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
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

House of Afsembly,

TUESDAY, 20th JANUARY, 1801.

'HE GENERAL ASSEMBLY having been prorogued to this day—when a sufficient number of Members to compose a House not attending-Adjourned until Saturday.

SATURDAY, 24th JANUARY, 1801.

The Houfe being met pursuant to adjournment-

The Clerk of the Crown attended with the Writ for the Election of a Member for the County of Charlotte, in the room of David Owen, Efg.-by the return of which Ninian Lindsey, Esq. appeared to be duly elected. Ordered, That Mr. Robert Pagan and Captain Agnew attend to see him

qualified before the Commissioner appointed for that purpose.

The House then adjourned until Monday next at eleven of the clock.

MONDAY, 26th JANUARY, 1801.

THE Members appointed to attend Mr. Lindfey, in order to fee him duly qualified, reported, that they had attended accordingly, and that he had taken the usual oaths.

Thereupon ordered, That he take his feat.

A Message from His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor requiring the attendance of this House in the Council Chamber.

The Houfe attended accordingly-and being returned, and the Speaker having taken the Chair-

Read the first time, a bill " for regulating Highways, Roads and Bridges." Mr. Speaker then reported, that the House had attended His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor in the Council Chamber, where His Excellency was pleafed to open the Seffion with a Speech to both Houfes; and that, to prevent mistakes, he had procured a copy of the fame, which he read to the House, and is follows, viz.-

" Gentlemen

" Gentlemen of the Council,

" And Gentlemen of the Affembly,

"DURING the period which has elapfed fince our laft meeting, we have continued to enjoy internal peace and tranquillity; and I have been able, without public inconvenience, to defer calling you from your private affairs till now, when the Revenue Laws, paffed at the laft Selfion, are near expiring. The continuance of these Laws, with fuch additions or amendments as may be found requisite for the present fervice or future prosperity of the Province, is the principal object which I have now to recommend to your deliberation.

" Gentlemen of the Affembly,

" I have given orders for the Treasurer's accounts, and such other papers " as may be necessary for your further information, to be laid before you.

"The falutary measure of extending the Revenue Acts of the last Session to the term of two years, has been productive of a confiderable faving to the Treasury, which, I have the fatisfaction to inform you, is now in a condition to answer every demand on account of past services.

" Gentlemen of the Council,

" And Gentlemen of the Affembly,

"I cannot here omit to congratulate with you on the providential prefervation of His Majefty's life, on a late occasion of imminent danger, and to express that grateful sense of the Divine favor, in that instance manifested to our Country, which must have been deeply impressed on the mind of every loyal subject of a Sovereign so truly and so deservedly beloved and venerated."

On motion of Captain Agnew-

Refolved, That an humble Address be prefented to His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor in answer to the foregoing Speech.

Ordered, That Captain Agnew, Mr. Robert Pagan, Mr. Gay, Mr. Gilbert, and Mr. Peters, be a Committee to prepare the fame.

The confideration of His Excellency's Speech is postponed until Thursday.

The House then adjourned until to-morrow morning at eleven of the clock.

TUESDAY, 27th JANUARY, 1801.

Captain Agnew from the Committee appointed to prepare an Address in answer to His Excellency's Speech, reported—

That the Committee had agreed to a draught of the fame, which he read in his place, and then delivered in at the Clerk's table; where the fame was again read, and agreed to by the Houfe, and is as follows, viz.

"The Humble Address of the House of Assembly.

May it pleafe Your Excellency !

" TO accept the fincere Thanks of the House for your obliging Speech at the opening of this Session of the General Assembly.

"The House recognize, with great satisfaction, the internal peace and tranquillity, which, during the period elapsed fince their last meeting, the Country, under the auspicious administration of Your Excellency, continues to enjoy: And that, without public inconvenience, Your Excellency. has been enabled to defer calling them together until the Revenue Laws, passed at the last Session were near expiring. The House will give their immediate

" immediate attention to the continuance of these Laws, with fuch additions

" or amendments as may be found requisite for the present service or future

" prosperity of the Province, and which they will now make the principal " object of their deliberations.

" The Houfe thank Your Excellency for the orders you have been pleafed to give that the Treafurer's accounts, and fuch other papers as may be neceffary for their further information, be laid before them.

" The Houfe are extremely happy to find that the falutary measure of extending the Revenue Acts of the last Session to the term of two years, has been productive of a faving to the Treasury fufficient to answer every demand on account of past services.

Ordered, That the Speaker direct his Warrant to the Clerk of the Crown to iffue a Writ for the Election of a Member to represent King's County in the room of the faid David Fanning.

On motion of Captain M'Lean-

Refolved, That the Reverend James Biffet be, and he hereby is appointed Chaplain to this House.

The Speaker communicated to the House a letter received from Thomas Street, Esq. during the recess, together with his answer thereto.

Ordered, That Captain M'Lean, Mr. Simonds, and Mr. Siddall, be a Committee to examine and report fuch Laws as have expired, or are near expiring.

The House then adjourned until to-morrow morning at eleven of the clock.

WEDNESDAY, 28th JANUARY, 1801.

Ordered, That Colonel Ellegood and Mr. Lindfey wait upon His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor to know when he will be pleafed to receive this Houfe with their Address in answer to His Excellency's Speech.

Mr. Siddall, by leave, brought in a bill to repeal an Act made and paffed in the thirty-feventh year of His Majefty's Reign, intituled "an Act to alter "and amend an Act paffed in the twenty-fixth year of His Majefty's Reign, "intituled 'an Act for preventing Trefpaffes'—

Which Bill was read the first time.

The Committee appointed to examine and report fuch Laws as have expired, or are near expiring, made a report—which was read, and ordered to lie on the table.

Ordered, That Captain M'Lean and Mr. Robert Pagan, be a Committee to bring in a bill to continue an Act intituled "an Act for regulating, laying "out, and repairing Highways and Roads, and for appointing Commis-

THE Members appointed to wait upon His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor to know when he will be pleafed to receive this Houfe with their Address in answer to His Excellency's Speech, reported, that they had waited upon His Excellency accordingly-and that he was pleafed to fay he would receive the Houfe with the fame this day at two of the clock.

A Message from His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor, with the Treafurer's General Account Current with the Province-the Light-Houfe Account-a lift of Warrants-and a lift of Province Debts.

Ordered, That the faid Accounts be referred to a Select Committee to examine the fame and report thereon.

Captain Agnew, Mr. William Pagan, and Mr. Gay, are appointed for that purpose.

Read the second time-a bill to repeal an Act made and passed in the thirty-feventh year of His Majesty's Reign, intituled " an Act to alter and " amend an Act passed in the twenty-fixth year of His Majesty's Reign, " intituled ' an Act for preventing Trespasses' and a bill " for the further

A Petition from Andrew Crook/hank on behalf of John M. Monagle, Efg. of Windsor, in the Province of Nova-Scotia, was presented to the House and read, fetting forth that Provincial duties have been paid in this Province upon Merchandize imported for the confumption of the Province of Nova-Scotia-and praying that the faid duties may be refunded.

Ordered, That the faid Petition lie on the table.

The House then waited upon His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor with their Address in answer to His Excellency's Speech-

And being returned, Mr. Speaker took the Chair and reported-that the House had waited upon His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor with their faid Addrefs, and that His Excellency was pleafed to make the following Reply thereto, viz.

Which report was accepted—and ordered that the faid Bill be engroffed. Houfe in Committee.

A Petition from the Settlers at *Mace's* Bay and *Dipper* Harbor—praying for fome affiftance to enable them to open a Road of communication with the City of Saint John—was prefented to the House and read.

Ordered, That the faid Petition lie on the table.

Several Petitions from the Inhabitants of the County of Westmorland—were presented to the House and read—setting forth, that the Court-House and Gaol of the faid County have lately been destroyed by fire—and praying that the Parish of Dorchester may be the place for erecting the same, &c.

And on motion of Major *Dixfon*, Ordered that he have leave to bring in a Bill agreeable to the prayer of the faid Petitions.

A Petition from the Settlers on *Washademoac* River—praying a Grant of Seventy-five pounds to enable them to open a Road for the benefit of that Settlement—was presented to the House, and read.

Ordered, That the faid Petition lie on the table.

The Houfe refolved itfelf into a Committee of the whole on the confideration of a Bill to continue an Act made and paffed in the thirty-fixth year of His Majefty's reign, intituled, "an Act for regulating, laying out, and re-"pairing Highways and Roads, and for appointing Commissioners and Sur-"veyors of Highways within the feveral Towns or Parishes in this Province; "and for suspending for a limited time all the Laws now in force relating "to the fame"—

The Attorney-General in the Chair.

The Speaker refumed the Chair-

The Chairman reported—that the Committee had taken the faid Bill into confideration, and had made a progress therein—

And requested leave for the Committee to fit again.

Ordered, That the faid report be accepted.

The Committee appointed to examine the Treasurer's accounts, made the following report, viz.—

"The Committee appointed to examine the Accounts of the Treasurer of "the Province, report—that they have carefully attended to that duty, and "find the feveral accounts of Mr. Oliver to be very accurately stated and "vouched.—

"No. 1-Contains a General Account Current of the Province of New-"Brunfwick, whereby it appears that there was in the Cheft, on the 20th

"day of January last, Bonds and Cash to the amount of £ 2064 .. 16 .. 84.

"No. 2-Contains a List of the Province Debts.

"No. 3—Contains the Light-House Account to the 20th of last January, "in which there appears a balance in favor of the Province of f_{17} . 13. 3¹,

"and which has been carried to its Credit in the General Account Current. "No. 4—Contains a Lift of Warrants to the 20th of January laft, by "which it appears that Warrants have been drawn on the Treasury to the "amount of £ 4199. 14.9, of which fum £ 123. 3. 4 has not yet been "demanded.

"No. 5-Contains a Lift of unpaid Warrants.

"No. 6—Contains an Account of John Chaloner, which the Committee "fubmit to the House, the faid Account not having been included in the "Treasurer's accounts.

"For further information the Committee refer the House to the papers "reported."

On motion of Mr. Robert Pagan-

Refolved, That it is expedient to appoint a Committee for revifing and reprinting the Laws of the Province, to be joined with fuch perfon or perfons as the Council shall appoint for that purpose; and that provision be made for defraying the expence attending the same.

Refolved, That this Refolution be fent up to the Council for their concurrence.

A Petition from Samuel Duffy, Keeper of the Light-House on Partridge Island, was presented to the House and read—praying for an increase of his allowance for that duty—

And a Petition from John Howard, Esquire, and others, Inhabitants of the Parish of Saint Martin's—praying for some affistance to enable them to open a Road—was presented to the House and read.

Ordered, That the faid Petitions lie on the table.

Mr. Rebert Pagan, by leave, brought in a Bill for the better fecuring the Navigation of Paffamaquoddy Bay within Deer Island.

Which Bill was read the first time.

The further confideration of His Excellency's Speech is postponed until to-morrow.

The Houfe then adjourned until to-morrow morning at eleven of the Clock.

TUESDAY, 3d FEBRUARY, 1801.

PRAYERS.

A Petition from Samuel Ketchum and others—praying a Grant of Twentyfive Pounds to enable them to open a Road across the Old Portage from the Head of Bellisse Creek to the River Kennebeckacis—was presented to the House and read.

Ordered, That the faid Petition lie on the table.

The House again refolved itself into a Committee on the confideration of the Bill to continue an Act made and passed in the thirty-fixth year of His Majesty's reign, intituled, "an Act for regulating, laying out, and repairing "Highways and Roads, and for appointing Commissioners and Surveyors of "Highways within the several Towns or Parishes in this Province; and for

" fulpending for a limited time all the Laws now in force relating to the fame." The *Attorney-General* in the Chair.

The Speaker refumed the Chair-

The Chairman reported—that the Committee had taken the faid Bill into confideration, and had agreed to the fame.

Which report was accepted—and ordered that the faid Bill be engroffed.

On motion—Refolved, That this House will, to-morrow, refolve itself into a Committee of Supply.

Ordered, That His Excellency's Speech to both Houses be referred to the faid Committee.

Captain Agnew, by leave, brought in a Bill to empower the Justices of the Peace for the County of York, to make such regulations respecting the Winter Roads or Highways in that County, as may be found necessary.

Which Bill was read the first time.

A Petition from *William* and *Thomas Pagan* and Company was prefented to the Houfe and read—praying that the duties which have been paid upon Forty-fix Puncheons of Rum exported to Halifax, under the particular circumftances therein flated, may be refunded, &c.

Ordered, That the faid Petition be referred to the Committee of Supply.

The Houfe again refolved itfelf into a Committee on the confideration of the Bill to repeal an Act made and passed in the thirty-feventh year of His Majesty's reign, intituled, "an Act to alter and amend an Act passed in the "twenty-fixth year of His Majesty's reign, intituled, 'an Act for preventing

PRAYERS.

Read the third time as engroffed—a Bill to continue an Act made and paffed in the thirty-fixth year of His Majefty's reign, intituled, "an Act for "regulating, laying out, and repairing Highways and Roads, and for ap-"pointing Commiffioners and Surveyors of Highways within the feveral "Towns or Parishes in this Province; and for sufference of a limited time "all the Laws now in force relating to the same."

Ordered, That the faid Bill pais-and be fent up for concurrence.

THO's CARLETON.

"THE Lieutenant-Governor informs the Houfe of Affembly that, from "the feveral fums granted to him, by the acts of Appropriation of the laft "Seffion, for defraying Expences of the Province, together with the amount formerly appropriated to the purchase of Materials for erecting a Building "for the accommodation of the General Affembly and Courts of Justice, he has been able to apply to that important fervice nearly Five Hundred "Pounds, which, with other fums amounting to about Five Hundred more, have been expended in erecting a fuitable Building for that purpose in "*Fredericton*, and that the further expence, for finishing what has been thus "begun, will probably not exceed Seven or Eight Hundred Pounds, for "which the Lieutenant-Governor recommends the requisite provision to the "confideration of the House.

" In most of the different Counties of this Province, there is a want of "fufficient Gaols and Court-Houses, the erection or completion of which "would require expences beyond the present ability of the Inhabitants, with-"out great inconvenience, to defray; the Lieutenant-Governor therefore re-"commends it to the House to take into confideration the making of some "fuitable provision also for this service.
