

Then the Speaker took the Chair at the foot of the Throne, and the Commission was ordered to be put on the Journals, and the Mace was appointed to be carried before him.

The House was adjourned during pleasure.

After some time the House was resumed.

His Excellency the Right Honorable Sir Edmund Walker Head, Baronet, one of Her Majesty's Most Honorable Privy Council, Governor General of British No:th America, and Captain General and Governor in Chief in and over the Provinces of Canada, Nova Scotia, New Brunswick, and the Island of Prince Edward and Vice-Admiral of the same, being seated in the Chair on the Throne, the Speaker commanded the Gentleman Usher of the Black Rod to let the Assembly know "It is His Excellency's pleasure they attend him immediately in this House."

Who being come, the Speaker of this House said,

Honorable Gentlemen, and Gentlemen of the Legislative Assembly.

His Excellency the Governor General does not see fit to declare the causes of His summoning the present Provincial Parliament until a Speaker of the Legislative Assembly shall have been chosen according to law, but that to-morrow at the hour of three o'clock in the afternoon, His Excellency will declare the the causes of his calling this Parliament.

Then His Excellency the Governor General was pleased to retire, and the Legislative Assembly withdrew.

On motion of the Honorable Mr. de Blaquière, seconded by the Honorable Mr. Fergusson,

The House was adjourned until to-morrow at half-past two o'clock in the afternoon.

The House was adjourned during pleasure. After some time the House was resumed.

The Honorable Mr. *Prince* came to the Table and took and subscribed the Oath prescribed by Law.

If in the performance of those duties, I should at any time fall into error, I pray that the fault may be imputed to me, and not to the Assembly whose servant I am, and who, through me, the better to enable them to discharge their duty to their Queen and Country, humbly claim all their undoubted rights and privileges, especially that they may have freedom of Speech in their debates, access to your Excellency's person at all seasonable times, and that their proceedings may receive from Your Excellency the most favorable interpretation.

Then the Speaker of this House said,—

I am commanded by His Excellency the Governor General to declare to you that he freely confides in the duty and attachment of the Assembly to Her Majesty's Person and Government, and not doubting that their proceedings will be conducted with wisdom, temper and prudence, he grants, and upon all occasions will recognize and allow their constitutional privileges.

I am commanded also to assure you, that the Assembly shall have ready access to His Excellency upon all seasonable occasions, and that their proceedings, as well as your words and actions, will constantly receive from him the most favorable construction.

Then His Excellency the Governor General was pleased to open the Session by a Gracious Speech to both Houses.

Honorable Gentlemen of the Legislative Council, Gentlemen of the Legislative Assembly:

I am happy to meet you as the Representatives of the Canadian people in this the first Session of a new Parliament.

When I closed the last Session in the month of June, we supposed that England was at peace with all the world, but at that very time a fearful mutiny was raging in the heart of our Eastern Empire; a mutiny which for the moment seemed to peril all that we had won in *India*, whilst by the atrocities committed in its course, it roused the indignation of the whole civilized world.

The people of Canada, as they have sympathized with the danger and the sufferings of their fellow subjects, will in like manner rejoice at the vigour which has checked this rebellion, and will appreciate the steadfast courage and perseverance which have distinguished our countrymen in the East. It is a source of pride to the British Colonies that with Havelock and Outram is associated the name of Inglis, and that we have sent from Canada some who fell gallantly, fighting at Delhi and Lucknow. The issue of this struggle is in the hands of Providence: we may however, without presumption, anticipate success to our arms, and the firm establishment of British rule in Hindostan.

Towards the close of last year commercial relations both in *Europe* and in *America* have been very much disturbed. In these matters, as you well know, the welfare of every country is more or less affected by the condition of

others; and thus an effectual remedy for such evils is rarely to be found within the reach of any one community. We have reason to congratulate ourselves on the prudence of our commercial men; and we may be proud of the position of our Banks, inasmuch as they stand almost alone on this Northern Continent, in having continued to meet, without shrinking, their obligations to pay in specie. Yet, there is no doubt that the pressure has been, and still is, severe on our merchants, our land-owners, and our farmers. There is no doubt, too, that much may be done to amend and improve our own commercial legislation. I earnestly recommend these matters to your attention, and I therefore solicit your consideration of the following subjects:

The expediency of assimilating the Commercial law of *Upper* and *Lower Canada*. The law of imprisonment for debt, and the law of Insolvency in *Upper Canada*. The law regarding fraudulent assignments and preferences, and that relating to the interest of money in Commercial transactions of every kind.

It appears to me also that the Jury laws require revision, and that the Municipal law of *Upper Canada*, may be with advantage amended and consolidated.

There are no Statutory provisions more important to the Country than those which regulate the franchise, and the trial of Controverted Elections.

Being of opinion that the present Acts require amendment, I trust that you will do all in your power to improve and simplify the existing system. I believe too, that it would be expedient to secure the proper registration and protection of all qualified voters.

A measure will be laid before you, for amending and simplifying the whole system of management of our public lands, and facilitating their occupation by industrious settlers.

I am glad to state that the number of Emigrants in the course of the year just ended was considerably in excess of that of the previous year.

A large extent of territory in different parts of the Province has been Surveyed for the purpose of immediate occupation. Experience has proved that the opening of Roads through the forest has much facilitated the settlement of our wild lands. By making these Roads on a system at once uniform and comprehensive, there is every reason to expect the best results from the aid granted by the Legislature.

The subject of the Fisheries in both sections of the Province is one which deserves your attention, as I believe that they may be so dealt with as hereafter to become a source of Revenue.

In Lower Canada, the Legislative changes made in the Judicial system have been brought into operation. I trust that more ready access to Justice and the speedy termination of Civil Suits will be the result of these provisions.

I congratulate you on the continued success of the Canadian Line of Steamers.

They have already placed our intercourse with *Europe* on a new footing, and I look forward with pleasure to the establishment of a Weekly Line to the St. Lawrence during the next Summer.

I recommend to your notice the increasing value of the Lake Commerce of Canada. Our trade with Chicago and the Western States promises to be important alike to the Upper and the Lower sections of the Province.

During the recess a correspondence has taken place with the Imperial Government and with the Sister Colonies of *Nova Scotia* and *New Brunswick*, in which the importance to Imperial interests of an Inter-colonial Railway and Military Road to *Halifax* has been pressed on the attention of the Home Government. This correspondence I will cause to be submitted for your consideration.

As this Province has already gone to the utmost limit of pecuniary aid to the Grand Trunk Railway Company, it affords me pleasure to state my confident expectation that such aid will prove sufficient to secure the advantages promised by the completion of its Works; and I doubt not that the community at large are fully sensible of the benefits derived from this great and important undertaking.

Gentlemen of the Legislative Assembly,

The Commercial difficulties to which I have already alluded, will be found to have affected our Revenue. This was to be expected, but the diminution is such as to inspire us with no fears for the credit or the tuture prosperity of the Country.

I believe you will find that due economy has been used in the expenditure of the funds entrusted to the Executive Government, and that effectual supervision over the Public Accounts has been maintained by the Board of Audit. I have to ask of you, in the present Session, such supplies as may be required for the public service.

Honorable Gentlemen and Gentlemen,

Correspondence in relation to the *Hudson's* Bay Company and its Territory will be laid before you; as well as an answer to your Address presented to Her Most Gracious Majesty on the subject of the Seat of Government. On the first of these subjects it will be for you to consider the propositions made by Her Majesty's Secretary of State for the Colonies to the Company, and to weigh well the bearing of these propositions on the interests and rights of *Canada*.

Papers will also be submitted to you shewing clearly the steps taken by the Provincial Government for the assertion of those interests and rights, and for their future maintenance.

I now leave you to the performance of your Legislative duties.

Then His Excellency the Governor General was pleased to retire, and the Legislative Assembly withdrew.

The Select Committee appointed to examine and report upon the Contingent Accounts of the Legislative Council for the present Session, beg leave to make their second Report.

Your Committee have examined the Clerk's Accounts from the first day of June last, (being the date to which the last Audit of his accounts extended.) to the twenty-eighth day of February last.

This question has now been considered by Her Majesty and by Her Govern ment, with that attention which its great importance demanded.

The statements and arguments contained in the various memorials laid before them, in consequence of your invitation to the Mayors of the several cities chiefly interested, have been fully weighed.

I am commanded by the Queen to inform you that in the judgment of Her Majesty, the City of *Ottawa* combines greater advantages than any other place in *Canada*, for the permanent Seat of the future Government of the Province, and is selected by Her Majesty accordingly.

The Honorable Mr. de Blaquière moved, seconded by the Honorable Mr. Fergusson,

1. That the Legislative Council has received His Excellency the Governor

General's Message, conveying the Despatch of the Colonial Secretary, with the decision of Her Majesty the Queen as to the place selected by Her Majesty for the future Seat of Government of this Province.

- 2. That this House desires to record its opinion, that the commercial crisis which has so recently extended throughout *Europe* and *America*, has very materially affected the Revenue of this Province, and which is likely still to sustain a further great depression during the present year, from the reduction of imports, and the general stagnation of trade throughout *Canada*.
- 3. That this Province has entered into solemn engagements to provide for the due payment of the interest and redemption of the public debt, incurred chiefly for the erection of great public works, calculated to develope the resources of the Province, whose prosperity is dependent on the maintenance of its public credit, as it has hitherto done: and with this view, and awaiting the revival of trade and business, it is the bounden duty of Government so to regulate the public expenditure, as to avoid placing additional burthens on the people, whilst every where suffering from the sudden depression in the value of all descriptions of property, and the utter impossibility of effecting sales to meet existing engagements, except under ruinous sacrifices.
- 4. That in such a crises the large outlay necessary for the erection of a new Seat of Government, and which the public service does not immediately require, is therefore highly inexpedient, as leading to still additional deficiency in the Revenue.
- 5. That it is inexpedient and highly improvident, at this juncture, with reference to the state of the public finances, to incur any additional expense in providing temporary accommodation for the Seat of Government, and meeting of the Legislature, which must occasion a very large and continuous outlay, followed by another removal to the place where the permanent Seat of Government is fixed.
- 6. That there are now pending great and vital questions between the two sections of this province, on the amicable adjustment of which, it is alone possible to preserve the existing Union of *Upper* and *Lower Canada*, and which require time for their calm and deliberate consideration, if hopes are to be entertained of a favorable issue; but which, if not thus disposed of, will render impracticable the carrying out of Her Majesty's decision.
- 7. That under all these circumstances, and after giving the most serious and careful consideration to their great importance, the Legislative Council is of opinion, that it is inexpedient to proceed this year with the construction of public buildings at *Ottawa*, and that the interests of the Province will be best promoted by continuing the Seat of Government at *Toronto*, until the permanent buildings

are erected, and which ought to be undertaken so soon as the finances of the Country will admit, and the prospect for the preservation of the Union established to the satisfaction of *Upper* and *Lower Canada*.

It being then four o'clock the House was, according to order, adjourned during pleasure, in order that the Committee of Privileges might meet to take into consideration the Petition of the Honorable D. B. Viger.

After some time the House was resumed, and

The Honorable the Speaker reported from the said Committee that they had agreed to a Report, which he was ready to submit for the adoption of the House.

Ordered, That the Report be received, and

The same was then read by the Clerk, as follows:

Council Chamber, Thursday, 22nd April, 1858.

The Committee appointed to consider of the Orders and Customs of this House and Privileges of Parliament, upon the reference made to them of the Petition of the Honorable *D. B. Viger*, on the subject of the proceedings recently had in Your Honorable House, by which the Seat therein of the said the Honorable *D. B. Viger* was declared vacant, have the honor to report:—

That they have read with due care and consideration the said Petition.

That the facts in it stated shew clearly that it was from no desire to avoid the discharge of his duty as a Legislator, and from no undervalue of his position as such, that the Honorable Mr. Viger had absented himself from Your Honorable House during so long a period, but that disease and infirmities which he could not remove were the causes of such absence.

That while Your Committee duly appreciate the principles to which Mr. Viger appeals, viz.: that no man should be condemned unheard, and that no man is expected to do what in nature is impossible, and that as a general rule such impossibility is received as a sufficient excuse for the neglect of that duty which it interferes with, yet in the opinion of Your Committee there is no room nor reason for the application of those principles in the cases of vacated seats with which Your Honorable House have to deal.

Members of Your Honorable House in the position of Mr. Viger received their introduction into, and their place in Your Honorable House, direct from the Crown; and the power by which that House was constituted provided that an absence therefrom of two Sessions should be, and must be, under the sanction of the authority from which the Seat was received.

Your Honorable House had no power to confer the right of Membership, and they had no power either to dispense with it, in whole or in part.

The notification from time to time given by Mr. Viger to Your Honorable

House, of his intended absence and the cause of it, was on his part a commendable act of courtesy, but had no legal effect in excusing his absence or preventing the consequences of such absence. The law was and is plain that the consequences could only be prevented by an appeal to Her Majesty or the Governor, and by his permission for such absence, obtained thereon and notified to Your Honorable House, and the facts stated in Mr. Viger's Petition would no doubt have formed a good ground for such an appeal, had it been made. Even the extreme case put by Mr. Viger, of a person prevented by shipwreck from returning to his place in the House, could in no way prevent the operation of the law.

As the Constitution of the House stood before the Elective principle was introduced, the difficulty in such a case would be removed by re-appointment, and the fact that no provision has been made for such accidents, in the change by which the Crown has deprived itself of the power thereafter of nomination, while it may be regretted as a "casus omissus," cannot alter the plain provisions of the Law.

Under these circumstances Your Committee are of opinion, that when the exparte evidence which is to be obtained from Her Majesty, or Her Representative here, and from the Journals of Your Honorable House is so plain as not to be gain-sayed, no rule or principle of justice is, or can be, infringed by Your Honorable House dealing with the case summarily and without notice; and in this view Your Honorable House appears to have acted from time to time, it being in the power of the party feeling himself aggrieved by the action of Your Honorable House, to exercise the right of appeal, provided by the eighth section of the Act of Union.

At the same time Your Committee would take the liberty of suggesting that, as a matter of courtesy, all appointed Members absent, without the requisite permission, during the whole of one Session, might have their attention called to the consequences of continued neglect to attend, or to obtain such permission, by copies of the seventh section of the Union Act, and of the fourth Standing Order of this House, being enclosed by the Clerk of the House in the circulars sent to them previous to the Call of the House, on the second Friday after the commencement of the Session next following.

Your Committee cannot close this Report without expressing their deep regret that the physical sufferings of Mr. Viger have, for so many years past, deprived Your Honorable House of his presence, and of his very valuable services as a Councillor and Legislator, and that the Statute Law of the Land compelled Your Honorable House to discharge the unpleasant duty of declaring that he was no longer one of its Members. If it will be any consolation to Mr. Viger to know that this regret is sincerely expressed by Your Committee, they will feel that they may, in some degree, have mitigated the harshness with which Mr. Viger seems to think the Law has operated in his particular case.

LEGISLATIVE COUNCIL, Committee Room, Wednesday, 26th May, 1858.

The Select Committee appointed to superintend the Printing of this House, during the present Session, upon the reference made to them of the Message from the Legislative Assembly, of the 28th April last, requesting a Conference on the subject of printing the Journals and Sessional Documents with a view to the reduction of the expenses connected therewith; and also, the Reasons offered by the Managers of the said Conference on the part of that House, on the 6th of May instant, beg leave to report as follows:—

The question of Parliamentary Printing as presented to Your Committee appears to separate itself into two distinct parts, viz: that which is special and must continue under the exclusive control of Your Honorable House, and that which, by agreement, being declared general, may be brought under the joint direction of both Houses.

Your Committee reserve for the present their recommendations on the first point, while they invite the attention of Your Honorable House to some considerations in connection with the general question of Parliamentary Printing, which may be regarded as applicable to both Houses.

It is true that the reasons offered by the Managers of the Conference on the part of the Legislative Assembly, refer almost exclusively to the distribution of certain Parliamentary Papers, still, it should not be lost sight of, that the primary object for which the Conference was sought was of a much more comprehensive nature than the subject referred to in the reasons in question. Your Committee are therefore of opinion that they should endeavour to keep the spirit as well as the letter of the order of reference in view, and avail themselves of every advantage that the occasion may fairly offer to promote those economical objects, which the two Houses of the Legislature appear equally anxious to carry out.

Having given the subject of Parliamentary Printing their very attentive and

anxious consideration, Your Committee have arrived at the conclusion that any considerable reduction of the expenses connected therewith, can only be obtained by inaugurating, as soon as the present contracts shall have expired, an entirely different arrangement from that which now exists. What that arrangement should be, will be better appreciated, if Your Honorable House will be pleased to consider the somewhat complicated and expensive methods by which the present system is carried on. To understand these more perfectly, Your Committee have thought it desirable to refer *seriatim* to the various subjects comprised under the general head of "Printing and distributing Parliamentary Documents."

Bills.

A Bill having been introduced into Your Honorable House is at once printed for the first time by Your Contractor. It passes through all its stages, and being printed for the second time by the Queen's Printer, (or for the third time, if it should happen to have been ordered to be printed, as amended, in the course of its passage,) it is sent to the Legislative Assembly for concurrence. Arriving there, it is either printed anew for the third or fourth time by the Contractor for that House, or it is struck off in a fresh shape, from the second impression, by the Queen's Printer. Bearing in mind that a Bill must be printed in both languages, the result shews that, under certain circumstances, between the Government and the Parliament, the State may have to pay six, or eight, separate charges for "composition." It must pay for four.

Beyond the expenditure in labour and money, it should not be lost sight of that the present system is attended with considerable waste in regard to time. Notwithstanding the exertions made by the Queen's Printer to keep pace with the Legislation of the Session, the fact is notorious that the prorogation is usually more or less postponed in order that the "Printer may bring up the "work," or in other words, in order that the Bills which have been printed at one office, and passed by the Legislative Assembly, may be reprinted at another office and sent to the Legislative Council. The delay too, while it prolongs the Session, and adds to its expenses, increases the inconvenience that must always arise from the great accumulation of measures which within a few days only are pressed on the consideration of Your Honorable House. Any means which may properly be resorted to, to check this hasty Legislation are, in the opinion of Your Committee worthy of receiving the thoughtful consideration of Your Honorable House.

It appears to Your Committee that the expenses under this head might be reduced, and the delay avoided, were the Bills and the Laws printed at the same office, with the same types and from the same forms. Making every allowance for the alterations that are introduced between the second and third readings of a Bill, and for the consequent charges for "overrunning" the matter which has been "set up," Your Committee are strongly impressed with the opinion that a reduction to the extent of nearly one-half might be made on the item of "Com-

position" alone, were the Documents in question printed at one, instead of three offices.

Printing Bills on Parchment.

Formerly Bills were, before the third reading, engrossed on parchment, and in this form presented for the Royal Assent. When the change from engrossing to printing took place, no alteration appears to have been made in the material employed. Your Committee are unable to report why this peculiarity of a former style was grafted on the new system, or how it was that a more expensive, and as Your Committee think, a less desirable material, than strong tenacious paper, should have been retained for the particular service under consideration. When it is borne in mind that print can be more easily removed from parchment than from paper, and that therefore the former is a less secure material for printed records than the latter, there should, as Your Committee think, be no hesitation in substituting paper for parchment, not only for the Bills that pass the two Houses, but also for the certified copies of the Laws which are prepared by your Clerk for the Colonial Office and the Provincial Registrar. Your Committee have no means of knowing the amount paid by the Legislative Assembly for the parchment Bills of last Session, but estimating their disbursements under this head, by the sum charged against Your Honorable House for the like service, they are of opinion that the cost of printing on parchment for last Session alone, could have fallen little short of \$2,000.

Sessional Papers.

The Appendix to the Journals of the Legislative Assembly, and the Sessional Papers of the Legislative Council, though indicated by different titles, are in point of fact but one and the same Book, composed of the like matter and printed at the same offices. Your Committee are of opinion that it would save confusion, promote economy, and be for the general advantage of both Houses, were these similar volumes made to wear a similar title. They contain information which may be regarded as the common property of both Houses, and they should be bound up in such a way as to become the common appendage of both Journals. They should be named what indeed they are, "Sessional Papers," and be made to include every general and special Return sent by the Executive Government to Parliament. The economical advantages of the proposition will be appreciated when the fact is borne in mind that the Journals of the Legislative Council are incomplete without "Sessional Papers," and the Journals of the Assembly are equally incomplete without the "Appendix." Thus when the Journals of the two Houses are sent to individuals or Public Bodies, they are respectively accompanied with the "Sessional Papers" in the one case and the "Appendix" in the other; whereas, were these books designated by a uniform title, one, instead of two sets, or taking last session as a guide, twelve instead of twenty-four volumes would suffice to perfect the Journals of both Houses.

The system of scattering kindred Documents over many volumes, and printing them under separate titles, is as inconvenient as it is expensive; it impedes inquiry, makes reference difficult, and creates unreasonable delay. Were a Member of Your Honorable House, for example, desirous of referring to the Despatches and Correspondence on the subject of making the Legislative Council Elective, he would naturally turn to the Journals, or the Appendix, or the Sessional Papers of Your Honorable House. The search would prove useless, as the Documents in question are printed with, and form part of, the Journals of the Legislative Assembly. By printing this information with the Sessional Papers, it would have become the common property of both Houses; but, as the matter stands, it finds no place in the records of the Body that is chiefly affected by the change.

The adoption of the proposed plan need not prevent either House from having a separate Appendix to its own Journals, for such special matters as may be found of inconvenient length to be inserted in the body of the Journals. Indeed, the course recommended has the sanction of the British Parliament, where there will be found separate Appendices to their separate Journals, as well as Sessional Papers applicable to both Houses.

The Sessional Papers of the Canadian Parliament consist chiefly of two kinds of subjects, and these, for convenience, Your Committee will designate as "Annual, or General," and "Local, or Transient." The former includes Despatches, Public Accounts, Trade and Navigation Returns, and other information of general public importance; the latter very often consists of statements which may be communicated for personal convenience or local gratification, and in regard to which, the interest commonly ceases with the production of the Return; though differing widely in value and merit, the Parliamentary rule of printing knows no variation, for the like number of copies is printed in both cases.

Your Committee are of opinion, that for the more economical management of these matters in future, the Legislative Assembly should be invited to concur with Your Honorable House in the appointment, at the commencement of each Session, of a Joint Committee, composed equally of Members of both Houses, one of whose duties it should be to determine what Sessional Papers should be printed, the number of copies, the manner of printing them, and in what proportions the expenses should be charged against either House.

Distribution of Journals and Sessional Papers.

As an economical question, this is perhaps the most worthy of serious consideration, and it is the one, morever, upon which Your Committee have been charged to report to Your Honorable House.

The Legislative Council prints, in English and French, 750 copies of their Journals; the Legislative Assembly, as Your Committee are informed, print, in

the two languages, 3175 copies of their Journals; and as the Appendix forms part of the book, it is assumed that an equal number is printed. The Appendix of last Session extends to twelve volumes, which gives, at the assumed rate of one set to each Journal, 38,100 volumes. These added to 6,300 volumes, being the number bound up as Sessional Papers for Your Honorable House, make an aggregate of 44,400 volumes to be printed, bound, packed, addressed and forwarded at the public cost, to remote portions of the Globe, as well as to every County of the Province. Such would seem to be the present system.

With regard to the distribution of the Journals, much may be said against any proposition to contract their gratuitous issue. Containing, as these volumes do, the political history of the Province, the votes and divisions on all important questions, they become the authorized index by which the Constituencies are directed towards the proceedings of their Representatives in Parliament, and merit a wide circulation. The question however arises, should this information be disseminated at the public cost? In considering this particular point, Your Committee desire to keep in view the plan of distribution which the Legislative Assembly have proposed, as explained in the paper presented at the Conference. It would manifestly be for the convenience of both Houses, that a uniform practice should prevail, and, impressed with this opinion, Your Committee would have recommended Your Honorable House to adopt the plan in question, did it not appear to them to be alike objectionable and unsatisfactory.

Your Committee have referred to the practice of the Imperial Parliament on this subject, and though the information at which they have arrived is more suggestive than positive, they think that, for the present purpose, it will be found to be valuable.

By referring to the Journals of the House of Commons for 1857, vol. 112, page 108, it will be seen that 1000 copies only of the Journals of that year were printed for the House of Commons. How these volumes were distributed, Your Committee have no means of determining. That they were not given to the Members of both Houses is clear, since their united number very much exceeds one thousand Members. It may, as Your Committee think, be fairly inferred, that Members of the House of Commons only, receive their Journals free of expense, and that the Lords, as well as private individuals, purchase them of the Parliamentary Printer.

Your Committee therefore suggest that the assumed practice in the British Parliament, should, with certain modifications, govern the distribution here. Let two copies of Your Journals be given now, as heretofore, to each of Your Members, and two copies, extra, in the French language, to such as reside in Lower Canada. Give also one copy to each Member of the Legislative Assembly, with one copy extra to such as reside in Lower Canada. Issue in addition sufficient copies for the Library of Parliament, the Offices of the two Houses, the Public Departments, the Imperial Government, and also for the Colonial

and Foreign Exchanges. The distribution should not, as Your Committee think, be extended beyond these limits, and great care should be taken to retain in stock an ample reserve to meet future contingencies.

With regard to the Municipal Councils, Mechanics' Institutes, Library Associations, as well as individuals who have heretofore received these volumes, under privilege, it would, as Your Committee think, be advisable to rescind all such orders, and to leave the matter optional to purchase or not, as they feel inclined. of the Parliamentary Printer. Withdraw a privilege from a portion of a class. and continue it to another portion of a class, and discontent is likely to arise. Withdraw it wholly, and though complaint may follow, yet the imputation of favoritism will not give force to expostulation. Parliament will escape the charge of conferring on the County Municipality, or the Superior Judge, favors which it refuses to the Township Municipality, and the County Judge, with giving to the comparatively affluent, and withholding from the comparatively weak. Were the principle established, that beyond the Members of Parliament, there are privileged Institutions, or Corporations, or individuals entitled to receive Journals, then, Your Committee are of opinion the line of distinction which is attempted to be drawn, would be speedily effaced, and the "County Judge," as well as the "Superior Judge," the smaller as well as the larger Municipality, will claim, and with much reason, the privilege which their neighbours enjoy. The plan of distribution submitted by the Legislative Assembly, being open to these objections, it should not, in their opinion, be adopted as the rule of Your Honorable House.

Your Committee may, perhaps, be allowed to remark, that the Votes and Proceedings of both Houses, almost all important Papers, and many of only transient interest, are published in pamphlet form during the Session, and are sent, in many, if not in all cases, to the Corporations above referred to, and should they be so lightly esteemed, as to be deemed unworthy of preservation, it is scarcely too much to require that their substitutes should be paid for, As a rule, however, the public prefers to receive its information in a digested form through the newspaper press, of all others, the channel by which the greatest amount of Parliamentary intelligence is conveyed. This fact may be regarded as another reason for contracting the circulation of the Journals and Sessional Papers as Your Committee have proposed. Indeed, with regard to the latter, it may be said, that the interest ceases with the first publication of the papers, the public mind has been informed, the public curiosity has been gratified; the subject has been examined and criticised; the parties have been censured or sustained, and the interest for the many has passed away, long before the same Documents in the garb of Appendix or Sessional Papers solicit the attention of the few. In this latter form they are little cared for, and less read. The political Return has become, so to speak, the property of the Press, and is scarcely sought for in a more official form. The Statistical Return attracts a less number of inquirers, and

these will usually prefer the books in pamphlet shape, as they are printed during the Session of Parliament.

Your Committee therefore recommend that the Journals of Your Honorable House be printed in the same proportions as at present, viz: 500 in English and 250 in French, and that they be distributed under the direction of the Clerk in the following manner:

Should the Legislative Assembly see fit to concur in the plan which Your Committee have proposed of substituting "Sessional Papers" common to both Journals, for the system heretofore adopted, then it is apparent that an edition of 1000 copies would suffice for both Houses, or taking the last Session as our guide, 12,000 instead of 44,400 volumes would meet the requirements of the public service.

Interchange of Printed Documents between the two Houses.

An arrangement was made in 1857, between the two Speakers (the Honorable Messrs. Taché and Sicotte), that of all papers printed by order of the Legislative Assembly, the Legislative Council should receive 100 copies in English and 50 copies in French; and that of all papers printed by the Legislative Council, 250 copies in each language should be furnished to the Legislative Assembly. Still the fact is daily becoming more and more obvious that the arrangement is not satisfactory, and it must, as Your Committee think, become less so in proportion to the increase of the Representative element in Your Honorable House. It is true indeed that of many papers no greater number is needed than that which is now supplied; but it is also equally true that there are many others of great public interest of which the supply is quite inadequate to the requirements of Your Honorable House. Whether the circulation of printed Documents be extended or contracted, it is not difficult to suppose that the day will come when both Houses may claim an equal share in the distribution. In the meanwhile the

question may be worthy of consideration whether something like a proportional share of the papers printed by the Assembly should not be appropriated to the Council, for it may not be forgotten that the Electoral claims upon Your Honorable House grow apace, nor is the period remote when they will be equal to those upon the Legislative Assembly.

Binding.

Much inconvenience and great loss has, as Your Committee learn, arisen from the present system of multiplying Contractors, and especially of separating the binding from the printing contracts. Both services in the opinion of Your Committe, should be done at the same establishment. The Parliamentary Printer should be the Parliamentary Binder, nor should his responsibility cease till the finished volume shall have been delivered to the proper person appointed to receive it. The present system of separating these services is necessarily attended with risk, and as experience shews, is absolutely attended with loss. In their removal from one office to another printed sheets go astray, a controversy ensues between the Printer and the Binder; the work is delayed, and the difficulty is generally got rid of by printing the missing matter anew at the public cost. The loss from this cause, was in one Session of so serious a nature, that Your Honorable House would not authorize its repair.

Conclusion.

Your Committee in an early part of their report recommended that the Bills should be printed at the same office with the Laws, and further that there should be appointed at the commencement of each Session a Joint Committee of the two Houses, whose duty it should be to superintend the printing as well as the binding of all matters that may be regarded as common to both. That Committee should be instructed to report on the expediency of having only one Parliamentary Printer and Binder, who should be the Contractor for both Houses, of determining whether all Sessional Papers should not be printed at one office, of settling the manner in which they shall be printed, as well as the type to be used, of apportioning the number of copies to be appropriated to either House, and generally of considering and reporting upon all points that may tend towards the reduction of the expense without lessening the efficiency of the present system of public printing.

By the concurrent action of both Houses much good may be arrived at, and great waste avoided, without such action the economical objects for which a Conference has been sought will scarcely be attained.

All which is respectfully submitted,

Report of the Executive Council to the Lieutenant Governor of Nova Scotia, dated 7th May, 1858, relating to an Intercolonial Railroad.

The Council having had their attention drawn to the Despatches of the Governor General of Canada, dated 23rd February last, and of the Lieutenant Governor of New Brunswick, of the 10th March last, with their inclosures, upon the important subject of an Intercolonial Railroad, desire Your Excellency to convey to the Governor General of Canada and the Lieutenant Governor of New Brunswick, respectively, the satisfaction with which the Executive Council of Nova Scotia have joined the sister Provinces in pressing the consideration of of this great enterprize upon the British Government, by forwarding an Address from the Legislature of this Province to Her Majesty, a copy of which is herewith enclosed.

The Council advise Your Excellency to convey to the Governor General the entire willingness of your Government to confer by delegation with Canada and New Brunswick, at Fredericton or elsewhere, at any time that His Excellency the Governor General may think best calculated to promote the advancement of a project in which the three Provinces are so deeply interested.

To the Queen's most Excellent Majesty.

The humble Address of the Legislative Council and Assembly of Nova Scotia.

MAY IT PLEASE YOUR MAJESTY:

We, the loyal and devoted subjects of Your Majesty, the Legislative Council and House of Assembly of Nova Scotia, now in Provincial Parliament convened, approach Your Majesty to renew our expression of the unabated interest which the Legislature and People of this Province continue to take in the long agitated project of an Intercolonial Railroad, by which the Colonies of Canada, New Brunswick and Nova Scotia, with the Sister Colony of Prince Edward Island may be bound more closely together, and their intercourse and union facilitated, and the communication from the Parent State and Your Majesty's North American Empire be improved by a rapid and efficient mode of transport from the sea board to its distantborders, independently of passage through foreign territory.

This great enterprise, of national no less than colonial importance, has been through many years pressed upon the consideration of Your Majesty's Government. During the last season delegates from the Governments of *Canada* and of this Province in person urged the undertaking on the attention of Your Majesty's Ministers.

The benefits of the measure, both in its national and colonial relations, are acknowledged, and we abstain from repeating arguments so recently presented and so familiar, further than humbly to beg Your Majesty's consideration of the

statements contained in the letter of the Delegates from the Province, addressed to the Right Honorable the Colonial Secretary, dated in London, on the twentieth day of August, 1857, a copy of which accompanies this Address.

The gigantic work we advocate has been facilitated by the efforts and expenditures of the Provinces, but its accomplishment is beyond their unaided resources, and on the efficient assistance of Your Majesty's Government depends this great result.

In urging our prayer on Your Majesty, we are assured that it will not be its least recommendation to Your royal consideration that while it has in view the consolidation of national power, it affords Your Majesty another occasion of manifesting your bonignity and regard towards Your loyal colonial subjects in this portion of Your extended empire, by aiding an undertaking in which their feelings and interests are deeply engaged.

We humbly pray that Your Majesty will be graciously pleased to extend Imperial aid to this important measure, and to cause measures to be taken for ascertaining the views and ability of the several Provinces, with respect to it and the nature and extent of the assistance they respectively require; and of the aid Your Majesty's Government will be disposed to afford, that arrangements may be matured for the early commencement and the completion of this work, by the united efforts of the three Provinces of Canada, New Brunswick, and Nova Scotia; with such co-operation and aid from Your Majesty's Imperial Government, as may be commensurate with the greatness of the object, and the magnitude of the national interests which it promotes.

"It shall be lawful for the Directors of any Railway Com-"pany at any time, and from time to time, to make and "enter into any agreement or arrangement with any other "Company either in this Province or elsewhere, for the regu-"lation and interchange of traffic passing to and from the "Railways of the said Companies, and for the working of "the traffic over the said Railways respectively, or for either " of those objects separately, and for the division and "apportionment of the tolls, rates and charges in respect of "such traffic, and generally in relation to the management "and working of the Railways, or any of them, or any part "thereof, and of any Railway or Railways in connection "therewith, for any term not exceeding twenty-one years, "and to provide either by proxy or otherwise for the "appointment of a Joint Committee or Committees for "the better carrying into effect any such agreement or "arrangement with such powers and functions as may be "considered necessary or expedient, subject to the consent "of two-thirds of the Stockholders voting in person or by "proxy."

The Committee have considered the Petition of F. X. Garneau, Esq., Author of the "Histoire du Canada," representing that he is preparing for the press, a

third edition of that well known and now standard work, which has been rendered necessary on account of large additions to historical knowledge consequent upon the examination of the extensive collections of manuscripts concerning Canadian affirs, which have been obtained by the Government from the archives of France, England, and also from the United States, since the publication of his previous editions. Mr. Garneau has been unable to publish the earlier editions of his valuable work without some assistance from the public funds, and he now solicits a similar aid on behalf of this new edition. The Committee have accordingly subscribed for one hundred and fifty copies, feeling confident that the Honorable Council will approve of their assisting Mr. Garneau in perfecting and completing his historical labors.

The Committee have given their attention to similar applications for pecuniary aid in the publication, or towards the encouragement of their works, from the following gentlemen, namely: Mr. Charles Sungster, Author of a volume of Poems; Mr. Charles Roger, Author of the first volume of a History of Canada, and who is preparing to publish a second volume; and Mr. W. C. Keele, Compiler of a Magistrate's Manuel for Upper Canada, a fourth edition of which has just appeared; but they are not of a pinion that it is advisable to make any appropriation on behalf of these publications.

A Petition has been referred to the Committee by the Legislative Assembly, from *Henry Taylor*, Author of several little works on scientific, agricultural and political subjects, and who now at an advanced age, is in a state of extreme poverty and unable to find means of support. The Committee regret that there are no funds at their disposal out of which they could render him aid and assist ance.

The Committee have also given their attention to a Petition from Mr. John Gooch, Bookseller, of Toronto, complaining that the Librarian had not fulfilled some alleged agreement or understanding with him, said to have been made upon the occasion of his removal from the United States to Toronto, whereby he should be employed as an agent for the purchase of such books as might be required for the Library from the United States; on examining the Librarian with reference to this complaint, he produced two letters, written to him by Mr. Gooch during the period in question, from which evidence the Committe were satisfied that the complaint against that officer was frivolous and unfounded, and they were unanimous in their conclusion that the Petition could not be entertained.

The Committee have directed one hundred copies of Lovell's Canada Directory, for 1857-8, to be furnished for the Library and for distribution to the foreign exchanges.

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His Excellency the Governor General forwards the enclosed memorandum to Mr. Brown to night, because it may be convenient for him to have it in his hands in good time to morrow morning.

The part which relates to a dissolution is, in substance, a repetition of what

His Excellency said yesterday at his interview with Mr. Brown. The portion having reference to the prorogation or adjournment of the Parliament, is important in determining the propriety of the course to be pursued.

His Excellency therefore requests Mr. Brown to communicate the memorandum to his future colleagues, in order to avoid all misapprehension hereafter.

Toronto, August 1, 1858.

Memorandum.

His Excellency the Governor General wishes Mr. Brown to consider this memorandum and communicate it to the gentlemen whose names he proposes to submit to His Excellency, as members of the new Government.

The Governor General gives no pledge or promise, express or implied, with reference to dissolving Parliament.

When advice is tendered to His Excellency on this subject, he will make up his mind according to the circumstances then existing, and the reasons then laid before him.

The Governor General has no objection to prorogue the Parliament without the Members of the new Administration taking their seats in the present session. But if he does so, it ought, His Excellency thinks, to be on an express understanding that Parliament shall meet again as soon as possible—say in November or December. Until the new Ministers meet Parliament, His Excellency has no assurance that they possess the confidence of the majority of the House. The business transacted in the interval ought, in his opinion, to be confined to matters necessary for the ordinary administration of the Government of the Province.

If Parliament is prorogued, His Excellency would think it very desirable that the Bill for the Registration of Voters, and that containing the prohibition of Fraudulent Assignments and gifts by traders, should be proceeded with and become law—subject of course to such modifications as the wisdom of either House may suggest. Besides this, any items of supply absolutely necessary, should be provided for by a vote of credit, and the money for the repairs of the Canals which cannot be postponed, should be voted.

His Excellency can hardly prorogue until these necessary steps are taken. If Parliament merely adjourns until after the re-election of the Members of the Government, the case is different, and the responsibility is on the House itself.—A prorogation is the act of His Excellency, and in this particular case such act would be performed without the advice of ministers who had already received the confidence of Parliament. His Excellency's own opinion would be in favor

of proroguing, if the conditions above specified can be fulfilled, and if Mr. Brown and his colleagues see no objection.

Before receiving His Excellency's note, Mr. Brown had successfully fulfilled the duty intrusted to him by the Governor General, and will be prepared at the appointed hour this morning to submit for His Excellency's approval the names of the gentlemen whom he proposes to be associated with himself in the new Government.

Mr. Brown respectfully submits that, until they have assumed the functions of constitutional advisers of the Crown, he and his proposed colleagues will not be in a position to discuss the important measures and questions of public policy referred to in His Excellency's memorandum.

CHURCH STREET, Monday morning, 2nd Aug., 1858.

Memorandum for the consideration of His Excellency the Governor General.

His Excellency's present advisers having accepted office on His Excellency's invitation, after the late administration had, by their resignation admitted their inability successfully to conduct the affairs of the country in a Parliament summoned under their own advice, and being unanimously of opinion that the constitutional recourse of an appeal to the people affords the best, if not the only, solution of existing difficulties, respectfully advise His Excellency to prorogue Parliament immediately with a view to a dissolution.

When His Excellency's present advisors accepted office they did not conceal from themselves the probability that they would be unable to carry on the Government with the present House of Assembly. That House, they believe, does not possess the confidence of the country: and the public dis-satisfaction has been greatly increased by the numerous and glaring acts of corruption and fraud by which many seats were obtained at the last general election, and for which acts the House though earnestly petitioned so to do, has failed to afford a remedy.

For some years past strong sectional feelings have arisen in the country, which, especially during the present Session, have seriously impeded the carrying on of

the administrative and legislative functions of the Government.—The late Administration made no attempt to meet these difficulties, or to suggest a remedy for them, and thereby the evil has been greatly aggravated.

His Excellency's present advisers have entered the Government with the fixed determination to propose constitutional measures for the establishment of that harmony between Upper and Lower Canada, which is essential to the prosperity of the Province. They respectfully submit that they have a right to claim all the support which His Excellency can constitutionally extend to them in the prosecution of this all important object.

The unprecedented and unparliamentary course pursued by the House of Assembly, which, immediately after having by their vote, compelled the late Ministry to retire, proceeded to pass a vote of want of confidence in the present administration, without notice, within a few hours of their appointment, in their absence from the House, and before their policy had been announced, affords the most convincing proof that the affairs of the country cannot be efficiently conducted under the control of the House as now constituted.

EXECUTIVE COUNCIL CHAMBER. 3rd August, 1858.

Memorandum.

His Excellency the Governor General has received the advice of the Executive Paper of Aug. 3, 1858. Council, to the effect that a dissolution of Parliament should take place.

His Excellency is no doubt bound to deal fairly with all political parties: but he has also a duty to perform to the Queen, and the people of Canada, paramount to that which he owes to any one party, or to all parties whatsoever.

The question for His Excellency to decide is not-" What is advantageous or fair for a particular party?" but, "What upon the whole is most advantageous "and fair for the people of the Province?"—The resignation of the late Government was tendered in consequence of a vote of the House, which did not assert directly any want of confidence in them.

The vote of Monday night was a direct vote of want of confidence on the part of both Houses. It was carried in the Assembly by a majority of forty in a house of a hundred and two, out of one hundred and thirty Members, consequently by a majority of the whole House, even if every seat had been full at the time of the vote. In a ldition to this a similar vote was carried in the Upper House by sixteen against eight, and an address founded thereon was adopted.

It is clear that under such circumstances a dissolution, to be of any avail, must be immediate. His Excellency the Governor General cannot do any act other than that of dissolving Parliament by the advice of a ministry who possess the confidence of neither branch of the Legislature.

Is it then the duty of His Excellency to dissolve Parliament?

It is not the busicess of the Governor General to decide whether the action of the two Houses on Monday night was, or was not, in accordance with the usual courtery of Pa liament towards an incoming administration. The two Houses are the judges of the propriety of their own proceedings. His Excellency has to do with the conclusions at which they arrive, provided only that the forms observed are such as to give legal and constitutional force to their votes.

There are many points which require careful consideration with reference to a dissolution at the present time. Among these are the following:—

- I. It has been alleged that the present House may be assumed not to represent the people: if such were the case, there was no sufficient reason why, on being in a minority in that House, the late Government should have given place to the present. His Excellency cannot constitutionally adopt this view.
- II. An election took place only last winter; this fact is not conclusive against a second election now, but the cost and inconvenience of such a proceeding are so great that they ought not to be incurred a second time without very strong grounds.
- III. The business before Parliament is not yet finished. It is perhaps true that very little which is absolutely essential for the country remains to be done. A portion, however, of the estimates, and two bills, at least, of great importance are still before the Legislative Assembly, irrespective of the private business. In addition to this, the resolutions respecting the *Hudson's Bay* Territory have not been considered, and no answer on that subject can therefore be given to the British Government.
- IV. The time of year and the state of affirs would make a general election at this moment peculiarly inconvenient and burdensome, inasmuch as the harvest is now going on in a large portion of the country, and the pressure of the late money crisis has not passed away.
- V. The following considerations are strongly pressed by His Excellency's seepaper of Aug. 3. present advisers, as reasons why he should authorize an appeal to the people, and thereby retain their services in the Council:—
- 1. The corruption and bribery alleged to have been practiced at the last election, and the tanit which on that account is said to attach to the present Legislative Assembly.
- 2. The existence of a bitter sectional feeling between *Opper* and *Lower Canada*, and the ultimate danger to the Union, as at present constituted, which is likely to arise from such feeling.

If the first of these points be assumed as true, it must be asked, what assurance can His Excellency have that a new election under precisely the same laws, held within six or eight months of the last, will differ in its character from that which then took place?

If the facts are as they are stated to be, they might be urged as a reason why a general election should be avoided as long as possible—at any rate until the laws are more stringent, and the precautions against such evils shall have been increased by the wisdom of Parliament. Until this is done, the speedy recurrence of the opportunity to practice such abuses would seem likely to aggravate their character, and confirm the habit of resorting to them.

The second consideration, as to the feeling between Upper and Lower Canada, and the ultimate danger of such feelings to the Union, is one of a very grave kind. It would furnish to His Excellency the strongest possible motive for a dissolution · of Parliament, and for the retention of the present Government at all hazards, if two points only were conclusively established; that is to say if it would be shewn that the measures likely to be adopted by Mr. Brown and his colleagues were a specific, and the only specific, for these evils, and that the Members of the present Council were the only men in the country likely to calm the passions, and allay the jealousies so unhappily existing. It may be that both these propositions are true, but unless they are established to His Excellency's complete satisfaction, the mere existence of the mischief is not in itself decisive as to the propriety of resorting to a general election at the present moment.

The certainty, or at any rate the great probability, of the cure by the course proposed, and by that alone, would require to be also proved.

Without this a great present evil would be voluntarily incurred for the chance of a remote good.

VI It would seem to be the duty of His Excellency to exhaust every possible alternative before subjecting the Province for a second time in the same year to the cost, the inconvenience, and the demoralization of such a proceeding. The Governor General is by no means satisfied that every alternative has been thus exhausted, or that it would be impossible for him to secure a ministry who would close the business of this Session, and carry on the administration of the Government during the recess with the confidence of a majority of the Legislative Assembly.

After full and mature deliberation therefore on the arguments submitted to him by word of mouth and in writing, and with every respect for the opinions of the Council, His Excellency declines to dissolve l'arliament at the present time. (Signed.) EDMUND HEAD.

Committee Room, 12th Aug., 1858. The Select Committee appointed to examine and report upon the Contingent Accounts of the Legislative Council for the present Session, beg leave to make their sixth Report.

Your Committee have examined the Clerk's Accounts for the months of May, June and July last (On the thirtieth day of April last being the date to which the last audit extended, a sum of twelve hundred and two dollars and fifty-six cents (\$1,202 56) was due to that officer. He has now accounted to the satisfaction of your Committee, by vouchers numbered from five hundred and forty-nine to seven hundred and eighty-three, both inclusive, for payments in May, June and July to the extent of thirty-three thousand one hundred and thirty-eight dollars and thirty-four cents (\$33,138 34) more, making in all thirty-four thousand three hundred and forty dollars and ninety cents (34,340 90) for which he was entitled to credit on the thirty first day of July last.

On the other hand the Clerk appears to have received in all May, June and July twenty-seven thousand seven hundred and ten dollars and fifty-one cents (\$27,710 51,) so that on the said thirty-first of July last there was a balance of six thousand six hundred and thirty dollars and thirty nine cents (\$6,630 39) due to him, on his accounts of receipts and disbursements to that date for your Honorable House.

The said Address to Her Majesty was then read by the Clerk, as follows:

To the Queen's Most Excellent Majesty.

Most Gracious Sovereign;-

We, Your Majesty's dutiful and loyal subjects, the Commons of Canada, in Provincial Parliament assembled, humbly approach Your Majesty for the purpose of representing:—

That the construction of an Inter-Colonial Railway connecting the Provinces of New Brunswick and Nova Scotia with Canada, has long been regarded as a matter of national concern, and ought earnestly to be pressed on the consideration of Your Majesty's Imperial Government,

That during several months of the year, intercourse between the United Kingdom and Canada can only be carried on through the Territory of the United States of America, and that such dependence on, and exclusive relations with a foreign country cannot, even in time of peace, but exercise an important and unwholesome influence on the status of Canada as a portion of the Empire, and may tend to establish elsewhere that identity of interest which ought to exist between the Mother Country and her Colonies.

That while we implicitly rely on the repeated assurances of Your Majesty's Imperial Government that the strength of the Empire would be put forth to secure this Province against external aggression, we are convinced that such strength

cannot be efficiently exerted during a large portion of the year from the absence of sufficient means of communication, and that should the amicable relations which at present so happily exist between Great Britain and the United States be ever disturbed, the difficulty of access to the ocean during the winter months might seriously endanger the safety of the Province.

That in view of the speedy opening up of the Territory now occupied by the Hudson's Bay Company, and of the development and settlement of the vast regions between Canada and the Pacific Ocean, it is essential to the interests of the Empire at large that a highway extending from the Atlantic Ocean westward should exist, which would at once place the whole British possessions in America within the ready access and easy protection of Great Britain, whilst by the facilities for internal communication thus afforded, the prosperity of those great Dependencies would be promoted, their strength consolidated and added to the strength of the Empire, and their permanent union with the Mother Country secured.

That Canada has already nearly completed the construction within the Province of a chain of Railways over sixteen hundred miles in length, extending from the Eastern Frontier of the Province towards its Western boundary, which is of the greatest importance to its commercial and material prosperity, and would form part of the great proposed highway; but which, without completion to the ocean, is comparatively useless in a national point of view, either as bringing the sister Colonies together, or as connecting those Colonies with the Parent State.

That, under these circumstances, we are deeply impressed with the importance of an Inter-Colonial Railway, and the necessity for its immediate construction: and desiring to co-operate with Your Majesty's Imperial Government and the Provinces of Nova Scotia and New Brunswick, in securing its speedy completion, we approve of the memorandum addressed to Your Majesty's Secretary of State for the Colonies, by the Canadian Delegates, and laid before the Provincial Parliament by His Excellency the Governor General, in his gracious Message, communicated on the 31st of May last; and we humbly pray that the proposed Inter-Colonial Railway may receive Your Majesty's gracious and early consideration, and that the future negociations may be conducted as nearly as may be on the basis submitted in the said memorandum.

The Select Committee appointed to superintend the Printing of Your Honorable House during the present Session, beg leave to present their eighth Report:

The attention of Your Committee has been directed to the practice which has heretofore prevailed, of printing at length, as a portion of the Appendix to Your Journals, all Returns made by Government in answer to the various Addresses from time to time passed by Your Honorable House.

For the reasons stated in their Report adopted on the 9th of June last, Your Committee are of opinion that the practice referred to should be discontinued, and that for the future, and until the system proposed to the Legislative Assembly shall have been determined upon by that Honorable House, it will be advisable to impose upon the Committee appointed to superintend the Sessional Printing, the duty of recommending what Returns shall be printed, and in what manner, whether fully or partially, and also whether in some cases the printing should not be wholly dispensed with.

Of the fifteen documents which comprise all the references to the Appendix made during the present Session, Your Committee have already reported that Appendix No. 2, embracing voluminous information from the Court of Chancery, should only be printed in part; and of the fourteen which remain, they recommend that the following should not be printed, viz:

To the Queen's Most Excellent Majesty.

Most Gracious Sovereign,-

We, Your Majesty's most dutiful and loyal subjects, the Commons of Canada, in Provincial Parliament assembled, humbly approach Your Majesty for the purpose of representing:—

That the approaching termination of the license of trade granted by Your Majesty's Imperial Government to the *Hudson's* Bay Company over the Indian territories, a portion of which, in our humble opinion *Canada* has a right to claim as forming part of her territory, renders imperative the adoption of such measures as may be necessary to give effect to the rights of the Province; and presents a favorable opportunity for obtaining a final decision on the validity of the Charter of the Company, and the boundary of *Canada* on the north and west.

That Canada, whose rights stand affected by that Charter, to which she was not a party, and the validity of which has been questioned for more than a century and a half, has, in our humble opinion, a right to request from Your Majesty's Imperial Government a decision of this question, with a view of putting an end to discussions and questions of conflicting rights, prejudicial as well to Your Majesty's Imperial Government as to Canada, and which, while unsettled, must prevent the colonization of the country.

That the settlement of Your boundary line is immediately required, and that therefore we humbly pray Your Majesty that the subject thereof may be forthwith submitted for the opinion of the Judicial Committee of Your Majesty's Privy Council, but without restriction as to any question Canada may deem it proper to present on the validity of the said Charter, or for the maintenance of her rights.

That any renewal of the license to trade over the Indian Territories should, in our humble opinion, be granted only upon the conditions that such portions

F. THE RESERVE

thereof, or of the other Territories claimed by the Company (even if their Charter be held valid), as may be required from time to time to be set apart by Canada, or by Your Majesty's Government, into Settlements for Colonization, should, as so required, be withdrawn from under any such license and the jurisdiction and control of the said Company; and that Your Majesty's Government, or the Governor General in Council, should be permitted to grant licenses to trade in any portions of the said Territories while held by or in occupation of the said Company, upon such conditions for the observance of law and the preservation of the peace, for the prohibition or restriction of the sale of ardent spirits, for the protection of Indian Tribes from injury or imposition, and with such other provisions as to Your Majesty's Government or to His Excellency in Council may seem advisable.

That, in our humble opinion, Canada should not be called upon to compensate the said Company for any portion of such Territory from which they may with draw or be compelled to withdraw,—but that the said Company should be allowed to retain and dispose of any portion of the lands thereof on which they have built or improved.

All which we humbly pray Your Majesty to take in Your Majesty's gracious and favorable consideration.

The Honorable Mr. Vankoughnet moved, seconded by the Honorable Mr. Ross, To agree with the Legislative Assembly by filling up the blank with the words, "Legislative Council and."

The question of concurrence being put thereon, the same was resolved in the affirmative.

On motion of the Honorable Mr. Vankoughnet, seconded by the Honorable Mr. Ross, it was

MAY IT PLEASE YOUR EXCELLENCY:

We, Her Majesty's dutiful and loyal subjects, the Legislative Council

of Canada, in Provincial Parliament assembled, beg leave to approach Your Excellency with our respectful request, that you will be pleased to transmit our Joint Address to Her most gracious Majesty, on the subject of Rupert's Land, the Indian Territory and the affairs of the Hudson's Bay Company, in such a way as Your Excellency may deem fit, in order that the same may be laid at the foot of the Throne.

The question of concurrence being put thereon, the same was resolved in the affirmative, and it was

An Act further to amend the Law in *Upper Canada* respecting the Court of Error and Appeal.

An Act to amend "The Prison Inspection Act, 1857."

An Act to amend the Law of Scire Facias in Upper Canada.

An Act to make more ample provision for the incorporation of the Town of St. Johns.

An Act to amend the Act to provide for the formation of Joint Stock Companies for Manufacturing, Mining, Mechanical or Chemical purposes.

An Act to amend the Act to incorporate the International Bridge Company.

An Act to amend the provisions of the Act to amend the Law for the admission of Attorneys.

To these Bills the Royal Assent was severally pronounced by the Clerk of this House, in words following:

"In Her Majesty's name His Excellency the Governor General doth assent to this Bill."

Then the Speaker of the Legislative Assembly addressed His Excellency as follows:

MAY IT PLEASE YOUR EXCELLENCY:

We, Her Majesty's dutiful and loyal subjects, the Commons of Canada, attend Your Excellency with our Bill of Supply for the service of the present year.

On reviewing the labors of the Session, it will be found that the attention of the Commons has been directed to measures for diminishing the expense and delay in the Administration of Criminal Justice,—for the abolition of Imprisonment for debt in certain cases,—for the amendment of the law relating to Municipal Institutions in *Upper Canada*,—for the revision of the Tariff of Customs and Excise, with a view of maintaining the public credit,—for settling the Elective Franchise, and providing for the Registration of Voters,—and for regulating the rate of Interest.

Other measures have also engaged the attention of the Commons, and have been earnestly considered, which, nevertheless, it has been found impossible to mature during the present Session.

We confidently hope, however, that the country will reap the most beneficial advantages from the result of our deliberations.

I have now to present to Your Excellency an Act for appropriating the sums voted for the Service of the current year, and for raising a Loan on the credit of

the Consolidated Revenue Fund, to which I humbly invite Your Excellency's assent.

To the said Bill the Clerk of this House, by His Excellency's command, did thereupon say:

"His Excellency the Governor General thanks Her Majesty's dutiful and loyal "subjects, accepts their benevolence, and assents to this Bill in Her Majesty's "name."

Then His Excellency the Governor General was pleased to deliver the following Speech:

Honorable Gentlemen of the Legislative Council; Gentlemen of the Legislative Assembly:

I congratulate you on having closed the business of this lengthened Session, and I am happy to find that the subjects which I recommended to your consideration have received attention at your hands.

The Act abolishing imprisonment for Debt in certain cases, and preventing preferential assignments in Upper Canada, will, so far as it goes, tend to assimilate the Laws of the two sections of the Province, and must, I think, be be reficial in its operation.

The Jury Laws, and the Municipal Law of Upper Canada, have, in like manner, been dealt with by you, and measures have been adopted for diminishing the cost, and facilitating the administration of Criminal Justice in Lower Canada.

In my speech, at the opening of the present Session, I adverted to the expediency of providing for the registration and protection of persons qualified to vote at the election of members of the Legislature. I rejoice to find that a Bill on this important subject has been passed by you.

I trust that the Act relating the Fisheries will succeed in encouraging this branch of industry.

Our steam communication with Europe has continued to work successfully, and I have little donbt that you have done well in providing for a regular mail service by steam during the season, to Gaspe and the Lower Provinces. The appropriation for establishing a postal line to the Red River, will open a continuous mail route, under the control of the Canadian Government, from that settlement to Nova Scotia.

Another link in our Railways has been completed by the opening of the Buffalo and Lake Huron Line. Everything which tends to increase the commerce of the Lakes is, in my opinion, of great importance.

Gentlemen of the Legislative Assembly:

I am glad to find that our Customs' Tariff has undergone your revision, Thope

that, without undue pressure on the people, it may suffice to maintain the public credit, and may work advantageously for the commerce and productive industry of the country. It is also a source of pleasure to me to find that a measure relaxing, in some degree, the restriction on the interest of money, so much desired by the commercial community, has been favorably considered by you.

I thank you for the supplies which you have granted to Her Majesty, and I assure you that I will not fail to use all due vigilance and economy in the regulation of the several departments, and the administration of the funds entrusted to me.

Honorable Gentlemen and Gentlemen:

I regret that I cannot speak of the commercial crisis which has pressed on the country as something which has entirely passed away. The recovery from such difficulties must be gradual; but I earnestly pray that the complete restoration of our prosperity may not be long delayed.

I will not fail to forward to Her Most Gracious Majesty the Queen your address relating to the territory of the *Hudson's Bay* Company, as well as that which solicits Her consideration for the scheme of the Inter-colonial Railway.

I propose, in the course of the recess, to communicate with Her Majesty's Government, and with the Governments of our sister Colonies, on another matter of very great importance. I am desirous of inviting them to discuss with us the principles on which a bond of a federal character uniting the Provinces of British North America may perhaps hereafter be practicable.

I now release you from your labours by proroguing the present Parliament.

Then the Speaker of this House said:-

Honorable Gentlemen of the Legislative Council: and

Gentlemen of the Legislative Assembly:

It is His Excellency the Governor General's will and pleasure that this Provincial Parliament be prorogued until Saturday, the twenty-fifth day of September next, to be here held, and this Provincial Parliament is accordingly prorogued until Saturday, the twenty-fifth day of September next.

REPORT

OF THE

LIBRARIAN OF THE LEGISLATIVE COUNCIL.

To the Honorable the Legislative Council of the Province of Canada, in Provincial Parliament assembled.

The Report of the Librarian upon the state of the Library of Parliament, Respectfully Sheweth:—

That during the past recess, sedulous attention has been bestowed upon the preparation and printing of the second volume of the Library Catalogue, which contains a reference to the classes of books not included in the volume printed last year, especially the works relating to America and Canada. Before the publication of this volume, many deficiencies of standard and useful works printed in, or relating to, this Continent, had to be supplied. This has been done, and your Librarian confidently hopes that this portion of your valuable collection, though still far from complete, will be found sufficiently stored with leading works in the History and Literature of this Continent, for the purposes of Parliamentary research.

In the second volume of the Catalogue, which will shortly be distributed to Members, there will be found a list of the collection of Pamphlets which are upon your shelves, amounting to upwards of three hundred volumes:—An Index to the Parliamentary Papers of the Houses of Lords and Commons concerning Canada, from the year 1800 to the present day; a careful analysis of the different series of manuscripts relating to Canadian affairs, which have been procured from Europe and elsewhere; a subject matter Index to the various classes of works contained in the Library, which has been prepared to facilitate reference on every subject of enquiry; and a new Alphabetical Catalogue of Authors, which may be considered as a supplement to the first volume of the catalogue, and includes the title of every book in the Library, whether it was in your possession at the time the former Catalogue was printed or has been since received.

Further donations to the Library continue to be transmitted by His Imperial Majesty the Emperor of the French, to whose munificence the Province has been already so deeply indebted.

From the House of Commons, and from the English Patent Office also, series of their Official Publications have been received, in continuation of those which they have heretofore presented.

A complete list of the Donations, from every source, will be found annexed to this Report.

Extensive additions in the various departments of the Library have been made since last Session, under the directions of the Library Committee and the Speaker of your Honorable House, including many of the most important Historical and Scientific Works which have issued from the Press in England, France and America, since the reconstruction of the Library, in the year 1855.

The magnificent Ornithological Works of Mr. Gould, which were subscribed for by the Library Committee during last Session, are deserving of especial mention. Folio volumes and parts of these works have been already received, and it is to be hoped that, in due time, the Legislature will be in possession of the whole of the beautiful publications of this eminent Naturalist.

An Orrery or Planetarium, which was ordered last year, has been constructed for the Library, by the Philosophical Instrument makers to the Royal Institution of England, and its arrival in Toronto may be expected from day to day.

Some difficulty has been experienced in finding room for the great number of Books which has been received during the past year; but by the removal of the Imperial Parliamentary Papers to the apartments below the Long Room, sufficient space has been obtained for the present.

In considering the increasing extent, importance and value of the Library your Librarian feels it to be an imperative duty to repeat the suggestion, which he took the liberty to submit in his last Report, namely, that in order to ensure the constant vigilance and care which the preservation of such important property demands, there is necessity for the continual presence, in, or adjacent to, the Library, of some responsible person, connected with the department, and thoroughly conversant with its arrangement and contents. Since last year the best system, short of this, has been pursued, nevertheless there still remains much to be done for the security of the Library from loss or injury, which can only be ensured by the residence on the spot of some Officer of the Department; should this be found impracticable under present circumstances, it is to be hoped that in the Buildings to be hereafter erected for the permanent accommodation of the Legislature, this pressing necessity will be provided for.

The number of Books in the Library at this date is about thirty-nine thousand volumes, being an increase of nine thousand on the estimate of last year.

SIR.—The undersigned would respectfully submit for the information of His Excellency the Governor General, that on 27th day of January instant, an Election was held in the Township of Dunham, in the County of Missisquoi, for the election of seven Councillors for said Township for the next two years; that at said Election the following persons, to wit: Richard M. Scott, Jesse M. Scofield, Hiram Travers, Horatio N. Clarke, Edward Rychard, William S. Baker, and William Kerley, all of said Dunham, Yeomen, were then and there duly elected as such Councillors, by acclamation, in the presence of upwards of three hundred duly qualified Electors of said Township, and with the approbation of nine-tenths of the Electors there present, no other candidate whatever being proposed nor any opposition whatever being made to the election of the said seven persons as such Councillors; that, nevertheless the undersigned have been informed and have reason to believe that the person and who presided at said Election, with intent to defraud the Electors of said Township of their Municipal rights, will not make a truthful return of said election, but will report to the Warden of the said County of Missisquoi, that there has been no election of Councillors in said Township, in order to induce said Warden to report the same to His Excellency, that His Excellency may be induced to appoint other and different persons than those elected as aforesaid to be Municipal Councillors for said Township of Dunham. Sir,—In addition to the statement of facts already submitted for the information of His Excellency the Governor General, in regard to the late Municipal Election for the Township of Dunham, in the County of Missisquoi, we would beg leave to present the enclosed affidavit, and to state further that we are now perfectly convinced that the proceedings of the Returning Officer, Galloway L. Kemp, were the result of a preconcerted plan to defraud the rate-payers of the Township out of their Municipal rights. Although perfectly assured that His Excellency will have no desire to take upon himself the office of judge of the legality or illegality of the aforesaid election, since the Statute has provided a competent tribunal to determine that question, yet we feel it due to His Excellency to disclose the nefarious attempt that has been made to induce him to appoint persons as Councillors for said Township whom the rate-payers themselves would not promote to any office whatever.

In the first place then we charge distinctly, that Henri Des Rivières, Warden of the County of Missisquoi, at the instance of Levi Stevens, a leading candidate for the office of Councillor in said Township, appointed said Levi Stevens, Returning Officer for said Election, and sent to him the Public Notice of said Election at least ten days before the time appointed for the same, that subsequently, at the instance of the said Levi Stevens, the said Warden, substituted Galloway L. Kemp. the son-in law of said Levi Stevens, as such Returning Officer; that the said Levi Stevens and his confreres candidates, finding that there was no prospect of their being elected, and that certainly three-fourths of the rate-payers of the Township were in favor of the election of a different set of candidates, publicly declared that he would have the election, if not by fair means that he would by foul; that thereupon at the opening of the election, the said Galloway L. Kemp having read his Warrant as Returning Officer, at first refused to proceed with the election, pretending that he had inadvertently omitted to read the notice of the meeting at the Church door, and that therefore no election could legally take place. In this pre tension the said Returning Officer was sustained by Levi Stevens, Thomas Woods Gardner H. Sweet, and four others, all candidates for election, and now applicants for the appointment at the hands of His Excellency; that thereupon the Electors then and there present numbering at least three hundred, loudly accused the said Returning Officer of conniving to prevent the electors obtaining their choice, and insisted that they who had been the authors of all the arrangements of the election should not be permitted to defeat it, and that they who had the notices of the election in their pockets should not be heard when they complained of want of notice. That if there was any omission of any formality, they who had caused it should not be permitted to take advantage of it, particularly when the law had enacted that such omission should not of necessity render the election void; that thereupon the Returning Officer did proceed with the election according to law, when Richard M. Scott, Jesse M. Schofield, Hiram Travers, Horatio N. Clarke, Edward Rychard, William S. Baker, William Kerley, all of said Dunham,

yeomen, were duly proposed, and that no other candidates whatever were proposed or voted for, and that said Returning officer then and there declared that the election of said seven persons lastly named was not opposed, that the electors were by a majority of three to one in favor of their election, and that the said meeting was adjourned. Every one of the three or four hundred persons there present considered that an election in fact was made, but some thought that it might be contested. Yet the said Returning Officer at the instance of the said Levi Stevens, Thomas Woods, and Gardner H. Sweet, has since been induced to falsify his Returns, and although that fact has been verified to the Warden of the County, the said Warden fraudulently connives with the said Levi Stevens and associates, and reports to His Excellency that there has been no election of Councillors in said Township of Dunham, and has used his influence with members of Parliament to secure the appointmer of the said Stevens and others.

Under ordinary circumstances we wish His Excellency to be assured that we would cheerfully submit the appointment of all our Municipal Officers to his nomination, but in view of the bare-faced attempt on the part of a few bond bad men to defraud us out of our rights, and to obtain by trickery and intrigue what they could not obtain by the votes of the people; we are determined to assert and maintain our rights, and to test the question whether a corrupt Returning Officer or a sycophantic Warden, can foist on this Township even with the aid of foreign Members of Parliament, Municipal Councillors, other than those elected by the people themselves. We are assured His Excellency will not consent to be made a party to any such local controversy, but will leave all parties to such recourse as the fcourts of law so amply afford. That His Excellency may be pleased to reter all applications that may be made on this subject to the legitimate tribunals appointed or the investigation of such disputes, is the prayer of the undersigned rate-payers of the Township of Dunham.

Golland, all yeomen, and James Ruiter, Innkeeper, all of the Township of Dunham, in the District of Montreal, being severally and respectively duly sworn upon the Holy Evangelists, do depose and say, that they are rate-payers and duly qualified Municipal Electors of the said Township of Dunham. That on the 27th day of January last, at Dunham aforesaid, in virtue of the Warrant of Henri Des Rivières, Esquire, Warden of the County of Missisquoi, an election was held at the said Township of Dunham, for the election of seven persons as Councillors for said Township for the next two years; that at the opening of said election some objection was made to the legality of the meeting, inasmuch as it was asserted that a notice of said meeting was not read at the Church door, nor was the same published in the manner required by law: that as a matter of fact a very general notice of said meeting had been given, and it was one of the largest political meetings ever held in the Township, there being at least three hundred electors present; that the Returning Officer who presided at said meeting not being able to justify his refusal to proceed with the election, finally made proclamation that he would proceed, and called upon the Electors to name their Candidates, that there upon Peter Cowan, above named, duly nominated as fit and proper persons to be elected as such Councillors Richard M. Scott, Jessie M. Scofield, Hiram Travers, Horntio N. Clark, Edward Rychard, William S. Baker, and William Kerley, all of said Dunham, yeomen, and James O'Hallaran, above named, duly seconded the said nomination; that said Returning Officer then and there in a loud voice made proclamation, demanding if there were any other candidates, or if there was any opposition to the election of the aforesaid seven persons so nominated; that there being no other candidate proposed, and no opposition whatever made to the election of the candidates so proposed; the said Returning Officer after having divided the house, and after declaring that the persons so nominated had a majority of three to one of the electors there present; he the said Returning Officer then and there declared that he would return to the Warden of the County, that the aforesaid Richard M. Scott, Jesse M. Schofield, Hirum Travers, Horatio N. Clark, Edw. Rychard, William S. Baker and William Kerley, were the only candidates proposed for Councillors at said meeting; that they were the choice of the majority of the said meeting three to one, and that their election was not opposed, and thereupon said Returning Officer adjourned said meeting; that said Returning Officer is the son-in-law of Levi Stevens, a candidate for the office of Councillor in said Township, although not nominated as such at said meeting, and a partisan opposed to the election of the persons elected as aforesaid. And said deponents further say, that if any return or representation has been made to His Excellency the

Governor General, to the effect that there has been no election of Councillors for the Township of Dunham, the same is false and fraudulent, as it is matter of public notoriety that a most exciting canvass was carried on in said Dunham during three weeks immediately preceding the date of said Election; that said Election took place in the presence and hearing of upwards of three hundred electors of the Township, and whether the same be finally held to be legal or not, an election de facto did take place, which resulted in the election of the seven persons above named. And deponents further say, that if any detriment was suffered by any party in consequence of the notice of the election not being read at the church door, it would have been on the part of the candidates elected, inasmuch as the opposing candidates who now claim the election to be illegal, had possession of the notices, and were the parties required to read and publish the same, which, if they omitted, it was their own wrongful act; and deponents further say that they verily and in their conscience believe, and they have good reason to believe, that the election which took place on the aforesaid 27th day of January, resulting in the election of the candidates named above, was satisfactory to and meets with the unqualified approbation of fully three-fourths of the rate-payers of the said Township of Dunham, and further deponents say not, and have signed.

Sir,—I have the honor to address you, for the purpose of respectfully inviting the attention of His Excellency the Governor General to the fact that there are at present ostensibly two Municipal Councils for the Township of *Dunham*, in the County of *Missisquoi*, where I reside.

Whether the Councillors, appointed by His Excellency on the 4th March last have or have not organised themselves and proceeded to business, I cannot say; but I know that those who had been previously elected by the inhabitants have done so, and that the Mayor elected by them has been admitted to his seat as such in the County Council, in preference to the gentleman first named in your letter of the 4th March last, who claimed the office under 18 Vict., chap. 100, Sec. 30, S. 4.

It is to be feared that a struggle for mastery may take place between those rival bodies of Councillors, and between the officers they may respectively appoint, involving perhaps, expensive litigation, to the great detriment not only of the Township itself, but of the whole County, by keeping in abeyance the Acts an proceedings of the Township and County Councils.

Under these circumstances, I feel that I am justified in expressing a hope that His Excellency may be advised to revoke the appointment, made by him of Municipal Councillors for the said Township, as he is authorized to do by 19 and 20 Vict., chap. 101, Sec. 17.

The facts I have stated are conclusive, as to the non-existence, in the Township of *Dunham*, of that reluctance to put the system of local Municipal Government into operation, for which, as for an exceptional and anomalous case, provision has been made, by vesting in the Governor General an ultimate power of appointment of Municipal Councillors.

I would refer particularly to the action of the County Council, as a strong indication of the prevalent feeling in the locality, that the facts of the case are such as they are represented to be in the affidavit of Peter Cowan and others, enclosed to you on the third of February last, and that it was by false statements and deliberate misrepresentation of those, facts that His Excellency and his advisers were induced to believe that a case had arisen for the exercise of the extraordinary power conferred by the thirty-sixth section of the Lower Canada Municipal and Road Act of 1855, which I humbly conceive was not intended to disfranchize Municipal Electors, desirous of working and carrying out the Municipal law, but only to be exercised when they had refused and neglected to do so; and, moreover, the neglect of the Warden to issue the notices in time, and the omission of the Returning Officer to read them, and make a truthful return of his proceedings, was not the fault of the electors, or a matter over which they had control; therefore, they should not suffer for the wrong doings of others, particularly in this case, where a bona fide election has taken place.

Sir,—I am in receipt of your communication of the 4th instant, in reply to my letter of the 30th April last, respectfully soliciting the Government to revoke the appointments made by His Excellency of Municipal Councillors for the township of *Dunham*, on the 4th March last.

You acquaint me that the appointment of such Councillors having taken place in obedience to the law, upon the Report of the Warden, that no Election had taken place by the Municipal Electors of that locality, as directed by the Lower Canada Municipal and Road Act of 1855, and the Government cannot recognize any election not reported by the said Warden, and consequently would not be justified in revoking those appointments.

Permit me to remark that if the Government had not been put in possession of the facts previously to the making of those appointments, facts substantiated beyond a doubt, by numbers of respectable men, on oath, or if delay had been given for further enquiry, as promised me, or if the Warden making the report had been requested to explain to the Government, and reconcile his return with the declarations made on oath, that an Election had taked place, the whole difficulty could have been obviated.

The printed returns in this case, of the evidence of so many respectable men, knowing the facts as stated, should preponderate over that of the Returning Officer's return, which the Warden gave as his authority for his report to the Government, and had the Warden based his report to the Government upon his own knowledge of the facts, his return would have been, that an Election had taken place by the people as stated by those affidavits.

The Warden that made this return has boasted that he had influence with the Government, and could procure any appointments he desired.

If a return of a Warden, proved to be false, is the only basis upon which Covern-

ment is to act, the whole country may be disfranchised, our Municipal laws preverted, and the rate-payers defrauded of their Municipal rights.

I have yet to learn that if a Government be led into error, it is their duty to persist in error rather than rectify it. Is it not the duty of Government to guard and protect its subjects in their civil and political rights?

You are pleased to say, that His Excellency would deeply regret that any contest should take place between the Councillors who claim to have been elected by the people and those appointed by the Government.

In the expression of that sentiment I most sincerely concur, no suits at law have yet taken place, but if that alternative is forced upon the people of *Missisquoi*, however much they detest litigation, I can only say that they are a law abiding as well as intelligent people who know their rights, and will, if possible, maintain them.

In conclusion I beg a reference to my former letter of the 30th April last on this subject, and still indulge a hope that this matter may be reconsidered, and a favorable result come to for the relief of the parties for whom I made application.

Sin,—In answer to your's of the 7th instant, I beg to state, that under the appointment of the Municipal Councillors for the Township of Dunham, was not a matter of discretion, but of necessity, for the Government. As I have had the honor to state it to you, before such appointment took place, the Excutive Council has no judiciary power to try the truth of any Warden's report, under the Municipal Law; the ordinary tribunals only are vested with such power, so that the report regularly made by the Warden of the County, stating that no election had taken place could not be in way shaken by the affidavits produced by certain Municipal, Electors, so far as the necessity to appoint Councillors went. The Government had only one course opened, namely, to make the appointment; acting otherwise

would have constituted a direct violation of the law, which would be equally set at defiance by the revocation of the appointment.

Nautical College, Quebec, 13th July, 1854.

Sir,—The conclusion of the first year that the Nautical College has been in operation seems a fitting occasion to present for the inspection of His Excellency the Governor-General a report of its proceedings. As the use of such a report will be to supply materials for judging of the extent to which the institution is fulfilling and promises to fulfil its objects, it will be right for me to explain wha such objects properly are.

The objects which a place of nautical instruction can be conceived to propose to itself, are three:

- I. To instruct in the scientific parts of their profession persons already occupied in a sea-faring life.
- II. To train for the position of officers young men or boys who have not served at sea.
 - III. To rear up working seamen.
- (I.) Of Schools having in view the first of the objects above named there are numerous examples in England. At Portsmouth there is the Royal Naval College for the improvement of Captains and Naval Officers in the Royal Navy, and at the great trading ports there are adult nautical schools, always well attended by merchant officers and seamen. I regard these establishments of unques-

tionable advantage to the mercantile marine, and through them to the country at large.

(II.) Of schools for the furtherance of the second object, there are not in England, at present, that I am aware of, any examples worthy of note. The Naval Schools of Greenwich and New Cross obtain the name "Naval" rather from the origin than from the destiny of the pupils. They were instituted not to make officers and seamen, but to educate the children of officers and seamen; and although most of the boys take to the sea, it is not from this circumstance that they derive their name, or on this account that they are maintained. I mention this fact only to account for the large number of pupils that these schools accumulate in a country where the orphans of seamen must be numerous, and not for the sake of leading to the inference from the example of England, that a school for rearing young sea officers is a useless institution. On the contrary, I regard the absence of such schools in England as a serious defect, and by no means worthy of imitation. The most perfect idea of a Nautical School having for its object that of rearing boys to become officers, is a union of the drilling on board a sea-going ship in the summer with study on shore in the winter.

There are however objections to the plans as regards Canada.

We are not yet in a position to guarantee that boys so educated will afterwards find suitable employment at sea; employment, that is, in which they will be made something better than mere menial drudges, which is their too frequent lot when under the command of a captain in whose eyes mental culture is a crime. Under these circumstances parents will be reluctant to allow their boys to join the Nautical College in such numbers as to make the advantage of such a vessel commensurate with its expense. Such a scheme will, I trust, eventually be in operation, but the country is not ripe for it yet. It must grow out of and not precede the formation of a local commercial Navy.

(III.) The third object that of rearing boys to become working seamen, is effected in England by the Naval-apprentice-vessels, which are tenders attached to the guard-ships at the naval ports.

The pupils are under the command of Naval officers, are subject to naval discipline, and are liable to be punished as deserters if they quit the navy before the expiration of their apprenticeship. Manual operations form their chief employment; the schooling which is under the direction of a man ranking with a sergeant of marines, occupies a very subordinate place in the system. These vessels turn out, I believe, first-rate seamen. In applying, however, to this country, conclusions drawn from the example of the British Navy, it should be remembered that in England the country that supports these boys can also and does command their services; and that there is an easy matter to find boys among the children of a large sea-faring population, as well as from among the many who are ready to escape starvation at the price of their liberty.

In Canada where manual labour is so well remunerated, a similar apparatus could not be maintained without supporting the boys and paying them well besides.

Laying aside then this third object as in applicable to the present circumstances of the country, I shall go on to show how far the two former objects promise to be promoted by the Nautical College.

The students (including nine adult sea-faring men) that have been admitted into the College, are 24 in number; namely, 13 English and 11 French Canadians.

The present disposal of the 24 is as follows:

As most of these will probably return, the College may be considered as numbering 18 students.

This number it is true is little more than one-third of the proposed complement of 50; but if it be considered that the institution is new and comparatively little known, there is not, I think, in this circumstance much ground for discouragement. I have reason for expecting considerable additions in this respect next winter; there are already about 12 that have applied for admission, and doubtless each succeeding winter will bring further accessions to our number.

With respect to the attainments of the students.

With very few exceptions, the preparatory knowledge they bring with them is extremely limited. Those that have attended the Seminary and other similar places of instruction, are generally intelligent, and exhibit signs of mental development; but with respect to the particular sort of knowledge that they must begin with here, (I speak of the common processes of arithmetic) they even are sadly deficient.

This defective preparation in the majority of the students, renders it is necessary for me to direct their attention chiefly to the mathematical processes and their application to the common nautical problems, and to reserve the exposition of the principles (excepting in a very elementary manner) from which these processes are derived, till this pupils have acquired what is to them more essential, a familiarity with the practice. There are, however, exceptions to this rule; I could name two of my men who, to a familiarity with the most important nautical problems, add an acquaintance with mathematics equal in amount to that pos-

sessed by an average Cambridge freshman; and from the boys whose minds have not suffered from so long a fallow, I have reason to anticipate still better things. As regards seamanship, I do not hesitate to say that the students who have diligently attended Mr. *Mackenzie* would turn a piece of work out of hand as well as most midshipmen in the Navy.

From these statements, it is, I think, right to infer that the College is fulfilling the work or which it was designed, and it should be remembered, that if its numbers be comparatively small, this is a defect that every winter will diminish. It is, I feel confident, qualifying for their duty men to whom life and property is often entrusted to the great risk when they are ignorant of those who trust them.

Persons who expect the Nautical College to raise working seamen will of course be disappointed. It may have indirectly the effect of raising up native officers with whom native seamen may be more willing to serve, but to expect it to raise working seamen is wholly to mistake its design.

Though I see no cause for apprehending that the Nautical College will fail in the furtherance of its legitimate object, that namely of rearing boys who will eventually become officers, as well as that also of improving men already in that capacity. I consider that the interests of the country would be materially advanced if the benefits of the instructions here given were extended to other classes of the community besides those engaged in or destined for the sea.

The country is in a state of rapid progression; its resources are becoming more and more developed; a spirit of activity is abroad. Engineers and architects will be required for the many great works that must before long be in progress. Men skilled not only in the routine of land surveying, but in the higher branches of Geodesy, will find ample employment as new regions become settled, and their accurate definition more necessary. Eminent surveyors in this Province that I have consulted, inform me that the practical astronomy that is taught here would render the young assistant-surveyors much more efficient than they are at present, and that their admission here would be a great benefit to the profession. The marine architect also would find a knowledge of mathematical science more valuable in promoting the improvement of his art, and in fact there are few callings for the successful prosecution of which mathematical and physical science would not be a useful auxiliary if not an essential element.

Now the principles of mathematical and physical science which the practical man afterwards learns to apply to his own peculiar calling, as well as the processes of mathematics, are to a considerable extent identical for all professions to which mathematics are applied. Whatever difference may prevail in the amount of development given to particular truths, the theory or exposition of the principles of pure mathematics, as well as the operation immediately founded on it, are as far as they are required for the seaman, equally useful to the architect, the surveyor, the machinist and the engineer.

The staff of teachers requisite for a purely nautical school would be equally available for the other purposes, and without any additional expense.

It is not my present design to propose that the Nautical College should at once become an establishment for giving a perfect professional education to engineers or architects. The institution is not quite in a position to give the requisite specific instruction for which professional assistants and a considerable addition to the stock of instruments would be required. It may be hereafter expedient to make such an extension, and it would be well to keep the probability of doing so in view, but it is not to be recommended now.

The requests that I beg respectfully to urge upon the attention of His Excellency are the two following:—

- (I.) That He will be pleased to order that in the erection of a new building consequent on the sale of the one now in use, regard be paid to the following requisites.
- (1.) The building should be erected on such a site and on such a plan as may admit of any expansions as may be hereafter thought advisable, whether for classrooms, workshops or hostels for students.
- (2.) The ground attached to the building should be large enough for the purposes of drilling and athletic games.
- (3.) For the purposes of astronomical observations the ground should not be shaded by adjoining buildings, and should be sufficiently removed from the public road to be exempt from the tremor occasioned by the passing of vehicles, which often renders the use of the artificial horizon quite impracticable.

To meet these requisites I deem it very objectionable that any part of the Lower Town should be selected; and as in the Upper Town there is not any available site of sufficient extent, I consider the best possible position would be on the St. Louis road, in the neighbourhood of the turnpike. Such a position would be of easy access to the students, and would, for the sake of boating, be within reach of the river.

The second request I have to make is, that His Excellency will be pleased to give me authority to advertise publicly, that persons wishing to acquire a knowledge of any branch of the mathematical science, may be received as students on conditions a statement of which is given in a proposed advertisement given herewith.

In conclusion, I venture to offer that I think I see my way for making the Nautical College a great mathematical school for Lower Canada, and one in which may be taught not only the highest mathematical science, but eventually also the various applications to mechanical art.

The Nautical College is designed chiefly to promote the following objects:-

Other branches of knowledge, especially instruction in the French and English languages will also be given as far as attention to the main object will permit; and to students designed for the sea, instruction will be given in the art of rigging and managing a boat.

As the College building is not at present adapted to receive boarders, students will be required to provide elsewhere for their board and lodging.

The vacations are as follows:

At Christmas, two weeks, commencing December 22nd.

At Easter, one week, commencing Thursday, in passion week. Midsummer, two months, commencing July 1st.

REGULATIONS FOR THE ADMISSION OF STUDENTS.

No candidate is eligible for admission until he has attained the age of 13 years.

He must read and write correctly and fluently in one language, English or French, and must be expert in the common operations of arithmetic, as far at least as the vulgar fractions.

Students who have served at least six months, either at sea, on the Lakes or on the St. Lawrence, will be required to pay an entrance see of £2 in advance to cover the expense of books supplied to them, together with £1 in advance for the first as well as for every succeeding term.*

The students not intended for the sea will pay an entronce fee of £2 in advance, and £3 in advance each term, or (if they prefer it) £1 in advance each month. Students not already sea-fearing men, but who intend to enter the profession, may enter as sea-fearing students, provided that they give security to the amount of £20, that they will within one year after their discharge from the college, serve at least six months in a sea-going ship.

Students already possessing any of the requisite books will be allowed to reckon them in part payment for the entrance fees, and every candidate must give proof that he is of proper age, and must produce a certificate of character either from his last schoolmaster, or the minister of his parish, or the captain or owner of his last ship.

Sir,—Having been informed by Professor Kingston that he intends submitting for the information of His Excellency the Governor in Council, the expediency o making the Nautical College more particularly useful by admitting students of Land Surveying and Civil Engineering, and others desirous of availing themselves of the advantages to be derived from the course of instruction it affords, we beg respectfully to recommend the adoption of his proposal and to express our conviction, that great benefit to the public would result from the proposed change in so far as the profession of Land Surveying is concerned.

In our capacity of members of the Board of Examiners of Land Surveyors we have often had cause to regret that the candidates have not had that thorough knowledge of those branches of Mathematics and Practical Astronomy which is requisite to enable them to excel in the profession, a knowledge which they have

neither the time nor the opportunity of acquiring during their apprenticeship, which should be devoted to field service. This knowledge Professor Kingston is, from his varied and extensive experience as a teacher, eminently qualified to impart.

NAUTICAL COLLEGE, QUEBEC, 5th March, 1855.

Sir, —I had the honor, on the 13th July, 1854, to address a letter to the late Provincial Secretary, containing a report of the proceedings of the Nautical College, together with a proposal to make the instruction available to other classes besides those destined for the sea, such as land surveyors, engineers, architects and others.

Further experience confirms the views I expressed, and as I consider their adoption with certain modifications to be of importance, I beg that you will favor me by bringing under the notice of His Excellency the Governor General in Council, the proposals given herewith. In doing this I have respectfully to request that if one or more of these proposals be approved of, I may have the authority to act on that approval forthwith, without waiting for the adoption of the rest.

The proposals are as follow:-

- (I.) That all persons wishing to avail themselves of the instruction afforded by the College, shall be permitted to enter.
- (II.) That all students who have not been already engaged in some capacity on the sea, the lakes, or the river, whatever be their destination, shall in addition to the fees for books named in the circular, pay a further sum, in advance, of £2 each half-yearly term for tuition.
- (III.) That in order to encourage the pursuit of mathematical knowledge, three-fourths of the proceeds from the tuition fees be devoted to [founding cholarships, to be granted at the annual examinations as rewards of proficiency, and that the remaining fourth be employed in procuring instruments and apparatus.

The following is an approximate estimate of the relative amount and disposal of the tuition fees:

Of 10 students in attendance, 5 probably would pay tuition fees, and this produce £20.

This would give you average of £15 scholarship for every 10 students, with a balance of £5 for apparatus.

The scholarships to be held for one year, and to be paid at regular intervals during attendance.

- (IV.) It would tend to the improvement of pilots, if all pilot apprentices were for the future compelled to pass three winters at the College.
- (V.) As many of these persons do not reside at Quebec, and have not usually pecuniary resources at command, their compulsory attendance at Quebec during the winter, might be thought a grievance unless their expenses were defrayed either wholly or in part; it might be therefore desirable to furnish to a limited number of apprentices every year a weekly allowance of 10 or 15s. each during residence.

Respecting the two proposals relative to the apprentice-pilots, I beg to suggest that the Board of Trinity might be advantageously consulted.

With respect to the three first proposals, I have to observe that the admission of students intended for professions on shore cannot injuriously affect those intended for the sea; on the contrary by the foundation of scholarships, which the introduction of these students occasions, sea-going students derive benefit, both in a pecuniary sense as well as from the healthy emulation introduced.

The extension requires no additional expenditure of public money, but renders more productive the public money already expended.

I have therefore to request, in conclusion, that you will bring this matter without delay before His Excellency in Council.

The Nautical College of Canada was established by the Government with the design of promoting the following objects:—

- I. To afford to captains, mates, pilots and seamen such instruction in the scientific parts of the nautical profession, as may qualify them for the position of officers in the Royal Navy or Merchant Service.
- II. To prepare for similar appointments young men or boys who have not yet entered upon the sea life.

10 Closing of Nautical School, Quebec.—Appendix No. 4.

The ordinary course includes:-

Geometry,

Arithmethic,

Algebra,

Trigonometry, plane and Spherical,

Navigation and Nautical Astronomy,

Elementary Mechanics and Hydrostatics, with their application to the Steam Engine,

Instruction by the boatswain in rigging and other parts of seamanship.

To such students as may be qualified for it instruction will also be given in a u perior course, including:—

In Pure Mathematics.

The higher parts of Geometry, Algebra and Trigonometry, Conic Sections,
Co-ordinate Geometry of two and three dimensions,
Differential Calculus,
Integral Calculus and differential Equations,
Calculus of finite differences.

In Natural Philosophy.

Statics,
Dynamics and Newton's Principia,
Hydrostatics and Hydrodynamics,
Optics,
Astronomy.

The instruction is gratuitous; but in order to cover the expense of books and other necessaries supplied by the Institution, each student is required, on admission, to pay an entrance fee of £2, together with £1 payable in advance for each half yearly term, during any part of which he may be under instruction.

The terms commence 1st May and 1st November.

As the College premises are not yet adapted to accommodate boarders, students will have for the present to provide elsewhere for their board and lodging.

The vacations are:-

At Christmas, 2 weeks, commencing 22nd December,

At Midsummer, 2 months, commencing 1st July.

Regulations for the Admission of Students.

No candidate is eligible for admission under the age of 13 years.

He must be able to read and write fluently and correctly in one language (English or French), and must be expert at arithmetic including at least the four first rules and reduction.

Sir,—Before further expense is incurred by the removal of the Nautical College to another locality, I consider it right to lay before His Excellency the Governor General my views respecting the utility of the Institution, with reference to its influence on the nautical interests of the Province. In my letter of the 13th July, I expressed a hope that persons already engaged at sea would attend in greater numbers.

The experience of this winter has disappointed that hope. Two only of the seafaring men of last winter have attended during any part of this season.

The cause of this fact I have learnt from a most trustworthy source. These men, I am told, and many others who were not here before, have declared their intention not to come; and they gave as their reason that the subjects I teach are too hard.

It might be inferred from the complaints of these men that I have insisted on

their mastering all the mathematical principles upon which navigation is founded. Such is not the fact. I insist only on a familiarity with the ordinary processes of arithmetic with other elementary matters equally necessary; and as a means of understanding better the common phenomenon of Astronomy, I have made them apply a part of their time to *Euclid's* Geometry.

The Navigation that these men wish to acquire, is that which the British Legislature has made great effort to uproot; and I feel that I would be unworthy of of trust were I to aid in perpetrating anything so destructive to life and property.

Whatever good may be possibly done by the Nautical College expanded into a Polytechnic School, my own deliberate conviction is, that, with its present aim, its advantage is altogether out of proportion to its expense.

GEORGE KINGSTON, Esq., A. M., Quebec. Plan of a School of Navigation on board of "La Canadienne."

There are in Canada only a few Sea Captains capable of taking charge of a vessel bound for Europe, India, Australia, &c., &c., or even the West Indies.

According to the information I have been able to procure, there are only eight or ten Sea Captains in the whole District of Quebec, competent to take a vessel to the ports of the United Kingdom, the United States, or the West Indies—so that the Quebec ship-builders are obliged to bring persons out from England at a great expense to take charge of their vessels to Liverpool and other ports, where they can be sold.

The masters of Canadian vessels are, with few exceptions, merely coast pilots. When they wish to undertake a voyage beyond St. Johns, Newfoundland, Halifax, or St. John's, New Brunswick, they are obliged to obtain from foreign ports sailors capable of managing their vessels.

The want of educated seamen in Canada is, I think, the reason why the Canadian trade in Canadian vessels is confined to the traffic between *Montreal* and *Quebec*, and some ports of the Lower Provinces, the *United States*, and the *West Indies*.

The products of the Canadian Fisheries in the Gulf of St. Lawrence are carried to the European and South Amerian markets almost entirely by the vessels of Jersey ship-owners.

The products of the West Indies consumed in Canada, are brought in summer chiefly by vessels of Nova Scotia, and in winter by vessels of the United States, to Portland and other ports, from whence they come to us by railway, while we often have in the port of Quebec several schooners and brigantines which for months together cannot obtain freights, because the masters who command them are, from ignorance of navigation, incapable of sailing them beyond the British ports I have mentioned.

Since we build ships cheaper than they can be built anywhere else, and since hundreds of our young men whose natural taste induces them to adopt a sea-faring life, are, from inability to obtain employment here, obliged to go on board of American vessels engaged in the Fisheries in the Gulf of St. Lawrence, and in the trade on the Lakes, and on the coasts of the United States, if we had in Canada a number of well instructed sea captains capable of undertaking any sea voyage, why could we not dispatch to all parts of the world vessels to be engaged in the whale fisheries, &c., &c., or at least carry to market the products of our Forests, but especially those of our Fisheries, the annual value of which exceeds six hundred thousand dollars, and which form the cargoes of nearly a hundred vessels, and bring back from the West Indies, in our own vessels, such of their products as we require in exchange for our salted and dried fish, our salt meat, lumber, &c.?

But how shall we give our sailors the necessary nautical education?

By establishing on board of a vessel a School for the purpose of instructing pupils in nautical science both theoretically and practically.

The Government schooner La Canadienne, whose size is much the same as that

Closing of Nautical School, Quebec .--- Appendix No. 4. 19

of a sloop of war carrying from 40 to 50 men, would answer very well for a School ship until a larger vessel should be required by an increase in the number of pupils.

In order to protect the Fishery and the public revenue in the Gulf of St. Lawrence, La Canadienne requires a complement of twenty-five, including officers. Well, let there be a master competent to give instruction in the theory and practice of navigation, and a Boatswain able to teach the mode of working, and doing the ordinary work of a ship, and the crew might be composed in a great measure of young men entered as pupils on board the schooner; and since these pupils would not be entitled to such high wages as are generally paid to sailors, the difference would in some degree counterbalance the increase of expenditure attendant on the establishment of the School on a proper footing.

I need not mention that the government have in their possession all the requisite nautical instruments.

The pupils should engage to serve for at least one season, on pain of forfeiting their wages; and in order to make them go through the whole course of instruction, which ought to last at least three years, stoppages should be made from their wages, to be returned in the shape of prizes, consisting of nautical instruments, charts, works on navigation, &c., when they obtain their diplomas as captains.

The magistrate commanding the government schooner, whose duties in the Gulf afford him some leisure hours every day, could translate French lessons in Navigation into English, and vice versa, and also give the pupils the necessary instruction in Arithmetic, Trigonometry, Astronomy, Geography, &c.

I think I can confidently predict that if a nautical school were established in which, while making enough to support themselves, young men of the country might learn the theory and practice of navigation, a great number of the most active would at once present themselves for admission; and these young men, as soon as they obtain their diplomas as Captains, would be able to sail our vessels to any ports where good profits were to be obtained, or, having become shipowners themselves, might forward to foreign markets on their own account the products of our Forests and our Fisheries.

McLEAN'S RELIEF BILL.

Tuesday, 4th May, 1858.

The Order of the Day being read for the second reading of the Bill intituled "An Act for the relief of John McLean," and for hearing Counsel for and against the same, and for the Members to be summoned,

Counsel were accordingly called in.

John Hector, Esquire, appearing as Counsel on behalf of the Petitioner,

And no Counsel appearing on behalf of Mrs. McLean,

Ordered, That the Counsel for the Petitioner be permitted to examine at the Bar of this House any Witnesses, and to produce any other evidence, tending to establish that due notice of the Order for the second reading of the said Bill, and a copy of the same have been duly served upon the party from whom the Divorce is sought, or to establish the impossibility of complying with the sixtieth Rule of this House.

Then Mr. Richard Yeates was called in, and being sworn was examined as follows:—

By Counsel—Do you know Mrs. McLean, the wife of the Petitioner, John McLean; have you served upon her a duplicate of the Bill now before this House for the relief of John McLean; produce the document being a duplicate of the Bill served by you on Mrs. McLean, and state whether you compared the document served by you with the document now produced, and ascertained that it was a correct copy before you served it?

I served a copy of the Bill, and the notice for the second reading on Mrs. McLean, wife of the Petitioner, on Monday, the 26th April, in the Village of Castalia, in the State of Ohio, within six miles of Sandusky. Before serving her, I had not been personally acquainted with Mrs. McLean, but she was pointed out to me as the wife of John McLean, and stated her name to be Diana Hevogill, married to John McLean, of Thornhill, in this Province; she also stated that she was married by the Reverend Mr. Rose. I compared copy of Bill and notice with the one now produced and ascertained that they were correct copies. Mrs. McLean gave the name of one Laidlaw and several others, who were present at the marriage. Isabella Craig was the name of the Bridesmaid.

Did you serve the Order now produced with the said Bill, by leaving a copy of it with the said Bill, at the time of such service, and did you compare the two to ascertain that you served a true copy of such order?

T did.

How, at what time, and in what manner was the said service effected?

By leaving them in her house. I read them to her—she was living with Alexander Gallagher, in the same house.

Did the said *Diana McLean* at the time of such service state any thing, and what as to her marriage with the Petitioner *John McLean*, if so, by whom, and when, and in whose presence was the said marriage solemnized?

I have already answered.

Did she at the time of such service state anything, and what, as to the Petitioner, John McLean, obtaining the relief prayed for in said Bill?

She stated that she had no objection to be divorced from Petitioner, and was content to live with Gallagher.

The Witness was directed to withdraw.

Then Simpson Hewgill was called in, and having been sworn was examined as follows:—

By Counsel.—Where do you live, and what is your occupation?

I live in Toronto. My occupation is that of a Cooper.

What relationship is there between yourself and Diana McLean, the wife of Petitioner?

I am her Brother.

When did you last see your sister, Diana McLean, with whom, and where was she then living?

My sister was living in Castalia nine months ago, and was then residing with one Alexander Gallagher.

Has the said Diana McLean had any child or children by Alexander Gallagher?

Yes, one child. My sister has been living with Alexander Gallagher ten years the child is three years old. I was present at the wedding they were married by the Reverend Mr. Rose, a Wesleyan Methodist Minister. Isabella Craig was also present at the wedding, and I believe that one Laidlaw was also present.

The Witness was directed to withdraw.

Then John Hewgill was called in and having been sworn was examined as follows:—

By Counsel.—Is your name John Hewgill, where do you live and what is your occupation?

My name is John Hewgill, I live in the Township of Vaughan, and am a Farmer.

What relationship exists between yourself and the Petitioner, John McLean, and his wife, Diana MoLean?

John McLean is my brother-in-law, and Diana McLean is my sister.

The witness was directed to withdraw.

The Counsel was directed to withdraw.

The Honorable Mr. Quesnel enters.

The Honorable Mr. Ross moved, seconded by the Honorable Mr. de Blaquière, That the further consideration and second reading of the said Bill be postponed until Thursday, the 20th instant.

The question of concurrence being put thereon, the same was resolved in the affirmative, and

Ordered accordingly.

THURSDAY, 20th May, 1858.

The Order of the Day being read for the further consideration and second reading of the Bill intituled "An Act for the relief of John McLean," and for hearing Counsel for and against the same, and for the Members to be summoned, Counsel were accordingly called in.

John Hector, Esquire, appearing as Counsel on behalf of Petitioner, And no Counsel appearing on behalf of Mrs. McLean,

Then Mr. John Laidlaw, of Toronto, Dry Goods Merchant, was called in and being sworn was examined, as follows:

By Counsel.—Do you know Diana McLean, the wife of the Petitioner, and if so, how long a time have you known her?

Yes, I do. I knew her previous to her marriage with the Petitioner.

Look at the Bill now produced and shewn to you, did you at any time, and when, serve *Diana McLean* with a duplicate of such Bill; had you, previous to such service, compared the document served by you with the document now produced, and ascertained that it was a correct copy?

I served her with a copy of this Bill on Friday last, at Castalia, in the State of Ohio.

By a Member.—Are you now speaking of Diana McLean, late of Thornhill, in the Township of York, wife of John McLean, and mentioned in the Bill?

I am.

By Counsel.—Did you at the time of such service serve the order now produced by leaving copies thereof with the said Diana McLean; did you, previous to the service, compare the copies with the originals, and ascertained that the copies you served were true copies?

Yes, I did.

Where did you effect the service of said Bill and Order upon said Diana McLean, and with whom was she living at the time of such service?

I served her in her own house, or at least the house of the person she is living with, Alexander Gallagher.

Did she at the time of such service state any thing, and if so, what respecting the previous service upon her of papers relating to the matters in question.

She answered that this was the fourth time she had been served with notice of

this Bill, that she had received notice of it from a newspaper in February last, and that she had since been served with notice of it twice by Mr. Yeates.

By a Member.—Had you any conversation with Mrs. McLean on the subject of this Bill on Friday last?

I had. I told her it was necessary that she should be served with a copy of the Bill by a person who knew her, because that was not the case with Mr. Yeates who served her before.

By Counsel.—Were you present at the marriage of the Petitioner, John McLean, and his wife, Diana McLean. Were you the groomsman on the occasion?

I was.

When, where and by whom was the marriage solemnized, and who were present at such marriage? Is Henry R. Carson now living?

The marriage was solemnized in her father's house at *Thornhill*, by the Reverend Mr. Rose, of the Wesleyan Methodist Church. Her father, mother, sisters and brothers were present, also a Miss Craig, from Toronto, as bridesmaid, and a Mr. Carson and several others whose names I do not remember. I was not personally acquainted with Mr. Carson, and I have been told that he is no longer living. It was in the month of February 1847.

Where did the Petitioner and his wife reside after the marriage, and for how long a time did they live and cohabit together?

They resided in Richmond Street, *Toronto*, for about seven months when they separated.

Were you in the habit of visiting the Petitioner and his wife while they were living together. Had you any opportunities of judging of the conduct and deportment of his wife. If so, state what you know, and what opinion you formed respecting the same?

I visited them several times after their marriage. I believe she did not act towards her husband as she ought to have done. She was not at home sometimes when she ought to have been, and otherwise gave cause to her husband to complain. When I served her with the Bill, she acknowledged that she had acted a little foolishly after she was married.

By a Member.—Did she say how she had acted foolishly—that she had flirted with other men, or what? Did she mention any fact?

No; she merely said she had acted in a frivolous, light manner, and given him occasion to complain in consequence.

By Counsel.—Are you aware that a separation took place between the Petitioner and his wife? If so, when did it take place, and where has the Petitioner constantly resided since the time of such separation?

I am. The separation took place in *Toronto*, and the Petitioner has resided in *Toronto* to my knowledge ever since.

Have you any, and if so, what reason to believe that the Petitioner had

cause of suspicion respecting the conduct of his wife previous to their separation?

I have no knowledge.

Where and with whom did the wife of the Petitioner reside after the separation?

She resided with her father at *Thornhill* until she went to the other side, which she told me would be six years in June next.

Has Diana McLean at any time and when stated to you how long she has lived in the United States, and with whom she has been living while there?

Answered by my answer to the previous question as to time. She introduced me to *Alexander Gallagher*, who was in the house at the time, and told me she had been living with him, she stated also that he was her husband.

By a Member.—Did she tell you she had obtained a Divorce on the other side? She did not.

By Counsel.—Has she at any time, and when, stated to you that she endeavoured to keep her departure from Canada and her place of abode in the United States concealed from the Petitioner?

She told me that it was not generally known when she left the Province—it was quiet. This was in answer to a question from me, as to whether it was generally known or not.

Has she at any time and when admitted to you that she has had a child since she has been living at *Castalia*, and who was the father of such child. What is the age of the said *Diana McLean* and is there any, and what, probability of her having more children?

She said in presence of *Gallagher*, that she had had a child, but it was dead three years ago. I did not ask her that question. Judging from her appearance at the time of her marriage, I should think she is about twenty-eight years old at present.

Has the Petitioner had any personal communication or intercourse with his wife since their separation. Have you any, and if so, what, reasons for believing that no such intercourse took place.

She stated that she had not had any intercourse with the Petitioner since they separated. I asked the question, and she answered she had not spoken to him.

Has the said *Diana McLean* admitted to you, and if so, when, that she had not conducted herself as a wife should do, previous to her separation from the Petitioner?

This question I have answered already.

Have you any, and if so, what, reason for believing that the said *Diana McLean* is willing that the Petitioner should have the relief prayed by him in the said Bill?

I asked her if she had any objection to this Bill being carried, and she answered that she had no objection.

By a Member.—Did she give you any reason for having concurred in the separation from her husband?

No. I do not think I asked her the question She made no complaint, and I suppose she took it for granted I knew all about it. She merely told me they were unhappy together.

Did she and Gallagher appear to you to be living together as man and wife?

They did.

Did you understand from her that they were married?

Yes; she introduced him to me, saying, this is my husband.

The Witness was directed to withdraw.

On motion of the Honorable Mr. Ross, seconded by the Honorable Mr. de Blaquière, it was

Ordered, That the said Bill be read a second time presently.

The said Bill was then read a second time accordingly.

Then Mr. John Hewgill, of the Township of Vaughan, farmer, was called in, and being sworn, was examined as follows:

By Counsel.—What relationship exists between yourself and the Petitioner, John McLean, and his wife, Diana McLean?

Diana McLean is my daughter.

What is the present age of Diana McLean?

I think about twenty-eight or thirty, but I am not quite certain.

Were you present at the solemnization of the marriage between the Petitioner, John McLean, and your daughter, Diana; when and where did the same take place, by what clergyman was the marriage ceremony performed, and who were present?

I was present. I think it was in February, 1847, at *Thornhill*, in my house; the Reverend *Samuel Rose* was the clergyman. There were present besides my wife and children, Mr. *Laidlaw*, Miss *Ellen Craig* and Mr. *Henry Carson*.

Where did the Petitioner and his wife reside after the said marriage, and for how long a time did they live and cohabit as man and wife?

In Toronto, Richmond Street, from the time of the marriage to August, in the same year. The deed of separation was drawn up in August, 1847.

Was there or not a deed of separation prepared and executed, and was not the deed now produced duly executed by yourself and the Petitioner, John McLean, and his wife?

Yes; this is the Deed of separation, of which I have a copy. It was executed by me, and by John McLean and Diana McLean.

Where and with whom did *Diana McLean* reside after the execution of the said deed of separation, and how long did she so reside after the separation; was there ever any issue of the marriage of the Petitioner, *John McLean*, and *Diana McLean*?

With me most of the time, and the rest of it with her brother, until she went to the States. There was no issue of the marriage.

Did any personal communication and cohabitation take place between the Petitioner and *Diana*, his wife, after their separation?

None, to my knowledge.

Where did the Petitioner, John McLean, reside during the time while Diana McLean lived with you, and had the Petitioner any access to her?

He lived in Toronto. I do not think he had access to her.

With whom and where is *Diana McLean* now living—what is the trade or business of the person with whom she is living? Have you any and what reason to believe that she is living in adultery, and with whom?

At Castalia, with Alexander Gallagher, who is a cooper. They were married when they went to the States; they went there for the purpose of being married

By a Member.—When was it she went to the States with Gallagher? About six years ago.

Were you in the habit of seeing her while she lived with her brother? Yes, frequently, every week.

By Counsel.—Has the said Diana McLean had any child or children born during the time that she had been living and co-habiting with Alexander Gallagher?

One boy.

By a Member.—I notice in the deed of separation that McLean agrees to pay her £30 a year, and that he will not insist on her living with him. Are you aware of the causes of the separation?

It was mutual disagreement, when I heard of it I thought the best thing they could do would be to separate. I advised it.

What was the cause of the disagreement?

They did not sleep together.

What was the cause of that?

She refused to sleep with him.

The Witness was directed to withdraw.

Then Mr. Charles Brown, of Toronto, Clerk, was called in and being sworn was examined as follows:

By Counsel.—Do you know the Reverend Samuel Rose, and if so, how long have you known him?

I have known him for ten years.

Where does he now reside?

He resides at Dundas, near Hamilton.

Are you acquainted with his hand writing, and do you know his signature? I am acquainted with his hand writing, and signature.

Look at the certificate now produced, and state by whom the same was written and signed.

This is written and signed by the Reverend Samuel Rose.

Of what denomination of Christians was Mr. Rose minister at the time of the marriage mentioned in the certificate?

The Wesleyan Church of Canada.

The Witness was directed to withdraw.

The Counsel was directed to withdraw.

And on motion of the Honorable Mr. Prince, seconded by the Honorable Mr. Simpson, it was

Ordered, That the said Bill be printed, and read a third time to-morrow.

Sir,—The Senate of the University of Toronto, have placed in my hands the enclosed paper under their seal, with the documents accompanying it.

Their object is to become affiliated to the University of *London*, and if (consistently with the ordinary rules of this latter body), such a step can be taken, I am clearly of opinion that it will be in every way advantageous.

The University of *Toronto* are now erecting a building on a large scale which will enable them to afford to students increased accommodation, and increased facilities for study.

Their endowment is large, and their staff of Professors comprise men of considerable ability and reputation. They have not been in all respects prosperous but I think many of their difficulties have been owing to the fact that the Provincial Act under which they are now incorporated, connects them too closely with the Executive Government of the Province.

I hold it to be of great importance that Institutions in the Colonies like the University of *Toronto*, should connect themselves with those of a similar character in the mother country. The influence and weight of the former would be increased by such a tie, and it is probable that a proper standard of instruction would be kept more steadily in view.

Sir,—I have received from your office an Address from the Honorable the Legislative Council to His Excellency the Governor General, praying that he would be pleased to communicate to that Honorable House the reasons which have prevented the Indian Department from distributing to the Indians of Lower Canada the sum of £1000, which they are entitled to receive as an annuity, under the Act 14 and 15 Vic. chap. 106.

Applications for grants wherewith to provide food or seed have always been complied with, but looking to the terms on which the grant was made for the relief of the destitute and indigent Indians, the Indian Department has found it necessary to decline to make a permanent fixed annual appropriation for the behoof of any particular band.

In 1852, the Government of the day decided that the most profitable method of employing a considerable portion of this tund, was to reserve it, and apply the accummulated proceeds to the formation of settlements for the Indians, with the view of inducing them to abandon their nomadic habits. Accordingly, under the order in Council, dated 30th December, 1852, and of which a copy is enclosed, the sum of £1420 was invested for the benefit of these tribes, and an application is now before the Executive Government for carrying out this arrangement on behalf of one of the tribes who are desirous of forming a compact settlement.

The money expended has been fully accounted for, as will appear by reference to the Return already laid before the Legislative Council.

Extract from a Report of a Committee of the Honorable the Executive Council, on matters of state, dated 24th December, 1852, approved by His Excellency the Governor General in Council, on the 30th December, 1852, T

On the Report of the Honorable R. Bruce, Superintendent General of Indian Affairs, dated 21st December, 1852, in reference to the application of the annual grant of £1000, made under the provisions of the Act 14th and 15th Vict. chap. 106, for the benefit of the Indians of Lower Canada.

The Superintendent General appends to his Report a tabular statement, exhibiting the respective numbers, locations and resources or means of subsistance in so far as they can be ascertained, of the several tribes or bands of Indians residing in Lower Canada, and states that from the numbers (5000), given in this table, which, as regards the tribes not receiving presents, is but a proximate estimate probably rather below than above the reality; it must be obvious that an indiscriminate per capita distribution of the grant would not only be un productive of any lasting benefit to the Indians, but would afford no sensible relief to their immediate wants. It becomes then a question of serious importance whether in the exercise of the discretion with which it has been entrusted by the Act, the Government cannot adopt some other and more advantageous principle for the application of the fund, based rather upon the relative circumstances than the numbers of the several tribes.

That it is exceedingly desirable that the land which the Government, by the above mentioned Act, is empowered to set apart for the benefit of the Indians, should-be-vested in them with the least possible delay, in order that they may settle and commence their operations without fear of molestation, that concurrently with this wise and benevolent arrangement, the pressure of their increasing wants, the advice of their missionaries, and the example of the whites have contributed to incline the Indians to seek new means of subsistence. Already the settlement of the Indians at the River Desert, and others of the intended Reserves, is rapidly progressing. It remains for the Government to countenance

and promote this salutary movement by the employment of the fund so opportunely placed at its disposal in providing the settlers with implements of husbandry and other appliances, of which, under their altered circumstances, they may stand most in need, and by this means at once to encourage them to persevere, and to induce others to follow their example. The recommendations therefore, which the Superintendent General is prepared to submit, are as follows:—

That until the annual presents are withdrawn, one-fourth only of the grant shall be allotted to the tribes participating therein, to be employed at the discretion of the Government in meeting sudden emergencies, for the prosecution of necessary suits at law, or for the future use of the tribes, that occasional relief shall when necessary, be extended to the wandering tribes, and that the residue of the fund shall be devoted to the improvement of the new settlements, and to promote the comfort and general interest of the settlers.

That a balance of upwards of £600 remains unexpended of the grant for 1851-2, and the Superintendent General recommends that Your Excellency will be pleased to direct that the said balance may, together with the grant for 1852-3, be held applicable under the orders of Your Excellency in Council, for the purposes to which it has been appropriated by law.

The Committee recommend that the views of the Superintendent General be concurred in, and that the Commissioner of Crown Lands be directed to give immediate effect to that part relating to the lands proposed to be vested in the Indians.

The Secretary of the Province.

Sir,—In obedience to the commands of His Excellency the Governor General, conveyed to me in your letter of the 14th ultimo, accompanied by a copy of an order in Council to the same effect, I have visited the barracks and other buildings at Penetanguishene, in Canada West, and at Isle aux Noix, on the River Richelieu in Lower Canada, in company with Edward Horsey, Esquire, Architect to the Provincial Penitentiary, and have now the honor to report on the availability of the buildings at the above stations for the purposes of invenile reformatories for either poor of the Province, under the provisions of the Statute 20 Vict., chap. 28; I k.— also to append an estimate prepared by Mr. Horsey, of the expence necessary for adapting these buildings to the above purposes.

The barracks and buildings at *Penetanguishene* are well suited to the required purpose; they are of cutstone, and have been calculated to receive 140 men and officers. The site is healthy, cheerful and well watered—the supplies sufficient—the military have always so found them; although remote from common interioruse it is perfectly accessible by railway to *Barrie*, and from thence by 35 miles of every good road soy water, it can be reached from the whole Province. Materials for tuilding are to be obtained easily; lumber, whether manufactured or otherwise, in the vicinity. Stone from quarries on an Island not far distant.

which has already furnished material for the barracks. From 20 to 25 acres of land may be readily inclosed for purposes of gardening to which a much larger extent for farming labour can be added upon settlement of the question of the location of the pensioners, which cannot be long delayed. The accomodation for the officers of the institution is ready made and good. Storage convenient and ample.

The question of enclosure or fences for purposes of security and the construction of cells in the same view, naturally gave rise to the enquiry as to the system of detention employed in the most recently constructed reformatories, as contradistinguished from penitentiaries. The principles now applied to the one class of of establishments differ so widely from the management of the other as to affect materially the form and the cost of detention, and knowing the great improvements taking place almost daily under the reformatory system, we did not feel ourselves justified in pronouncing on questions involving great and perhaps needless expenditure, without having first an opportunity of judging of the present, and the best working of principles of reformatory discipline, yet new to Canada.

In this view of the subject I felt it to be necessary in passing though Toronto on my way to Isle aux Noix, in Lower Canada, to obtain authority, to visit, before reporting, a Juvenile Reformatory at Portland, established within the last four years, and presenting, it was to be presumed, all the latest and most approved modifications of the system of discipline employed in such institutions, as well as of the form of construction now considered necessary for the detention of the inmates.

Isle aux Noix was visited on the 6th inst. It is an Island situated in the River Richelieu, a few miles below where the River leaves Lake Champlain, and has been long considered the most important military post on the Eastern Frontier of In view of future contingencies it is desirable that the buildings and works at this post should be kept in repair, and this object can be attained usefully and economically by applying them to the purposes of a juvenile reformatory. The Island contains 150 acres of land, all the property of the Government: although not elevated, it is healthy, as indicated by the appearance of the inhabitants, adult as well as children, and by military statistics. The water is good, supplies obtainable from the same sources by which the soldiers have been provided. The approach is convenient both by railway and river; materials for building, if required, can be always and readily procured.

Fort Lenox has been constructed on the south eastern extremity of the Island. It is a regular work, embracing about 12 acres of land, with cu tains, basti ns, ditches, &c., offering in themselves considerable means of detention in connection with the present subject. The buildings within the enceinte are all of cut stone, covered with tin, very well built and conveniently arranged. The barracks are intended to accommodate 300 men; they are spacious and well ventilated. Officers' quarters are in like proportion. Two separate buildings, hitherto appropriated as stores, can be used as workshops, leaving still abundance of space for storage. The hospital arrangements for cooking, and for confinement or temporary punishment, are complete and in good order.

Within the fort itself ample space and means for useful occupation in gardening will be found, and the first duty of the inmates under the proposed arrangement should be to keep the present earth works in perfect repair, involving for the greater part of the year labour of an agricultural, or, nearly allied to, an agricultural character; but in addition, the Island affords large scope for field labour, and farm operations, the detail of which must be left to those who may be called upon to carry out the contemplated system.

I take, however, the opportunity of saying that in reconsidering the subject in its new aspect. I beg leave to withdraw the recommendations contained in my R ports of 1st July, 1857, and 2nd March 1858, on the subject of a piece of and (Ordnance property) situated at South River. This piece of land contains about 145 arpents, and is situated on an angle lying between the south shore of the Richelieu, opposite to Isle aux Noix and the South River. I had recommended that the above described piece of land slould be sold at Public Auction; I would now retain it for the use of the proposed institution. The wood upon it would furnish fuel and winter occupation for the inmates in preparing it, for some time to come, when cleared it could, under a proper system of reformatory management, be used for agricultural purposes, or if sold hereafter, could be sold at an enhanced price.

Then, the land on the Island and at South River will furnish together nearly 300 acres applicable to those farming operations, best suited to the Educational objects of a Reformatory Institution.

It became next necessary, with reference to the estimate of cost in adapting these buildings to the desired purposes, to ascertain the means of detention which the progressive experience of every day in this peculiar branch of prison discipline, considers now to be indispensable. Therefore, accompanied by Mr. Horsey, I visited on the 18th inst., the Juvenile Reformatory, established November 1853, at Cape Elizabeth, near Portland It is a State Institution; learning there, that on the preceding day a new Juvenile Reformatory for the State of New Hamp shire, had been opened near the Town of Manchester, I determined also to see this institution, visiting by the way the Boston "House of Reformation." The result of these observations and enquiries will be best shown by the suggestions it will be my duty to offer.

It is unnecessary to discuss here the merits of the two systems of reformatory discipline, recognized as the best, whether the "Reformatory Congregated System" generally employed in the *United States*, or the "System of Groups" as introduced at *Mittray*, in *France*, and recently adopted by one or two of the Reformatories of *America*. I may say, however, that, so far as the question

of expense is concerned, the latter appears to require a more extensive machinery and to involve a greater cost. The result of the experiment may show a greater gain or saving in the end, but we are so circumstanced as to make it desirable that we should proceed without delay, and in the most economical manner, on some general principle, which will not interfere with the adoption of any modification or improvement which the experience of others or our own, may teach to be the best, at any future period.

I learn, from Returns obtained this 25th May, from the Provincial Penitentiary at Kingston, that the establishment contains 120 inmates under the age of twenty-one years.

Under the Act 20 Vict., cap. 28, the Governor of the Province is empowered to provide or erect two buildings, one in *Upper*, the other in *Lower Canada*, for the confinement and reformation of convicted offenders under the age of twenty-one years. It is presumed to be the intention of the Act that the confinement to be employed should be the wholesome restraint necessary to reform. It should not amount to, or bear the aspect of punishment. The convict is to understand that his removal to the reformatory betters his condition, that it is his interest to behave well, that an attempt to escape or incorrigible we conduct will be punished by his being returned to the severe discipline of the Pennentiary.

Higher and worthicr motives for improvement may be engratted on this basis—but starting from this point, it appears to me that something may be done at once and at a comparatively small expense, to relieve the *Kingston* Penitentiary of its excessive number, by removing, first some, and shortly the remainder of the convicts under twenty-one years of age.

Of the two localities, Penetanguishene and Isle aux Noix, selected as juvenile reformatories, I consider the latter to be adapted to receive, at once, and without preliminary preparation, a certain number of juvenile offenders; the ramparts and wet ditches, and the structure of the buildings, when combined with a proper degree of vigilance, would, in my opinion, afford sufficient security. An efficient Warden, with active, intelligent assistance, would, I conceive, take charge of fifty convicts, selected as the best behaved, and informed thoroughly of the alternative of their conduct, and with them make all the preparation necessary for the reception of the rest.

The statute has prudently and properly left the selection of his officers and assistants to the Warden. It appears to me to be desirable, in view both of efficiency and economy, to try whether men could not be found to fill at once the double capacity of Instructor and guard. Then if the Warden, in selecting four Wardens, could find one a blacksmith, another a carpenter, a third a mason and stone-cutter, a fourth competent to teach farming; these men could instruct and watch at the same time. The country could afford to pay one man well for doing the work of two, while the nature of the work required would sharpen the facul-

ties, increase the vigilance, and augment the usefulness of the man. Instead of employing two sets of men, one to teach and the other to watch, combine both, improve thereby the rate of pay and the incentive to vigilance, reduce the aggregate expense, and secure, as I believe, greater efficiency.

Of the physical appliances for the detention of the convicts under a reformatory system, the person selected as Warden must be the best judge; the extent to which they are employed will greatly affect the question of expense. It is well known, that in Reformatory Institutions, all outward and visible signs of confinement have been, to a great extent, and, in some instances, entirely discarded. But it must be kept in mind, that the individuals with whom we have to deal at the outset, are convicts young in years, but often old in crime, who have been accustomed to the restraint of Penitentiary discipline, and who may not readily understand the advantages of the alternative to be offered to them. It is necessary to provide against the ebullitions of ill-regulated, uncontrolled character, but as a general rule, (and an experience of ten years in the supervision of one of the largest prisons in the province, the common gaol of the District of Montreal, may justify me in speaking on the subject,) the less reliance placed an physical appliances the better, and this as much on account of the guards as of the prisoners they have in charge. I have always found that the greater the array of cells, and bars and bolts, the less is there of the necessity for vigilance, and the greater the tendency to relaxation. If a prisoner escapes, the physical appliances are always at fault; the present object is to provide sufficient security at the least expense.

The gentleman selected as Warden will doubtlessly abstain from expensive precautions for purposes of detention, until he has ascertained by practical experience what he really requires. The present object, therefore, is to provide him, at the outset, with such instruments as may enable him to acquire the amount of experience safely. I beg therefore to suggest that the first reformatory should be opened at "Isle aim Noin" as furnishing ready-made the most complete means of security. I recommend also, respectfully, that the Wardens, both of Penetanguishene and Isle aim Noin, should be appointed simultaneously, but that both Wardens and their subordinates should, for some short time, be employed, under command of the Warden at Isle aim Noin, at that establishment, in conducting the removal of the convicts, so destined, from the Kingston Penitentiary, in superintending their preliminary labour for their own reception and that of others, and in organizing, advisedly, a system which will apply uniformly to Penetanguishene and Isle aim Noin.

By this means the Officer at *Isle aux Noix* will receive strength for present and temporary purposes, and the Officer intended for *Penetanguishene* will acquire experience. No unnecessary cost will be incurred, and I believe that a system will be arrived at, accomplishing the desire! object at the least cost, present and future.

What that system should be it is not for me to dwell upon. My province is

under the order in Council, to pronounce upon the availability of the buildings and "the estimate of expense," and it is only with reference to the expense that I have been drawn, unavoidably, to approach the system at all, or perhaps, more correctly, the preliminaries to a system.

But the availability of the buildings affect so largely the question of expense, that I feel it to be my duty, before closing, again to revert to the subject. By the acquisition of the buildings at *Penetanguishene* and *Isle aux Noix*, and by having the power of applying them immediately to reformatory purposes, the Province is spared not only the evils of delay, but the heavy cost of construction. With the 300 acres of land surrounding them, the barracks and buildings at *Isle aux Noix* never cost less than \$400,000. They are worth to the Province for the present purposes with the 300 acres of land surrounding them, at least \$125,000. A site equally eligible elsewhere, if to be found, would cost ten times that sum. The buildings at *Penetanguishene* [although neither so extensive nor so complete as at *Isle aux Noix*], are worth to the Province for reformatory purposes at least \$25,000, the land, say 250 acres, at ten dollars per acre, \$2500. The immediate outlay, therefore, spared to the Province by the adoption of these buildings as Juvenile Reformatories, will, at the lowest estimate, equal a sum of \$150,000 cy.

I find, by examination of the statistics of seventeen Reformatory Institutions in the United States, that the cost of the inmates per head, per annum, ranges from \$80 to \$122. The average, covering all costs of site and construction, as well as annual expenses, equals 97 \frac{100}{33} per head. Profiting by the experience of these antecedents, and allowing for disadvantages or accidents, which I rather admit than foresee, I place the cost of the inmates of our proposed Reformatories at \$100 per head, but deducting therefrom 40 per cent. as interest of money which would otherwise have been expended in sites and buildings, I consider that the cost of each inmate should not exceed \$60 per head, being by the proposed arrangement \$37 \frac{130}{33} per head less than it costs in the United States, and \$40 per head less than at the very lowest estimate it would have cost the Province had it been necessary to provide land and buildings otherwise.

I have the honor to append hereto the Report of Mr. Horsey, the architect of the Kingston Penitentiary, by which it appears that he estimates the cost of adapting the barracks and buildings at Penetanguishene and Isle aux Noix, to the purpose of juvenile reformatories, respectively at the sum of £2,500 or \$10,000; this outlay to be caused by the erection of cells, iron gratings to windows general repairs, &c., &c., &c.

I consider Hr. Horsey's estimate to be very moderate. I think it would be well to provide for this expenditure, but before expending this sum of money for the objects estimated, it would be, I submit, desirable to ascertain, by practical experience, as before respectfully suggested, how far cells and iron gratings may

be necessary, under the existing conditions of the buildings referred to, for the purpose of juvenile reformatories.

Sir,—In answer to yours of the 24th April, 1858, relative to the availability of the buildings at *Penetanguishene* and *Isle aux Noix*, for purposes of juvenile reformatories. I would beg to state, in the first place, that *Penetanguishene* combines all the questions in a general point of view, which you have laid down, and with a comparative small outlay, say for the reception of one hundred juveniles the cost would be about £2,500 or \$100 for each individual. The outlay would be caused in the erection of cells, iron gratings to windows, general repairs, &c.

With respect to the last question you wished to be informed as to the number of delinquents now confined in the Provincial Penitentiary under the age of twenty years, they are as follow, viz: 120 Males, Eighty from Canada West, and forty-four from Canada East; Females, from Canada West 5, from Canada East 3.

With respect to *Isle auw Noiw*, the buildings are good and well laid out for a reformatory, with officers' quarters, work-shops, store-rooms, and out-offices. The premises are surrounded with water, which would, to a very considerable extent, prove a barrier to escape.

St. John's Barracks, C. E.—These buildings are built of brick, and in good order, laid out, forming a square and well adapted for an asylum, and could be converted into such at a small cost.

To the Honorable

The Secretary of the Province.

Sir.—Having been honored by a Commission to report upon the applicability of the Military Posts of Penetanguishene and Isle aux Noix to the purposes of

juvenile reformatories, my attention has been drawn, in the course of the enquiry, to the readiness and economy with which other barracks and buildings at other military stations, now transferred to the Province as part of the Ordnance Lands, might be converted to the objects of Public Institutions, the want of which is universally admitted, and the establishment of which is contemplated by the 33rd sect. of the Act 20 Vict. cap. 28, being "An Act for establishing Prisons for young "offenders, for the better Government of Public Asylums, Hospitals, and "Prisons, and for the better construction of Common Gaols."

I take the liberty, therefore, of bringing these subjects under the notice of His Excellency the Governor General, in connection with my report of the 20th inst., on the subject of Juvenile Reformatories.

It is admitted, on all sides, with pain and compunction, that in Lower Canada the accommodation for Lunatics is distressingly insufficient, that in neither Upper nor Lower Canada does there exist a receptacle for the humane custody of the idiot, the maniac, the incurable. In fact, that of our upper classes many of those thus unhappily or calamitously afflicted, are removed, from necessity, to foreign establishments, far from the eye of friends, and where the money expended would have contributed to the support of a similar establishment in Canada. It is known that in neither Province do we possess an Asylum for the Deaf, the Dumb, or the Blind, nor do we possess in the Upper Province a proper Marine Hospital for the reception of the diseased, the maimed, or the frost-bitten mariner of our lakes.

The Act 20 Vict., cap. 28, evidently contemplates the speedy establishment of an Asylum for Idiots, as well as Institutions for the reception and instruction of the deaf, the dumb, and the blind. The generous donation of the Ordnance Lands by the Imperial Government, affords the Province a speedy and cheap means of sup plying these deficiencies and having satisfied myself, by an examination of similar Institutions, during my late visit to Laston and Portland, on the subject of Juvenile Reformatories, of the applicability of many of the buildings on the Ordnance Reserves throughout Canada to like purposes, I beg leave respectfully to bring my views under the notice of His Excellency the Governor General.

1. I propose to convert the barracks and buildings at St. Johns, C. E, to the use of a Lunatic Asylum for Lower Canada. We find by the census of 1851-52, that we have in Lower Canada 1,733 Lunatics; of this number one half is presumed to be idiotic. The excellent establishment at Beauport receives 400 Lunatics. The remainder ought to be provided for without delay. To effect this object with the least delay, let us avail ourselves of existing buildings disposable for the purpose; we have them, made to our hands, at St. Johns.

St. Johns is within twenty miles of Montreal, at all times accessible by Railroad, and from some parts of the Province also by water. It is situated pleasantly on the River Richelieu, in one of the healthiest parts of the Province, the barracks and buildings are of brick, covered with tin. The barracks and officers.

quarters consists of four separate buildings, forming four sides, of a large square and calculated to accommodate 600 men with the ordinary compliment of officers. They are surrounded by the remains of old earth-works, sufficient to assist greatly to detain the inmates without obtrusive evidence of detention. They might easily by the healthful labor of the inmates be made highly prnamental in The officers' quarters fronting on the River Richelieu, with pleasure grounds intervening, might be adapted for the reception of patients whose means would enable them to pay the expense of extra accommodation. The barracks are surrounded by about 85 acres of land, affording scope for those horticultural and agricultural occupations, or recreations which have been so successfully practiced at Handell; and other great institutions in Europe. 2. I propose to convert the stone hospital and part of the buildings at Lagrainie, to wit: the officers' quarters, to the purpose of a receptacle for idjots, maniacs and all incurable lunatics. Liknow not how far the expression is correct; but I mean those whose hopeless or excessive malady may affect injuriously convalescing apatients. In former reports, 3rd July, 1857, and 10th March, 1858, A. had recommended that the materials of these buildings should be sold. To a considerable extent I begate retract that opinion; I still propose to sell and get rid of the materials of the old cavalry and artillery barracks and stables, which, still good, so far as the materials are concerned, are going to ruin as buildings, and are not worthy of repair, and indeed useless if repaired; I propose to sell off all but the buildings first above mentioned, to repair and maintain the present picket fence, which encloses ten or twelve acres of land and the said buildings, and with such additions as may be necessary, of the extent or character of which I am not prepared to speak, make it an asylum for idious. &c., &c., for the Lower Province. the old Fort, Fort Pentchartrain, the oldest and even yet, the most perfect fortalice of the kind in America. I again respectfully bring this subject under the notice of His Excellency, fortified, however, on this occasion by the expression of my belief, that if restored, this building would serve well as an Hospital for the sick, both of the deaf and dumb, and of the blind institution; I beg leave to remark that I propose to place the deaf and dumb and the blind in separate buildings, and that there is in the vicinity, accommodation for the officers of such establishments, also the property of the Government.

I find by the census returns of 1851-52 that Lower Canada contains 865 deaf mutes, and 554 blind—1419 in all. In providing for these unfortunates it is necessary to classify further into deaf-mutes, males, 514; females, 351; blind males, 308; females, 246. To provide for these numbers and for this classification of sexes, Chambly would be inadequate, but if the general idea meets with approval, we have the barracks at Three Rivers (which I have not as verthad time to visit personally), which might be made to receive a portion of each description of the afflicted, or perhaps the whole of one description—say the less numerous—the blind. Even if the accommodation is insufficient much may be done with little delay—and, I believe, with little expense, to relieve a large amount of human suffering. It is almost unnecessary to add that the interest which attaches itself to the relief of those, whom God has been pleased thus to visit, counterbalances every other feeling, and that these establishments, even in the heart of cities, are unobectionable.

In Upper Canada the provision for Lunatics is more extensive than in Lower Canada, and I am led to understand, that further arrangements are contemplated for the reception of this class of patients. I do not believe that there is in Upper Canada any special receptacle for idiots or incurable insensates: I therefore propose—

- 4. That on the final relinquishment of Fort Malden to the Province, the barracks and buildings at that port should be devoted to this object. Fort Malden, Amherstburg, is accessible to all parts of Upper Canada by water, and by Rail-road to Windsor, and the buildings referred to are at sufficient distance from Amherstburg and yet near enough for supplies.
- 5. I propose further, that the barracks and buildings at London; C. W., when finally relinquished should be appropriated to the purposes of Deaf and Dumb and Blind Institutions for Upper Canada. It is unnecessary for me to dilate upon the advantages of the site. The fact that we have public buildings on the spot applicable at once to this humane object may be regarded as most fortunate; the number of blind and of deaf-mutes in Upper Canada is little more than one half the number of the same class returned from the Lower Province of deaf-mutes in Upper Canada, we have males 280; females 189; totals 478; of blind smales 185; females 131—total 316. The barracks at London, which consist of two

large distinct buildings and a hospitaly which may be used in common, would, I conceive, receive allarge proportion of the whole, with samecessary classification.

Finally, I propose to use the barracks and buildings at Nagara as a Marine Hospital for the service of Canadian mariners on the Lakes, buildings are there sufficient for the purpose, the situation is pleasant and most healthful, central it appears to me, and convenient to the Welland Canal, the grand central artery of our lake navigation. Our neighbours have provided similar institutions. A Marine Hospital at Detroit is a conspicuous monument of wise and humane precaution. The numerous casualties on our shore every year teach the necessity of a like provision in Canada.

The Government of Canada possess in the buildings, above enumerated the rudiments of institutions which may, consequently, be created at once, at little cost, with great gain to humanity and to the national character of Canada. Future expansions and future changes may be made in accordance with circumstances and with experience. Enough will be done at present if we are enabled to begin.

Having endeavoured to show how far and in what way these public buildings may be made useful to the Province. I take advantage of the occasion to show further, that the application of these buildings to the proposed purposes will not only, to a considerable extent, attain the object contemplated by the Statute 20 Vict., chap. 28, but will go far to realize the purpose for which the ordnance properties were generously transferred to the Province, by creating a fund for the support of a Provincial Milita and Police.

These, buildings represent to the Province, (apart from the consideration of time saxed) the money it would have cost to erect them. The land connected with them, if bought by the Province, at an arbitrary price, would unquestionably have cost much more than the value I shall put upon it.... I consider therefore that in applying these buildings and land to philanthropic objects of Provincial concernment, the Legislature should fainly estimate and capitalize their value, placing the interest of the capital sum amually no the credit of the Militis Fund:

I estimate the money value of these lands and buildings to the Province (if employed as above proposed), including also, the value of the dands and buildings at Penetagorishene and Islama Noise appropriated to the purposes of Luvenile. 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It may, I think, be fairly assumed, that if these lands and buildings are made use of, as suggested, the Province will have acquired property worth one million of dollars, and applicable instantly to the most important public purposes, without any advance of capital, and I presume there will be no difficulty in crediting the Militia Fund with the Interest annually, to wit: \$60,000.

It may not be irrelevant to the present subject to add, that although, under actual circumstances, it would be difficult to assign a reliable value to the remainder of the Ordnance properties, comprehending the lands on the Rideau and Ottawa Canals, the Seigniory of Sorel, lands at Toronto (some of Whierson for upwards of \$,4000 per acre, in January, 1857), at Kingston, London, Chatham, and at linear all the salient points of the Frontier, acquiring value daily for Railway and other Public purposes: still it cannot be unreasonable to assign to them, (83,817 acres finall,) the value placed upon them by the Ordnance Department, it will include at a time when the value of lands in Curativ was lower than at present. The estimated value of these lands by the Ordnance Department is £340,000, or \$1,360,000 Currency,

If, therefore, the Province has acquired by the transfer of these lands, a property worth \$2,360,000 Currency, under a gustantee contained in the Act of Barlament, (18 Vic., cap. 91, vide first and last clauses), that the proceeds shall be applied to the formation of a fund for the support of a Provincial Militia and Police, the Legislature can have no hesitation, in pursuance of the terms of the contract, whether these properties be appropriated by the Province to Provincial purposes or be sold or retained, in applying annually the Interest of the above Capital value, or the sum of \$141,600, equal to £35,400, to the support of the Militia and Police of the Province, in addition to any sum, which, independent of this assistance, the exigen-

cies of these important services in a country like Canada, ordinarily require. I beg leave to remark, in conclusion, that the application of these barracks and buildings to the proposed objects will still leave them available for purposes of defence, if ever so required; and I propose that at Penetanguishene and Isle aux Noix, the labour of the inmates of the proposed establishments should be primarily and specially devoted to the maintenance of these works, as military defences of the Province.
