The Liberian Government schr. Lark, was despatched to watch her movements, which so alarmed the captain that he miled precipitately from Trade Town, towing the supercarge on shore. The supercarge was afterwards decured and sent on board the British beig Hotsel.—Boaton Traveller, November 22.
