RED CROSS BAZAAR IN FULL OPERATION

Will Be Continued All Day Today.

Yesterday morning the doors were opened and the public entered to participate in the Red Cross Bazaar conducted by the Red Cross of Kentville ably assisted by the various Red Cross Societies of the County. This Bazaar is certainly conducted on a grand scale and every reader who scans these lines should decide to attend before the doors close late this evening.

The place is the Old Court House and Drill Hall, with various tents and the new Band Stand where the Band holds forth. The visitor is attracted to the spot by the great display of the Allies, bunting, etc. The main building is very prettily decorated. Just inside the doors the Cake Booth with a display which shows the wonderful ability of Red Cross workers as cooks. A label Dream Cake - 15 cents a dream, is a feature of this department.

The different booths represent the

countries at war for the Allies, France flashes forth with her flags and colors and French ladies in costume in the candy booth where most delicate home made, etc., candy is dispensed, Scotland and lassies in Scotch plaid have charge of the ice cool drinks of all kinds with the tartan well displayed and plenty to quench the thirst in hot weather.

The main hall is the Japanese Tea Room where many tables are spread in delicate array of Japanese ware, with pretty and attentive girls to serve the hungry to lunches and tea. The walls are beautifully arrayed with Japanese lanterns, Japanese flowers of various kinds.

Adjoining is the Ice Cream Booth, representing Britain and her various Colonies and Provinces. It is a place most liberally patronized where one can be waited upon by a handsome lady from any part of the British Empire. Just outside the building Italy attracts the attention with handsome Italian girls in array of flags of sunny land and a profusion in display of pretty flowers of all kinds. Opposite this booth is "Canada" our home our native land, represented by our flags and emblems and charming attendants and a heavily laden table of daintiest fancy work. The ladies as well as the fancy work, on sale, will exemplify the quality of Canada's products. Each being gaily arrayed in a shoulder belt of Maple leaves.

Evangeline at the Well is an attractive booth where a typical Evangeline draws butter-milk and quenches the thirst of lovers of that favorite drink.

A fortune tellers tent with delicately sunburned ladies from Roumania is near where fortunes were told to a great crowd by cards, tea cup, palmistry and phrenology.

Adjoining is a Boys Scout tent, and outside is an image of Kaiser Bill where all whose wrath is warm may for a small fee have a satisfactory crack at the Kaiser.

The Drill Hall is also an animated scene. Here the first department is arrayed in the flags and colors of the United States. The ladies here have a great display of household novelties, needed in every home. The United States is sure to be popular in this Bazaar.

Near at hand is the large booth representing the original Country Store, fruits, vegetables, dry goods, footwear, all varieties in groceries can be found here and the store is kept by charming Belgian ladies, good representatives of that heroic country.

OTTAWA LETTER

Ottawa, July 14th.

Now that the froth and fury of the debate on the Compulsory Service Bill is over the members of parliament considered down to rational consideration of its details. They have been discussing it clause by clause during the whole of this week; and it will probably be ready for the Bonate early in the week coming.

When we look back over the speeches that were delivered on the notion for second reading and the Laurier amendment for referendum we are amazed at the poor quality of the arguments made against the Bill. As for the Laurier referendum there is now no serious person who regards it as being anything more than a trick that failed. It failed miserably; split the Liberal party, and made Sir Wilfred Laurier impossible as a leader.

The violent attacks that were made on the Bill during the debate on second reading suggested that in the committee stage it would be torn limb from limb. But here we get another surprise. Moderation has prevailed; very few amendments have been suggested; and the ghosts that were conjured up by the fertile imagination of Pugsley, McDonald, Oliver and others, have turned out to be very harmless figments.

There to meet the views amendments to meet the views of members on both sides of the House. The government is showing a willingness to adopt reasonable suggestions; and even the fire-eaters behind Laurier find themselves overcome by the sympathetic consideration the government gives to those suggestions. The result will be that practically all of the clauses of this much debated measure will go through committee of the whole House without division. This fact will astonish a good many people who have been expecting the partisans to make an awful onslaught on the Bill in detail. No such thing is happening.

The government is stiffening up the Bill. It is being amended so that the agitator against obedience to law can be dealt with quickly and effectually. Sir Robert Borden told the house in very plain language that the law will be enforced. He is now taking care to provide ample machinery to prevent any person from obstructing its operations. There will be power to visit severe punishment on agitation who counsel disobedience to the law, and any newspaper that advocates resistance to the law be promptly suppressed. The Government means business.

The Liberal partisan papers that were crying out for "leadership" are getting all the leadership they could want. There are now four divisions in the House of Commons: The Conservative stalwarts who stand with Borden for victory; The Liberal stalwarts who are also with Borden for victory; The Quebec anti-victory men who stand with Laurier for referendum and other scheme that will delay Canada in her duty; And the through thick and thin partisan crowd—Oliver, Pugsley, McDonald and Co. who are now busily engaged in looking around to find out where they fit.

Western Liberal are calling a convention to be held next month to try and straighten out their affairs. He doubt Sir Wilfred will be allowed to drop down as easily as possible; but he will be dropped. Meantime there is a very interesting

race for leadership.

We heard a great deal about the "leadership" Sir Wilfred Laurier would give Canada. Many a time we read about the "truly national government" he could organize. He has now given us a view of his "leadership" in actual life. Patriotic Canadians will be glad that they escaped from the trusted and trusty leader, Sir Robert Borden, is still in command.

The United States Embargo.

President Wilson's proclamation of an embargo upon exports from the United States is a stunning blow to the Central Powers. Lord Rhonda believes it will hasten the end of the war. It means that henceforth millions of dollars worth of food and other supplies urgently needed by the people and the armies of Germany and Austria will be cut off from them. It may not starve them into early submission to the demands of the Allies, but it will tremendously increase their difficulties and their suffering. It is one of the most important war measures yet adopted.

In spite of the tightness of the British blockade enormous quantities of food and war material have reached Germany through neutral countries. Not a German ship remains on the high seas, not a German port is open to commerce, yet German imports from overseas have by no means been cut off, for Sweden, Holland and Switzerland have been sending to Germany supplies imported by them with the result that the Huns are still unstarved. A large proportion of these supplies have been bought in the United States, a perfectly legitimate proceeding, but now the United States is fighting Germany and it has a right to refuse to sell to neutral or to anybody else anything that might eventually find its way to the enemy. Its action may offend some of the neutral, but its action is justifiable and the neutral will have to make the most of it. Protests may be expected. Holland already is complaining, the Dutch minister at Washington declaring that of the embargo is continued his people will starve, but these protests are not likely to have much weight with Mr. Wilson. The results which he seeks must be attained in some way, and economic pressure is one of the greatest factors in the present struggle against the enemy of civilization.

The embargo is an effective method of dealing with a dangerous situation, and it is another proof of the determination of the United States to throw its whole weight into the war. Everything that Washington has been done the break with Berlin seems to have been done promptly and in the best interests of those who are fighting for the rights of humanity.

RUSSIANS TAKE TOWN OF DOLINA

Their Advance in Galicia Continues—One Austrian Army Falling Back
LONDON, July 16—The occupation by the Russians of the Galician town of Dolina is reported in a Petrograd despatch to the Idean Nazionale of Rome as quoted in a Central News despatch from that city. The Austrian army of Central General Boehm-Ermolli is said to have been thrown back on the Carpathians.

REPORTED AMERICANS SANK FOUR U-BOATS.

LONDON, July 16—Four of the largest and most modern German submarines were destroyed by American warships which were conveying the first instalment of American troops to France, according to a report from German sources as contained in a Berne despatch to a Rome news agency and forwarded from Rome by Central news.

BUT NOT IN QUEBEC

French-Canadians in the United States have answered the call to the colors in the republic across the line quite as loyally as any other nationality. This fact was effectively demonstrated by Hon. Albert Seigny in the course of the debate on the Military Service Bill. Mr. Seigny read some interesting letters from prominent United States citizens of French-Canadian birth. "Unanimously and Heartily" was how Mr. L. N. Asselin, of Biddeford, Maine, wrote. "Loyally and A. J. Pothier, of Rhode Island. The editor of L'Opinion

Publique, of Worcester, Mass., expressed himself as follows: "Our French compatriots have answered the call of the country with loyalty and unanimity, which deserves the admiration of all. We exceed all other elements of the population for the figures of enlistments." Then what is wrong with Quebec? The only possible answer is that the present situation is the direct result of the anti-British and separatist teaching of Sir Wilfrid Laurier and Henri Bourassa. The fruit of that teaching is now being gathered, much to the disgust of the rest of Canada.

THE LIBERAL PARTY

The Tribune has been asked why, when it is so continuously advocating Liberal or Radical policies, it shows frequently such hostility to the Canadian Liberal party, and displays an asperity and acidity in reference to it which do not characterize its criticisms of the Tory party. The answer seems so obvious that the query appears unnecessary. The Tribune believes that the Canadian "Liberal" party is not, and for twenty years has not been a Liberal party. It has been, whilst using the Liberal name, a more reactionary body than the official or avowed Tory party. It has been a wolf in sheep's clothing, which in more dangerous than a wolf in his own pelt. Because it prefers an enemy to a betrayer, the Tribune will criticize the Tory policy and administration with as much politeness as it can command. But it cannot command enough to have any to spare for the "Liberal" rump. In the interest of real Liberalism and of the country, that must be born again.

Watch Your Turnips for the Zebra Caterpillar.

A yellow and black striped naked caterpillar appeared last year in large numbers, attacking turnips and other garden crops in various parts of the country. These caterpillars feed in groups or bunches when young and when full grown measured two inches or more in length. There were two broods one feeding in the earlier the other in the later part of the summer. The second brood was most destructive, this insect is known as the "Zebra caterpillar."

Last fall the larvae of the second brood were very heavily parasitized and it was hoped that there would be no outbreak this year. Unfortunately, however, the caterpillars of the first brood are now beginning to appear at various points and in some cases may become numerous enough to do appreciable harm. Crops likely to be attacked should be examined, and if the insect is present the infested leaves should be removed and destroyed unless the field is too large to make this method practicable; otherwise dusting with Paris green or arsenate of lime as for potato beetles, will be necessary.

Noted Canadian Explorer Dead

Dr. Robert Bell, F. R. S., F. R. C. S., is dead. The noted Canadian geologist and photographer died at his summer home near Rathwell, Man., recently as a result of a paralytic seizure. He was 76 years old.

Science has lost one of its most noted men in the death of Dr. Bell. His labors in the field of research have won for him the highest honors. The results of his researches from the basis of more than two hundred scientific works.

Dr. Bell was born in Toronto in 1841. He joined the Canadian geological survey as an assistant in 1856. From 1858 to 1861 he studied engineering and surveying in McGill University, receiving the degree of M. D. and C. M., having included medicine and surgery in his studies.

He was medical officer, naturalist and geologist of the Neptune expedition in 1884, and of the Alert expedition in 1885 to Hudson Strait and Bay. He was geologist of the Dina expedition in 1897 when he surveyed the south coast of Baffin land. He was royal commissioner of the mineral resources of Ontario in 1888.

Dr. Bell traversed so many unknown spots that he became known as the principal place name fath of Canada. He is said to have seen more game, fish, wild Indians and Eskimos than any other man. He collected much folk lore.

He won geographical distinction in regard to the Athabasca, Slave, Churchill, Nelson, Hayes, Winnipeg and Albany Rivers. Dr. Bell was one of the founders of the Royal Society of Canada.

Back to the Ground

No man who now tills the soil with energy need feel that he is a slacker. If he does not hold to his plough and cultivator, someone, untrained in their use must substitute for him while he learns a new job. Such trading a place is foolish and costly in a time of crisis. President Wilson coined a good phrase when he spoke of the farmer as the soldier of the commissary. He realized that times have changed since the embattled farmers at Concord fired the shot heard round the world. The armies that are put into the field under modern methods of warfare cannot be fed by foraging, and the individual cannot look out for himself. War is a specialized business, and the farmer has one of the most important lines to hold. This year follows a year of short yield, which means that there is a big push ahead for the man who makes the crops and tends the cattle. It takes good men in the field to keep good men in the field.—Country Gentlemen.

PHILO DODD GAVE LIFE ON TORPEDOED STEAMER.

Former Western Union Operator Killed on the Addah-Pte. Wm. Thomas Finally Dies of Wounds Received—Nova Scotia Officers Falling

(Special to the Telegraph) Fredericton, N. B. July 9—Word has been received to the effect that Phila Dodds, several years ago Western Union Telegraph operator here, was killed instantly on June 15 when the Elder-Dempster Addah was torpedoed by a Hun submarine. Deceased was wireless operator of the Addah. The deceased was aged twenty-six years. He is survived by his mother, Mrs. James Dodds, of St. George (N. B.), and two brothers Ralph Dodds, of the Bank of British North America, Fredericton, and James Victor Dodds, Bank of Commerce, Halifax.

Dies in Halifax Hospital. Tuesday, July 10.

The death of Private William Thomas, aged twenty years, occurred on Monday July 9, at Hazelwood Hospital, Halifax. Private Thomas came to St. John from Bristol, England, about twelve years ago, and was employed for several years by T. M. Davidson, Little River. Private Thomas was formerly a member of a New Brunswick battalion, and was wounded at the battle of Courcellette on September 15, 1916. He was then taken to the military hospital at Chichester and later to Shorncliffe. In February, 1917, he returned to Canada and entered Hazelwood Hospital for further treatment. He passed away on Sunday July 9, from the effects of his wounds. Private Thomas is survived by one brother, Frederick of East St. John, and one the body will be forwarded probably tomorrow. He went out into the harbor, which was perfectly calm at the time, in a canoe, no one seeing him leave. About 11 o'clock the upturned canoe was found floating on the water, and a short time afterwards the body was recovered.

Nothing further is known of the sad affair at present, though the military board examination into the happening will likely clear up what occurred. Lieut. B. A. Taylor Dies of Wounds. Halifax, July 9—The news has been received of the death of Lieut. Benjamin A. Taylor, reported a few days ago as having been dangerously wounded in action. The gallant young officer had just commenced his twenty-second year. It was a year ago this week that he went overseas with a draft from the 63rd.

725 RECRUITS OBTAINED IN BOSTON FOR C. E. F.

Boston, Mass., June 18—A total of 725 recruits to various branches of the Canadian Expeditionary Force have been obtained in this city during the past week, officers of the 236th Canadian Battalion announced last night. The battalion has been brought virtually to full strength by the campaign here which was assisted by the efforts of a kilted band of bagpipers. Canadians will leave this week for Fredericton, N. B., making stops at several points in Maine for further recruiting. The recruiting officers, which they have opened here, will be continued.

Two carloads containing 96 British recruits from New York and vicinity arrived at Aldershot on Friday last. They will remain here a short time before proceeding overseas to join a British Battalion.

The shaded picnic grounds at the farm were used for luncheon and afterwards all parts of the farm was visited, Manager Blair supplied the party with dishes, tea and an abundance of fresh strawberries and cream from the farm.

After luncheon, a short address was given by Miss Fraser, provincial secretary of the institute. Miss Fraser spoke of the work done by the institute and gave practically advice on timely subjects. **A SLICE OF BREAD**

A single slice of bread seems an unimportant thing. In many house holds one or more slices of bread daily are thrown away not used for human food. Sometimes stale quarter, or half loaves are thrown out. Yet one good-sized slice of bread—such as a child likes to cut—weights an ounce. It contains almost three-fourths of an ounce of flour.

If every one of the country's 20,000,000 homes wastes on the average only one such slice of bread a day, says an American exchange, the country is throwing away daily over 14,000,000 ounces of flour—over 375,000 pounds, or enough flour for even a million 1-pound loaves a day. For a full year at this rate there would be a waste of over 319,000,000 pounds of flour, 4500,000 barrels—enough flour to make 365,000,000 loaves.

As it takes 41-2 bushels of wheat to make a barrel of ordinary flour this waste would represent the flour from over 7,000,000 bushels of wheat. Fourteen and ninetenths bushels of wheat on the average are raised per acre. It would take the fruit of some 470,000 acres just to provide a single slice of bread to be wasted daily in every home.

To produce this much flour calls for an army of farmers, railwaymen, flour-mill people. To get the flour to the consumer calls for many freight cars and the use of many tons of coal.

But some one says a full slice of bread is not wasted in every home. Very well—make it a daily slice for every 4 or every 30 homes—make it a weekly or monthly slice in every home—or make the wasted slice thinner. The waste of flour involved is still appalling — altogether too great to be tolerated when wheat is scarce.

Any waste of bread is inexcusable when there are so many ways of using stale bread to cook delicious dishes.

French shipping losses, by submarine and mine, have totalled about 600,000 tons, but France has built no less new tonnage, and now has 140,060 tons on the stocks. The German submarine campaign has not "got" maritime France any more than military France.

**SEDITIONOUS SPEECHES CHARGE.**

After all the evidence had been heard, Magistrate Casey sent Mr. Cormier up to stand trial before the Supreme Court of Nova Scotia. Bonds for five hundred dollars were taken from Mr. Cormier. Sergeant Weatherbee is in town recruiting, and the words spoken by Mr. Cormier were made before a number of men in a blacksmith shop on Church Street.

Blondin, while crossing the St. Lawrence at Three Rivers on the ferry boat "Progress" was hissed and threatened by some one hundred and fifty passengers. Threats were made against the Hon. Mr. Blondin because of his attitude on conscription.

### NEW WAY TO PUT UP FOOD.

Just in time to meet the need, United States Government experts have found a new way of preserving green vegetables at home, according to the Ladies' Home Journal.

The new method is quite simple, and can be used in any home. It does not require any materials or equipment not found in practically every household. Furthermore, it does not require any sugar—an expensive item in much home-canning. Neither does it require any artificial heat.

Finally the new method permits the use of almost any kind of bottle or other container a fact of especial importance in view of the great shortage of tin cans and the unusually large demand on the glass jar industry.

The new method is based on the action of bacteria and the process popularly known as fermentation. The bacteriological action takes place in a mixture first of corn meal and water and later in a salt solution, or brine, inoculated with the corn meal mixture. A small quantity of vinegar is also added to this solution. This process has already been thoroughly tried out with string beans, tomatoes, cabbage, spinach, potatoes, and other vegetables with uniformly excellent results.

The first step is to prepare what is called the "starter"—that is, the material which will induce the necessary bacteriological action, or fermentation; it is very simple: Just mix into a paste equal parts by weight of any kind of corn meal and water—two pounds of meal to a quart of water. Let it stand for a day or two in a warm place, until the paste has a distinctly sour taste. This means that the bacteria which produce lactic acid are in control and have stopped the development of all other forms of bacterial life.

Suppose you wish to preserve string beans or green peas. Clean the vegetables thoroughly. Cook them or not, just as you please. The cooking can just as well be postponed until you wish to eat them. Prepare a salt solution, or brine in the proportions of one pound of salt to ten quarts of water. Vary the amounts of salt and water in this proportion according to the quantity of solution needed.

To one gallon of the brine add a pint of the corn meal paste, and stir well. Then strain, to get rid of the corn-meal articles. Put your vegetables in a large stone crock or in a wooden tub or keg or any convenient receptacle. Do not use a metal container such as a wash boiler or an iron kettle, as the acid may corrode the iron. Pour the remainder of the brine solution and

the corn meal liquor over the vegetables, and add vinegar in the proportion of one pint to three gallons of the brine—that is, one part of vinegar to 24 parts of the brine solution.

Fermentation will begin at once. If you use uncooked vegetables this fermentation will be marked by bubbles, and you can tell when the fermentation is completed, because no more bubbles arise when the container is jarred or shaken slightly. There will be little if any bubbling when cooked vegetables are used.

Whether you use cooked or uncooked vegetables, it is necessary to cover the mixture and weight the cover so as to hold the vegetables completely submerged. If you use raw vegetables it will be necessary to use a cover slightly smaller than the top of your keg or crock—a disk of wood will do—so as to leave space for the escape of the gas that is produced by the fermentation. Let this cover rest directly on top of the contents of the container, with a weight on top of the contents to hold it in place. Before putting on the cover it is also advisable to place a layer of large leaves, such as those of the rhubarb plant or grapevine, on the surface of the liquid, and a clean cloth over the leaves.

If you use raw vegetables you must wait until the bubbling stops before finally sealing up the container. If you use cooked vegetables they may be sealed up at once. There is no danger of the fermenting process going too far, as once started it will continue until completed and then automatically cease. The simplest way to seal up the container and its contents is to pour melted paraffin wax over the top. The cover and its weight may be left in place, exposed surface of the liquid and everything. The wax excludes all air and prevents spoilage by bacterial processes, which can go on only when there is air present.

This method makes it possible to get along without the use of cans, jars bottles or other small containers, so long as whatever containers is used whether barrel, keg or stone jar is hermetically sealed. All the vegetables thus preserved may be kept in a single large container, to be opened in autumn or winter and the contents used as desired. All that is necessary for keeping the vegetables in good conditions it to store them in a cool place. Any cellar will do, so long as it is reasonably cool.

### CANADIAN AVIATOR LEAPS 3,000 FEET SAFELY THRU THE AIR

To have to leap from a height of 3,000 feet would probably stump the ordinary mortal, but it has been done by Canadians on the Western battle line in the ordinary course of active service. Lt. N. J. Parker Hooper, D. S. O., No 2 Selge Battery was engaged in watching the German lines from a captive balloon at an elevation of 3,000 feet. Another Canadian Lieutenant was similarly occupied in a balloon nearby. Suddenly 2 German aeroplanes shot overhead and began dropping bombs in an attempt to destroy the observation balloons. Lt. Hooper's companion seized a parachute and leaped into space, and Lt. Hooper was about to follow when British air-defence guns located the Germans and drove them off. Lt. Hooper's companion sailed safely thru the trip to earth and landed none the worse for his drop, thru 3,000 feet of thin air.

Lt. Hooper is a native of Charlottetown, P. E. I. and was formerly champion quarter-mile runner of the Maritime Provinces. He was a member of the Abegweit Athletic Club, and has won 75 medals while a member of the P. E. I. track team.

### CHURCHILL IS MINISTER OF MUNITIONS.

Sir Edward Carson Relinquishes Post as First Lord of Admiralty and Joins War Cabinet

LONDON, July 17—Sir Edward Carson has relinquished his post as First Lord of the Admiralty, and joined the War Cabinet without portfolio, according to an official announcement of new Ministerial appointments, issued this evening. Sir Edward will be succeeded by Sir Eric Campbell Geddes, who has been director-general of munitions supply. Winston Spencer Churchill succeeds Dr. Christopher Addison as Minister of Munitions, Dr. Addison becoming a minister without portfolio in charge of reconstruction; Edwin Samuel Montagu is made Secretary for India.

One of the most acceptable appointments, as far as the general public is concerned, is that of Mr. Montagu. He is one of the very few members of the Asquith administration, in which he was Minister of Munitions to join the Lloyd George ministry.
