**Marrriages in France.**  
 British soldiers billeted in the smaller French towns and villages behind the lines have often been surprised at the number of notices of marriage posted outside the offices of the mayor of various communes. For the majority of the inhabitants have departed for safer places further from the fighting zone. The explanation is simple. When a couple decide to marry in France notice of their intention must be posted for about three weeks in the respective communes of the bride and bridegroom and in the communes where their respective parents reside. It often happens, therefore, that four different notices of marriage have to be displayed, and refugees from villages in the war-zones must have their notices displayed in the usual way in their own villages.  
 The ceremony is performed by the mayor. A French matre is not an English mayor. There are 36 communes of France. The mayor is unpaid, his duties are much more onerous than those of the chairman of an English district council, his office is often part of the State school, and he is usually assisted by the village schoolmaster, who acts as secretary to the commune and who, by reason of his official position, is ineligible for the post of mayor. A marriage costs nothing. It is conducted usually in the council chamber by the mayor, who for the occasion always ties the tricolor round his waist. He usually delivers a little homily to the newly married couple, and also usually exercises his time-honoured privilege of kissing the bride.

**Not a War of Kings or Nobles.**  
 All the seven wonders of the world fade on history's page compared with the spectacle Great Britain presents to day. A commercial nation of less than 50,000,000 people suddenly summoned to arms where no arms existed and in less than 30 months she has a bigger army than history ever before recorded and a war machine in Europe that for wealth of shell, explosives and war power is the amazement of the Germans, who had taken ten years thirty months to prepare for the attack.  
 She is not only the beginning of wonders.  
 Without an English aeroplane engine that could circle her own island she has vanquished the boasted Zeppelins and is mistress of her own skies. With submarines by the hundred, threatening her coast defenses, her food supplies and her commerce, she has swept all oceans, locked the wanted German fleet in harbor, convoyed shipments of gold across the ocean in safety—loads of gold that in former times would have paralyzed national financial markets—made the English channel her multiple track ocean railway to Europe with no loss by Zeppelins or submarines; fought in Attica, at the Canal, at the Dardanelles; grappled with the Turk and the Bulgars; changed crusades and armistices in command; changed calluses; fed the armies of France; given arms to Russia; maintained the armies and the governments of Belgium and Serbia and altogether advanced to her allies three thousand million dollars or three times the national debt of the United States.  
 While the United States has been trying to find out how to build military rid in quantities and has availed orders for them representing hundreds of millions of dollars, England has been turning out a billion for herself and her allies, cannons by the thousand, boats and coats by the million for herself and her allies, and wonders of wonders, she has done all this, is doing it, is yet to do more, and has now her manufacturing, her trade relations and her overseas commerce unimpaired. Yet she has required the trade of the world for her needs: her food, rubber and metal supplies from the outside world practically cut off except as new territory is taken.  
 This is a gigantic physical power and a trade and war power combined never before dreamed of. It puts in the shade all that the world previously knew of Great Britain's financial power. Nobody dreamed two years ago that the war cost Great Britain to be beyond five or six billions. It is to-day three times that sum and Great Britain is prepared to double it again. But stupendous, as even beyond all previous estimates, as is this financial power, the physical and mental power manifested by Great Britain is the marvel of marvels.  
 The British Lion was regarded in Germany as a money bag of trade and a whelp of the seas. Great Britain's ability to put 10 per cent. of her population under arms, to feed and equip her allies and at the same time to maintain her credit and commerce throughout the world was something never dreamed of within or without her empire before this war.  
 No economist ever counted the wealth in credit, gold reserves and securities power that is now showing forth in the British Empire. No student of men and nations ever pictured forth the war spirit of the British people that could be so roused in a righteous cause. No student of religion or social order ever gauged the spirit of self sacrifice that is now lighting the path of the nation in war.  
 This is the people's war. It is the war of the democracy that has built the British Empire around the globe. It is not a war of kings, lords or nobles. It is a war in defence of all the civilization, peace and honor for which England has stood and in which she has made progress for more than a hundred years.  
 The Prussian could measurably measure the wealth of England, count her population and take toll of her guns, big and little. They numbered her military men, her business men and her idle and leisure classes; and outside of her navy, her wealth and her trade she was but a Prussian military census as nothing. But nowhere in the world was there anything by which to measure the slumbering soul of that people. It is lighted to-day, and getting madder every minute. The stigmas and insults to credit and honor from Washington only increase the resolve of her people and her faith in the invincibility of their righteous cause. For this they are willing to pledge everything in sacrifice for justice upon the altar of their battle flags.  
 Germany is living on 30 per cent. per capita of what it was consuming before the war. But England is consuming, feeding and fighting to the extent that her physical force is increased by far more than 30 per cent.

**Editorial Brevities.**

The Director Gen. of the National Board, E. B. Bennett, M. P., has issued a statement concerning the number of returns from the two and a half million cards sent out. He says:— That over 50 per cent. of the cards have been filled in and returned, and as they continue to come in the date has been extended until March 31st.

One of the matters that should receive the attention of the town authorities is some provision for rendering safe the sidewalks during such weather as we have been experiencing during the past week. It ought not to be a very difficult matter to secure an abundant supply of sand, and a free application of it might prevent a serious accident and a consequent heavy cost to the town. During the past week the sidewalks have been in a positively dangerous condition, particularly for older people. That there has not been a serious accident is evidently due more to good fortune than anything else. We trust to see this suggestion acted upon in the near future.

The Kings County Agricultural Society is holding a series of public meetings in the interests of natural science. The first meeting was held last evening at Evangeline Hall when Prof. Haycock gave an interesting address on growing beans. Prof. Saxby Blair was also one of the speakers. Other topics will be taken up and the members of the Society will undoubtedly receive information that will tend to a more intelligent understanding of the needs of the country at this time, as well as to a more profitable cultivation of the farms of this section in the coming summer. This undertaking is very commendable, and the example is a good one for other sections of the county to follow.

Dear Friends—Just dropping you a few lines to let you know that my father and myself received the socks that you sent us. We gave George Spiney his pair that came with ours. You people at home cannot imagine how useful home knitted socks feel on our feet alongside of the socks we get from the boys who have left since I sailed from Halifax. We have had plenty of rain here this winter but I have not seen any snow yet. And I saw my first green Christmas tree here in France.

All the boys are beginning to long for the time to come when we are going to pack all our troubles in our kit-bag and sail for old Canada again. Canada is the only little spot in the world, bar any. We have lots of work here in our camp caring for the wounded horses. The people at home would be surprised if they could just see work we do on them, operating and dressing them day in and day out until they are fit for service again. And then they are like the men—get out of the Hospital and rush up the line again to do their little bit over. For if they are suffering any we shoot them with the humane gun. We have lots of work to do just the same but it gets tiresome after a while. Well, dear friends, I think I will have to bring my long letter to a close. Again thanking you all for the socks.

**Doctor's Tragic Death.**

**The Outlook.**

HALIFAX Feb. 12.—Most recent reports from authoritative sources indicate that the Germans are likely to over-reach themselves in their latest U-Boat campaign. It is not at all likely that they can do anything more against the Allies than they have already done, but they are lining up the neutrals solidly against them. If they carry out their policy it is not likely that they can long keep the United States out of the war. The strong attitude of Spain and South America Republics is very characteristic. The first few days the outlook was threatening, but it seems likely that the Naval authorities have since been able to combat the submarines, as the losses are growing less. This last desperate move on the part of Germany is being answered by the splendid advance on the Somme where the British Troops seem to be able to go forward at will.

It is likely that a new Forestry Battalion will be recruited in Nova Scotia within the next six weeks. Men who understand lumbering operations are much needed and no where can be found more efficient men than in Nova Scotia. As the Lumbering Corps will be breaking up shortly these will be a splendid opportunity for those who have been in service all winter to carry on their work in England and France and at the same time help the Empire win the war.



Cats.

A great deal has been said about a person's right to keep a cat. I with a great many others believe that any person has a right to keep a cat on their own property. I also hold that they have no right to keep one on my property, and experience has shown that it cannot be done very long. I believe in protecting our native song birds and will do everything in my power to defend them against wandering cats, and hope others will do the same until the stray cat has vanished and pet cats are kept at home. I have done some work this last year in eliminating stray cats from the neighborhood and have been rewarded by a fourfold increase in the song birds nesting around our home. In addition to the reward I mentioned last week I have been rewarded by some very divided opinions of people who think their pet cats sleep peacefully under my pear tree, but who have another thought coming to them, for there are other bird lovers in town as well as myself. We know of about twenty five or eight cats that have ceased operations during the last open season. Several of the above mentioned bird lovers destroy cats on the spot, knowing it will be blamed on me (and I don't mind) but I wish to say very emphatically that I am not in any way responsible for the death or injury of any dog that has lately been killed for I have no motive for such act.

Now let me say a word in regard to why cats should be destroyed, and if you think of it for a minute you will agree with me and give your assistance to the good work. They catch the parent birds while they gather food for their nestlings and thus leave the young to starve. They climb the trees in the night and catch both the mother bird and young on the nest. One gentleman in town had a robin nesting in his wood-pile and he used to feed the young robins. One morning he went to visit them and they were all killed. He kept a cat. They catch young feedings, that leave the nest too soon and hop about the ground powerless to escape. Cats are also known to carry diseases and for that reason alone should be eliminated. If any one wishes any information on the best means of exterminating stray cats I should be very pleased to give them any assistance I can in that regard. It is amazing to see that when a cat makes its appearance in any orchard the birds especially the robins will call for me to come and attend to him. Sometimes a lively old robin will point him out to me saying as clearly as he can "there he is, there he is," when crack and robin says thank you and goes back to business.

Success of an Acadia Man.

Mr. Bower graduated from Acadia in 1912 as Bachelor of Arts and in 1913 from the same university as Bachelor of Science.
