

To the Editor of the Herald: I am desired by my aunt, Lady Frandlin (whose exceedingly weak state of health forbids her addressing you with her own hand) to bring under your notice the fact that she has renewed the reward (of \$2 000) offered for the recovery of the records of her husband's expedition It was first made public about three years ago in England, and almost simultaner ously in America where its promulgation is at least as necessary as at home and my auni ventures a hope that you will secure for the subject the most widely circulation it can receive by giving orders that the reward be made known in the pages of the New York Herald.

In this hope we shall place before you the leading facts as to the orject in view and the still existing probabilities of suc

It is natural'y concluded that on the abandonment of the Erebus and Terror a few miles only from the mainland, the journals, the ships logs, and scientific, observations would not be left to certain destruction with the ships but would be landed for deposit at the spot whence the survivors started on their journey to Fish River.
