## Canada to Have a New Coat of Arms

The design for the new Canadian coat of arms has gone to the College of Heralds. The procedure is somewhat involved. After approval by Canadian government the design goes to the College of Heralds, when it is possible some minor technical changes may be suggested. Subsequently formal approval is given by the King in Council on instructions issued to the Earl Marshall, who is head of the College of Heralds.

The new coat of arms bears the device "a mari usque ad mare" (from sea to sea). It is taken from the singularly appropriate line in the 72nd Psalm: "He shall have dominion from sea to sea".

Approval of the coat of arms was the last act of the Borden government.

## Toronto Fair Notes

Exhibition crowds will be the first to see the second and last installment of the Canadian War Memorial Paintings. They come to Toronto direct from England, and after the big fair will be packed, not to be shown again until the War Museum is opened at Ottawa.

An added touch of realism will be given the Canadian National Exhibition Spectacle this year by a large battle tank in action—"Over the top with the Canadians".

For the first time automobile races will be held at the Toronto Fair this year. Any automobile driver establishing a new world's record for a half mile track will receive \$1000. A new Dominion record will net the winner \$500, the drivers to select their own distances.

There are nearly 100 building both large and small used for display purposes at the Canadian National.

The grand stand at the Canadian National Exhibition has a seating capacity of 16,800, with room for 8,000 more on the lawn.

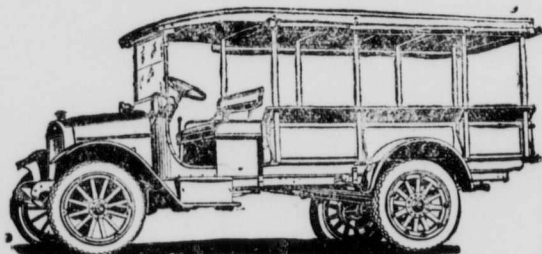

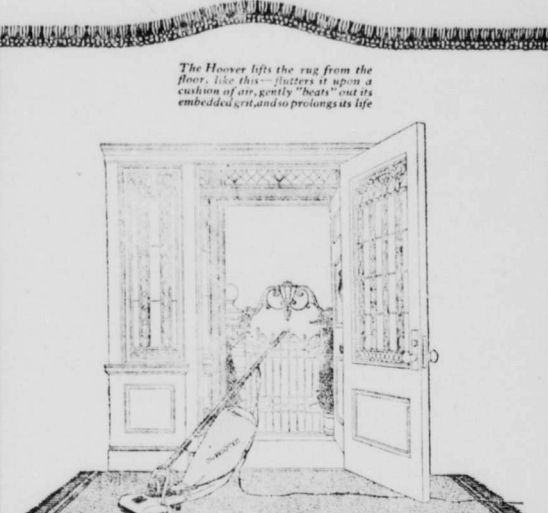
**A Popular Move.**  
 In adopting the suggestion in favor of standardization of potatoes, the Ontario Vegetable Growers' Association, at their annual convention, made a move that, as well as being in the direction of an ultimate benefit to the industry, should go to make the association popular with the home consumers of potatoes, which means almost the entire population of Canada. No other product is so widely used, nor so poorly prepared for market as is the potato crop, and growers may rest assured that a guarantee to the consumer that his purchases of this staple will be according to sample, will result in a much stronger market for potatoes. Since it must be admitted that the loss entailed in accepting potatoes of mixed quality has become very generally realized since food products of all kinds began to increase greatly in price with the outbreak of the war, and as consumers in general have learned the lessons of looking for the most possible in the way of actual food value for the money expended, potatoes will have to stand comparison in this regard, with whatever other food is capable of giving the desired results.

**Shorthorns Took First.**  
 In the block test at the last fat stock show, held at Buenos Aires by the Rural Society of Argentina, animals of the Shorthorn breed were first and third in a class of 13, while second and third places were taken by an Angus cross and a pure-bred Angus respectively.

**Canada's Credit.**  
 Canada's credit stands high. A reputation for sound financial methods during the war has been of inestimable benefit to the Dominion. Behind this stands also the realization of her immense natural resources and the fact that on the North American continent she is almost the sole remaining outlet for new settlement on a large scale. Within the new decade or two she will probably receive millions of the best class of immigrants, and these will make her per capita burdens light. The net public debt of Canada stands to-day at 1,500 million dollars. Seventy-five per cent. of it is due to Canadians. Weighed against her natural resources it is not heavy. It must also be taken into account that among her other assets Canada now owns and operates 14,000 miles of railway.

### Oil Cheaper Than Coal.

The high price of coal and the prospects of it becoming dearer still has resulted in a big demand for oil fuel. It is now cheaper to use oil fuel in ships and factories than it is to use coal. Perhaps before long we shall be using it in our homes, too.

The great coal strikes of 1911 and 1912 made hundreds of big firms turn towards oil, and it is a remarkable fact that once oil fuel has been used coal is abandoned forever.

Oil is not only cheaper than coal, but it is cleaner and less trouble. It is ever so much easier to transport and to supply to engines. A few feet of tubing and a main line express engine, for example, can take in 600 gallons of oil fuel in from four to five minutes. Oil, too, has the advantage that there are so many big deposits of it in various parts of the world that it is not affected by strikes so much as coal.

When proper oil-burning machines are used, there is no smoke attached to it at all, and factories using oil have no tall chimneys, no piles of ashes, no tedious shovelling of coal into the furnace. Just a few pipes, that's all. A few taps regulate the oil supply to the boiler furnace, and, in fact, with oil the grimy coal stokers can be replaced by girls in spotless white caps and aprons.
