"The city of St. John, after spending considerable money on expert advice regarding the establishment of a civic lighting plant, has concluded a ten year contract with the Street Railway Company to light the streets with 2,000 candle-power lights for \$75 each. The opinion of the expert was that it would cost about \$70 for the city to do this work, and the aldermen did not consider that there would be any actual saving. The new contract will date from the first of July. At present there are three lighting plants, one in the north end owned by the city, and one in Carleton lately acquired by the Street Railway Company, and the company's central power house. Under the new arrangement all the lighting will be furnished from the one plant.



THE PLANET URANUS.

Oddities a Voyage to This Gigantie World Would Disclose. If Uranus, which is a star of about

the sixth magnitude, were a planet like those little ones called asteroids, which are being discovered by the dozen every year, it could not have much claim upon popular attention, but Uranus is really a gigantic world, more than sixty times as large as ours. Its vast distance, about 1,700,000,000 miles from the earth, is what causes it to look so small. Uranus has four moons, which revolve backward in their orbits—that is to say, they re-volve from east to west around Uranus, while Unanus goes, like all the other planets, from west to east around the sun. It is believed that Uranus rotates backward on its axis also. Moreover, the axis of that great, strange globe lies in such a direction that in the course of its year, which is equal to eighty-four of our years, the sun shines almost perpendicularly first upon one pole and then upon the other. Measured by our time standard, there are forty years of constant daylight, followed by forty years of unbroken night, around the poles of Uranus. And the sun rises in the west and sets in the east there. But the sun looks very small when viewed from Uranus—only one four-hundredth as large as it appears to us. Still it sheds upon that planet 1,500 times as much light as the full moon sends to

the earth, so that daylight upon Uran-

CANADA AND GERMANY

British Preference Blamed For Their Trade Differences.

Mover For Correspondence Says Nothing Is Gained by British Preference -Minister of Finance Claims It Is Purely a Family Affair, and Minister Paterson Says German Market Is Not of Any Importance.

Ottawa, April 24.—In the House yesterday, Donald McIntyre, the newly-elected member from Strathcona, Al-berta, was presented by Sir Wilfrid Laurier and Hon. Frank Oliver and took

Mr. Monk introduced his bill respect-

Mr. Monk introduced his bill respecting industrial and co-operative societies, a measure which he designed to promote and facilitate the co-operative movement among the farmers and industrial classes of Canada.

In answer to Mr. Borden, Hon. Mr. Oliver denied the report that the Ray and Bronson concession had been cancelled, but intimated that all of the hydraulic concessions in the Yukon might be dealt with very soon.

Condemned the Government.

Mr. Armstrong (East Lambton) moved for copies of all correspondence since 1896 between the Government of Canada and the German or British Canada and the German or British Governments respecting the tariffs of Germany and Canada. He condemned the Governments respecting the tariffs of Germany and Canada. He condemned the Government as careless and indifferent to the interests of the farmer in not cultivating trade with Germany. It has been growing gradually less. In 1893 Germany placed a high tariff against Canada, amounting to f00 per cent. Our Government retaliated by placing a surtax of 33 1-3 per cent. upon German imports. The Minister of Agriculture had recently said to a deputation that he had hoped that better trade relations would soon exist, but that if they did not "it would not make any very great difference."

Mr. Armstrong regarded this statement as foolish and irresponsible. On March 1 Germany had put a surtax upon goods from Canada that amounted to prohibition. The apple trade was especially affected.

Nothing was gained by the British preference. Canadian goods sell in England on their merits and not on sentiment, yet it is the British preference that closes to our farmers the ports of Germany. ports of Germany.

Mr. Fielding, Minister of Finance, thought the speeches were unwise, if not unpatriotic. Informal negotiations were now in progress between the two were among the Easter visitors in the village.

The debate at the Polemical Club Friday evening was very interesting. The subject was "resolved that Wellington was a greater general than Napoleon," which resulted in a victory for the negative.

Mr. Borden thought it peculiar if this was purely a "family affair." that England and every colony but Canada escaped the surtax.

Mr. Sproule (East Grey) said that the Liberals had come into power pledged to reduce taxation. They were to give a preference to Great Britain and thereby decrease taxation. What benefit is the British preference to the farmers of Canada? We get in return no benefit beyond that freely given by the mother country to our competitors from the United States.

Mr. Chisholm (East Huron) said that the farmers of Ontario were now driven to depend for their living upon dairy products and fruit. Ultimately they would have to rely upon fruit alone, for in that they need not fear competition from the west. The speaker claimed that the Ontario farmers needed the German market to sell their fruit and on the other hand required cheap sugar. He favored reciprocity with Germany. Admit their sugar free and they will permit our apples to enter free of duty.

Mr. Paterson, Minister of Customs, claimed that the British preference had been approved by the people in 1900, and the German surtax in 1904. He was in hopes that some arrangement could be made with Germany. In drafting the new tariff this could probably be done. The British preference must be retained, even though we lost the entire German market. It was not a market of any importance at the best.

Mr. Henderson (Halton) said he was Mr. Henderson (Halton) said he was Canadian first and British afterwards. The preference simply meant that we took bread out of the mouths of our workingmen to feed the workingmen of England.

TO PREVENT USURY.

Reflections and Reminiscences Called Up on Scanning the Hon, Chas. Fitzpatrick's Bill In House.

The efforts to put an end to usury or the loaning of money at exorbitani rates of interest, are to be commended. It is therefors to be noped that Mr. Fitzpatrick's bill dealing with this question will be made practicable, and that it will become the law of the land. It has been sent to the Committee of Banking and Commerce for the perfecthas been sent to the Committee of Banking and Commerce for the perfect-ing of its details, and thus give the atry the reasonable defence against asses to which it is entitled.

What the Measure Proposes

So far as can be gathered, the bill proposes to limit the rate of interest that the money-lender can charge to 12 per cent. on sums under \$500, and to make the rate after the debt has to make the rate after the debt has fallen due no more than 6 per cent. This is a change for the better, but it is scarcely so sweeping a reform as might be expected considering the gravity of the situation, and the means that may be employed to circumvent the intent of the statute. It can readily be understood that a loan may call for a great deal more than 12 per cent, although no higher rate is mentioned although no higher rate is mentioned in the bond. All that is necessary, in in the bond. All that is necessary, in order to extort an exorbitant rate, is to require the borrower to sign for a much larger sum than he receives. By artificially increasing the principal the interest charge is swollen. What Parliament ought to do is clear. It should make certain that there is no departure from the principle it lays down.

What Britain Did.

In this connection it is of interest to note that Great Britain, afflicted by the usury evil, dealt with it in a drastic way in the year 1900. Up to that time the usury had had a clear field for unchecked operations. Wherever he could find victims he did his heavy work. In the colleges, the schools, the army, the offices, the sheps—in all places where young people were to be found—the usurer operated. The commission of enquiry exhumed the fact that the plan of procedure was the sending of a circular mentioning the convenience that a money-lending firm was to the recipient. The older people had their banks; why should not the younger have financial accommodation also? Money the young persons needed. Why not borrow it from the firm from which the circular came? The army, the offices, the shops-in al from which the circular came? The borrower would be able to satisfy his immediate needs, and nobody would be the wiser! And so the net was spread. Into it the unwary fell, with the result that he was soon heavily involved, the interest swallowing up all the money he could scrape together.

Measuring Medicine.

Use a medicine glass with the amount upon it. Teaspoonfuls and tablespoon fuls are always mentioned, but as these vary in size it is not safe to rely upon them. Drops, too, cannot be properly measured without a glass. Keep the medicine glass perfectly clean. It should be washed out after each dose, in readiness for the next time. It is desirable that if the patient smell, oils, etc., to keep a glass specially for them, letting it soak in hot wa-ter for half an hour after use to remove all disagreeable odor.
