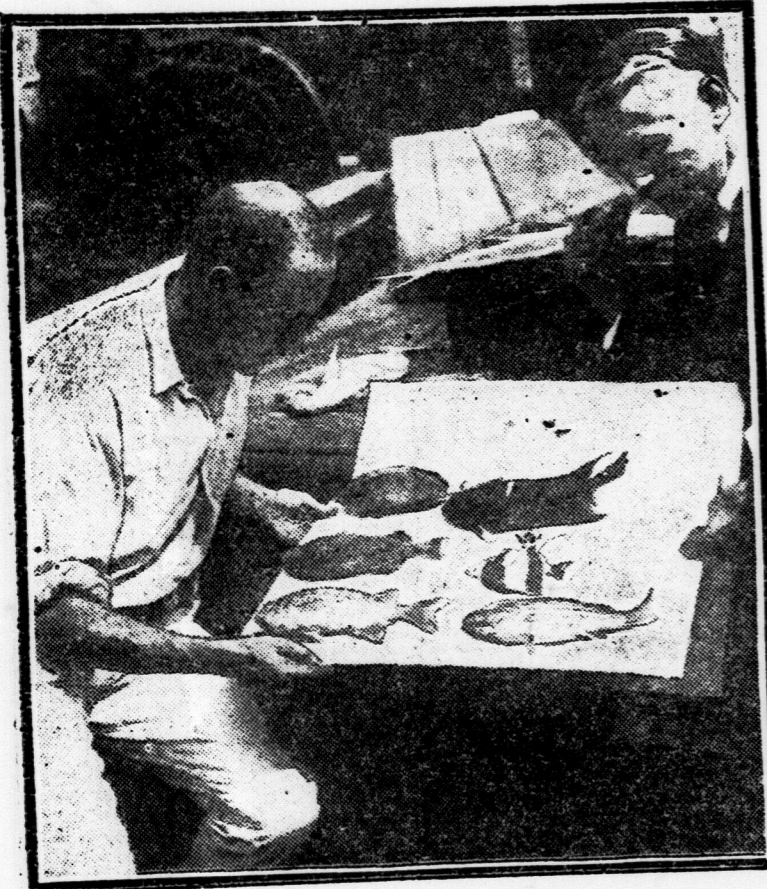

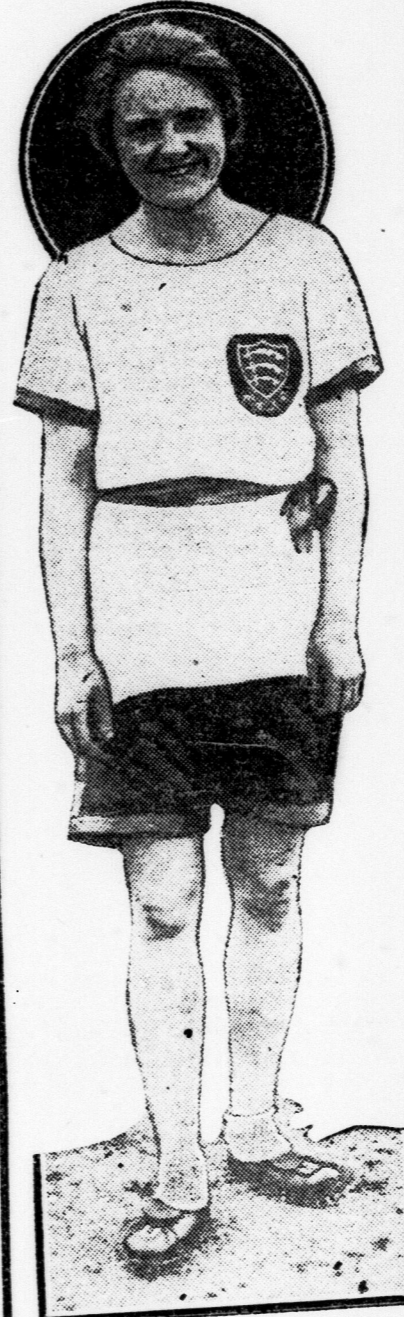

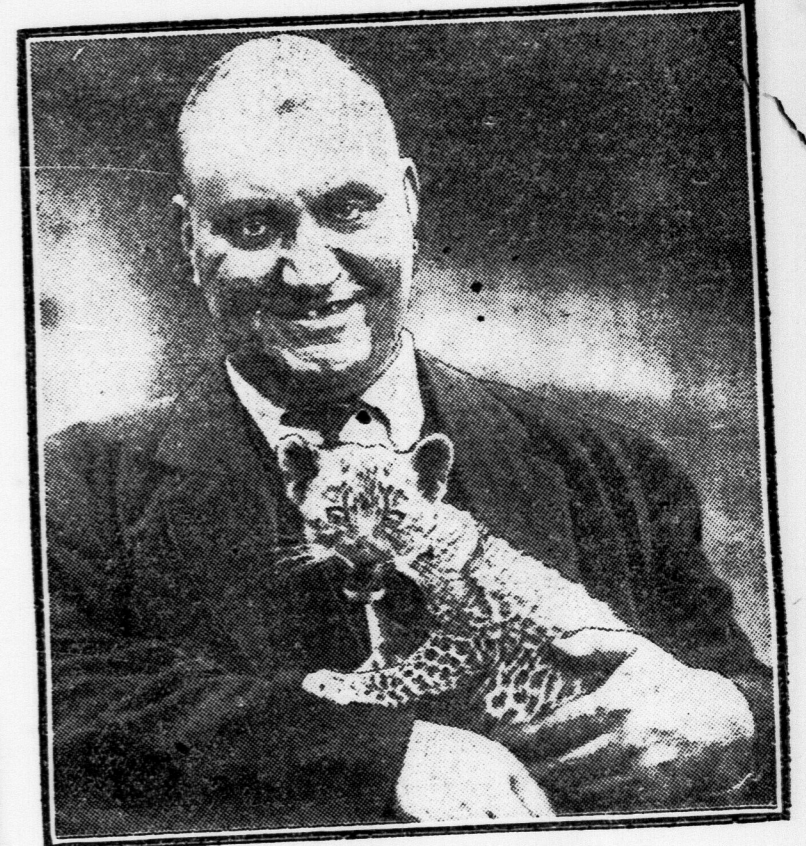

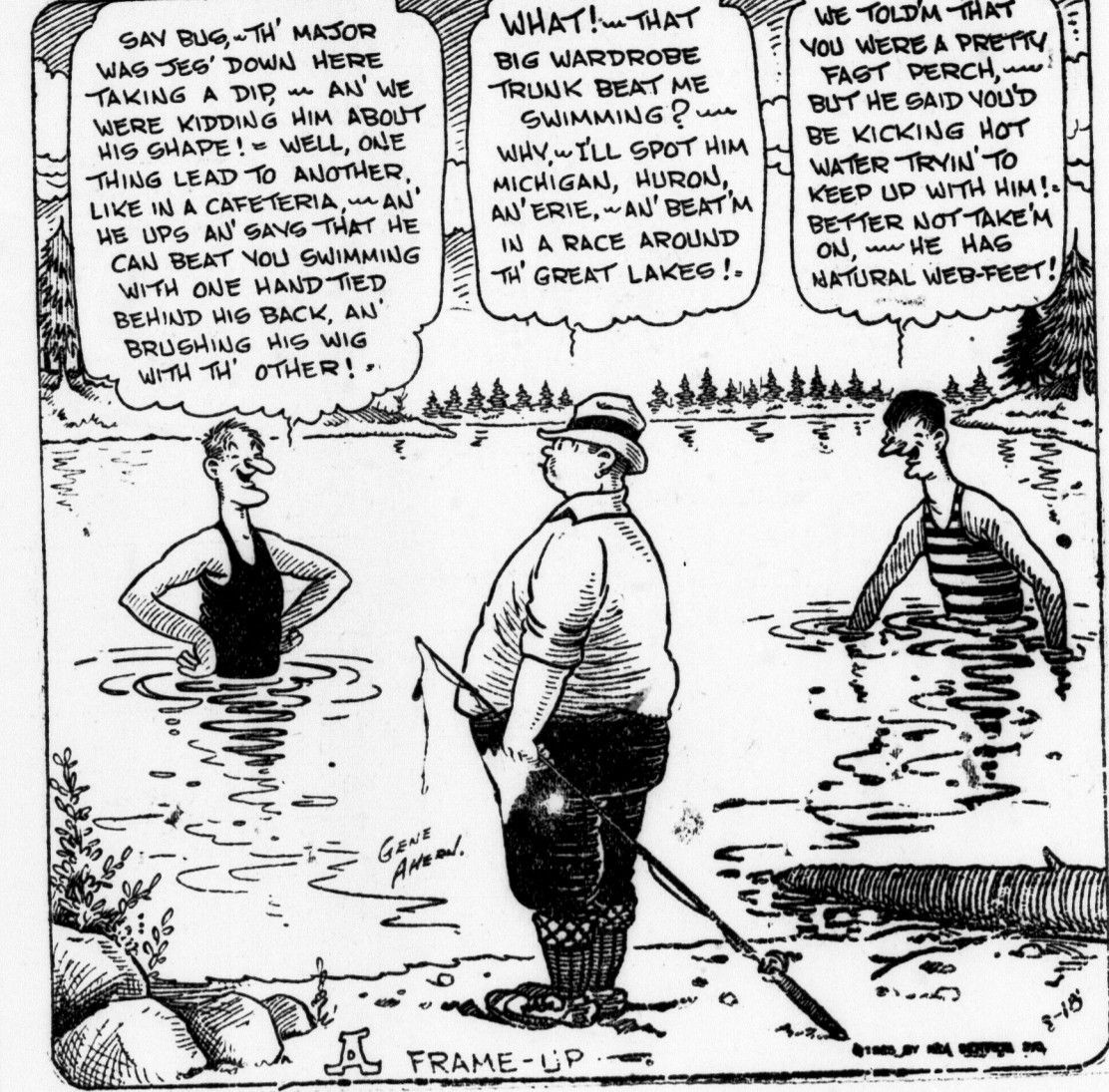

Predict Younger League Winners Will Be World's Champions Again.

SENATORS STRONG

New York, Aug. 17.—American league moguls already have begun to figure on another world's championship for the younger circuit, no matter whether the Athletics or Washington win out in the American league race, or whether it is Pittsburgh or New York in the National.

A casual glance at the percentage columns might lead one to think that the closer grouping in the National indicated better baseball from top to bottom of the league, than the long straggle-out procession in the American. But the American leaguers don't figure it that way. They say the teams setting the pace in the National are the Pirates and the Giants because the Pirates and the Giants are only a little stronger than the other clubs.

Most of the American league managers will concede that the first six clubs in their league could lick the first six in the National in an interleague game.

One American league man, in commenting on the relative showings of this season, said: "If there is one thing that has been proved by this year's races it is, to my mind, that the victory of the Washingtons over the Giants in the 1924 world series was any thing but the 'lucky break' that the Giants called it."

Perhaps one reason why the Athletics and the Washingtons are so far ahead of the rest of the clubs in their circuits may be found in the fact that the Athletics in Boston have been hovering around the 200 mark, and the two leaguers at Boston's expense all season. Around the 400 mark also in the National, the Pittsburgh and New York have not gained so much at Boston as the Athletics and Senators have from the Red Sox.

SACRAMENT EFFECTS FOUR MIRACLE CURES

Infirm Are Healed During Services at Renowned Quebec Shrine.

Three Rivers, Que., Aug. 17.—Four miraculous cures at the sanctuary of Cape De La Madeleine, Que., over the week-end are reported by the Oblate Fathers in charge of the shrine. During the solemn celebrations on Saturday and Sunday, when thousands of pilgrims assembled from all parts of the continent, four people are said to have been suddenly cured of their ailments during the elevation of the Blessed Sacrament. Hyacinth, a paralytic; Mrs. Edouard Beaudry, of Font Vlau, Que., who was deaf; Arsene Boivin, who suffered from chronic rheumatism; and Laurette Lambert, a 12-year-old girl who was crippled, were the beneficiaries. The Lambert girl is now walking without crutches for the first time in years.

SITUATION REMAINS THE SAME REGARDING FEDERAL ELECTION

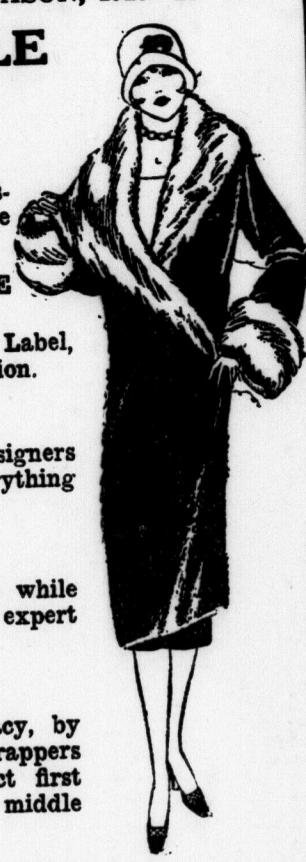

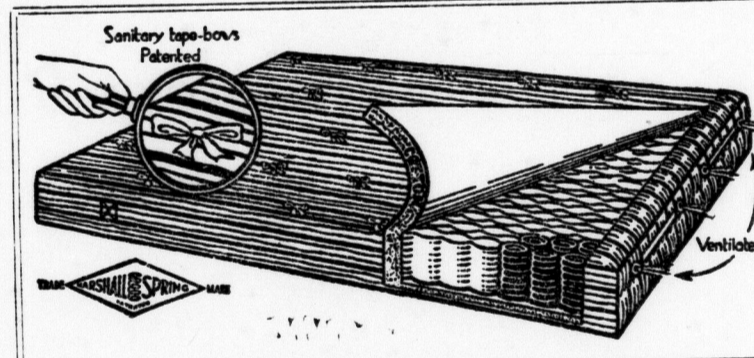

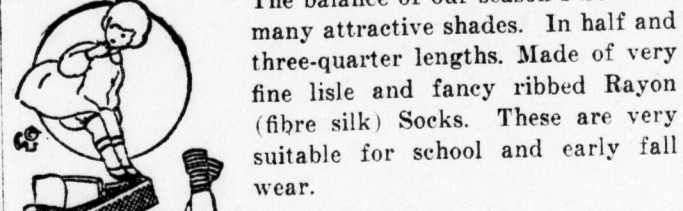
